<u>Call to Order</u>: Pastor Beth Case called the meeting of the Session of Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church to order at 6:35 pm in the Chapel. She opened with a Psalm and prayer.

<u>Call for Quorum</u>: The Clerk, Bob Holloway, affirmed that a quorum was present.

The above candidates in the Chapel and online via Teams, were invited by Dan Aikins and Almir Dias to introduce themselves, telling Session why they were attracted to MDPC and one place they want to serve. There were some technical difficulties with those joining via Teams, but we were able to engage via speaker phone with the Aragon, Cooper and Mendes family online!

Beth noted that belonging is so important in being part of the church, and with that she had three questions related to "belonging" which she asked of each. Beth then asked for the **Motion**: to receive the above-named friends as *Covenant Partners at MDPC*, which was made and seconded. The motion was approved unanimously and with great joy. Pastor Almir prayed a blessing over our newest members in Portuguese and Beth dismissed them with the invitation to remain for the duration of the meeting or to be excused.

Time with Alf- Why Being a City Church Matters to God?

Alf had the opportunity to read these two books this summer: <u>Megacities: Biblical Lessons for Today</u> by James White, a missionary in Brazil and <u>Why City Matters to God, the Culture and the Church</u> by Stepen T. Um and Justin Buzzard.

Have you ever wondered that our church is 13 miles west of downtown Houston-and by the latest projections, the city center is at the corner of Beltway 8 and I-10, so we are at the center of the population as it grows and expands- does that matter at all? Alf mentioned that he is the only son of an only son of an only son of an only son. Six generations of men/ boys will continue the Halvorson name with a grandbaby boy to be born in November! Alf's dad grew up in South Central Minnesota- his dad worked at a cannery there- farms with corn and soybeans in the area-population 587-through the GI bill, his dad went to the Univ of Minnesota and earned an engineering degree, spending his entire career at 3M- Minneapolis, St Paul went to big cities all around the US and world. Alf grew up in bedroom community in Minnesota population 5K, then in Wisconsin- Port Edwards population 11K, he spent junior high and high school in Nevada, MO with a population less than 10K. Then with seminary and his first call in Ames, Iowa- population 50K and with students of Iowa state another 35K- he and Shari were then in Springfield, MO for 12 yrs-population 150K but the 3rd largest area in MO behind KC and St

Louis -he then spent 8 years in Bethlehem, PA- with Allentown and Easton, it was the 3rd largest area in Pennsylvania- then here to Houston, the 3rd largest city in America. People are leaving other states to go to Southern states- and *currently Texas has 4 of the 10 largest cities in America*. If we are do some Biblical theology in looking at the two books referenced, what does it mean that we are in a city? In Houston, Texas? Did you ever think that the Bible from Genesis to Revelation talks about a city a lot? We start in the garden of Edenwith a cultural mandate to be fruitful, multiply, and fill the earth-an extension of that mandate is that cities would happen and as they are built you add art, business, music, education, literature, law, medicine, finance, etc. The first city mentioned in Gen 4:17 was Enoch, an extension of the cultural mandate happened -the first city before sin- work in the Bible happens before sin- after sin, work becomes hard, and cities become conflicted places- Cain committed first murder of his brother Abel. From the beginning, cities have not been without their challengesthey've been tainted. On a drive this summer in Michigan, he and Shari saw the sign "The City for Wealth- The Country for Health" -where do you really want to be? Is the city bad in and of itself? Gen 10:12 -Resin a "great" city -meaning "significant"- for good or significant for evil-everything is accentuated in a city- we go to cities for protection, to overcome loneliness with community. to do more together for good or bad if drawn in that direction. -the city of Babel grew with a goal to be great without God and a rival to God- it was built out of pride to make a name for itself apart from God. "Significant" in a detrimental way. Abraham chooses to live in Jordan River Valley and Lot in Sodom and Gomorrah. God wanted to preserve those cities -do you remember the story? if there are x righteous people, God won't level the city...are there 50 righteous, 40, 30, 20, 10? Abraham gets to 10 and the city was ultimately flattened, but God cares about the city. In Exodus 1:11 -Israelites forced to build cities for Pharoah. Slavery builds cities- sin sometimes builds cities. Other people in the promised land built and the Israelites took over. Jer 29:7 where the people of God were sent into Exile -sent to Babylon and then to Susa in Persia -in Esther's story that we are studying. They were to seek the peace and prosperity of the city. While in exile, still work for good in the city that has taken you there because in its prosperity will be your prosperity...we are to help the cities to become better than they were and somehow glorify God in that act. Jerusalem becomes the key city Biblically - the City of David, the City of God- Augustine says in his book in the 300s that the physical city of Jerusalem is what we try to reproduce spiritually in any other city in the world that we reside in. Psalm 83..." City of God". After the exile, Ezra and Nehemiah are invited to come back to rebuild the city to ensure that there is justice, hope, peace, and a future there. Even Jonah was called to Ninevah to preach repentance to that city when he wanted to preach damnation. The last sentence of the book is a question from God "Should I not be concerned about Ninevah that great city....? God even cares for our enemy cities-every city matters to God. In the New Testament-Jesus grew up in a small town in the north, Nazareth-he continued to go to the big city for festivals-to Jerusalem over and over- he sets his face to go and will never leave it – he would go to Jerusalem to die for you and *me.* Jesus weeps for the city when he arrives and looks over it. Whatever God weeps for, should we weep for? Have you ever wept for Houston? Has the brokenness of a city ever caused you to weep or your heart to be so pained? If we go on to Pauls' ministry- Paul goes to all the great cities of the empire of his day. *The early church is distinctly urban, strategically, specifically urban*. Corinth quickly experienced a great influx from the west and east- it was the Houston of the day-Antioch of Syria was a strong competitor- Paul's Corinth was once the NY, the LA, and the Las Vegas of the day.

