SERMONNOTES

You Will Live • Romans 8:18-27

This is the second in our post-Easter sermon series on the implications of the cross and empty tomb for our lives and world from Romans chapter eight. Last week Paul focused on humans and their enslavement to sin and how we can be freed from sin & death and have power over our old habits and sinful nature. The Good News in the first section of Romans 8 is that we become children of God, heirs of our heavenly Father, and co-heirs with Christ. In this second part of Romans 8, Paul focuses on creation and as a poet-theologian, he gives creation consciousness. It is worthy of our attention and study—and there are profoundly positive implications for our life now and into eternity.

- 1. Do you enjoy nature? What are one or two of your favorite places on the planet? Why?
- 2. Read Romans 8:18-25. What is true about nature, creation, our planet, according to Paul? Is that surprising to you or have you always seen it the way Paul sees it? How do you hear creation "groaning" right now? Does this passage encourage stewardship of nature or exploitation of it? Explain.
- 3. I talked in my sermon about a two-chapter Gospel, a one-chapter Gospel, and a four-chapel Gospel. Was that new to you or familiar? Why does it matter that we don't forget chapter one and chapter four in the Metanarrative of Scripture? (Note: A *metanarrative* is a grand, overarching story or framework that attempts to explain all human experience, history, and knowledge.) How does it help us see our sin and salvation (chapters two & three) in a richer, deeper, and more nuanced way? And how does chapter one help us imagine what chapter four might look like regarding a new heaven and a new earth?
- 4. People have asked me to include the books I refer to in my sermons in these notes. I drew from N. T. Wright's book, *Surprised by Hope*, and Hugh Welchel's *How Then Should We Work?* regarding these concepts of the Gospel and what work can be like in this life and what work will be like in eternity. Welchel's book is much shorter and easily accessible. Wright's book is more involved, but very rich and rewarding for those who work their way to the end. These books were helpful for our H-Town Fellows (fellows.mdpc.org) as they have made their way through the program the last two years.
- 5. Read Romans 8:26-27. How do these verses help you with prayer in general and your practice of praying in particular? Share examples. How does this idea help you not only endure but thrive in this broken, messy, confusing world? And how does this help of the Spirt connect with the Four-Chapter Gospel Concept in our real lives?