Info on cities Alf collected from his Footsteps of Paul journey- Antioch of Syria- 500K people; Corinth- 500K, Rome-1M plus 1M passing through; Ephesus- 400 K; Tarsus where Paul grew up- 500K - Tarsus in the 1st century AD, was where the Greek scholars of the day were. Paul got the best Greek education in the world and then went on to Jerusalem for his finishing education. We got the benefit. **Why did you go to cities?** Cities keep us safe; they keep us social, and they shape our sacred religious life. The city is about power, culture, spirituality if there are converts they will spread out and go back home and with their businesses spread the gospel across the world of the day – cities are magnets -they hold promise, hope, chance for a new start-cities are also places of great pain loneliness poverty violence and exploitation, - Houston may just be the greatest hub of human trafficking right now In Revelation 21 &22 the new Jerusalem no more weeping, no more mourning crying, no more death. no more night, no more temple because presence of God fills the entire city. **The Bible starts in a garden-then moves to the city quickly-and ends in a city that has a garden in it**. *The Bible sees cities and the City of God as key*.

Alf shared interesting data and statistics from roughly 10 years ago...about the history of the city and its future. Finished with - Albert Mohler, president of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville in 2010 wrote, said "In the course of less than 300 years, our world will have shifted from one in which 3% of people were living in cities to one in which 80% are resident in urban areas. If the Christian church does not learn how

to do new modes of ministry, we fill find ourselves on the outside looking in. The gospel of Jesus Christ must call a new generation of Christians into the cities. *"As cities go, so goes the world"*

What does this mean for us? If MDPC's four pillars are one-<u>Belonging/community fellowship</u>- if people come to our city lonely and isolated, how might we be that island?-second emphasis- Evangelism- many are coming to the city from a secular background not knowing Jesus- we better figure out ways to talk about Jesus in a winsome way that answers questions- and third, our Discipleship/Formation lens. We must have people more fully formed that look like Jesus Christ to be advertisements of what the faith is and to meet the needs of those that come with challenges-and fourth-Mission and Outreach - we are ahead of many churches because of our 120-130 local and international partnerships and not only do we share the good news but also help to alleviate human need. We are not supposed to be the same as the city nor isolated from the city – we are to be in the city but distinct while in the city Biblically- in and with, but not the same. Stephen Klineberg-retired faculty at Rice says that because Houston is the most diverse city in America, it is ahead of most – we are what those cities will be by 2050 -25% white, 25% Hispanic, 25% African American, 25% Pacific Rim- we are the pacesetter or the lead dog or the early adopter that other cities will imitate for good or for bad. MPDC fights above our weight class because of our radical generosity and yet we are a neighborhood church at the same time. We are with those people that are developing policies in Spring Branch and throughout our city. We are a church that has a pretty good balance between the horizontal and vertical. The referenced book ends with understanding the city...Not every city is the same so churches will have different expressions. Image examples: Boston- knowledge, DC- power, SF – equality, Oklahoma City- Family; LA- Image; NY City- Success. *Every city has an ethos, and every city has an idolatry*. Good churches name the idolatry and point people back to God. What is Houston's image/reputation/values? How might that influence us as a church? Traffic- it's a driving area/city, energy hub/capital, you can make it here with hard work, diversity, energy, hospitality, people are welcoming and generous (Katrina), fusion, NASA, medicine, wildcatter mentality, entrepreneurial – per Tom Tewell, "MDPC will try anything at least once/we will dig a well." Is MDPC working on getting younger? Are we focused on age, demographics, culture. Do we need to more fully reflect Houston's diversity? Is there a future for a Korean, African American, Pacific Rim congregation here at MDPC? What are our idolatries in 77024? Comfort, greed, "the golden ghetto", rectangle where there is more prosperity...bigger is better.

There is a series of questions on screen and in your online packet (also attached to minutes)- take these to your committees perhaps. Discussion around one question tonight:

What would the apostle Paul say, pray, and do if he were doing ministry in my city? Alf closed by noting our vote and 50K expenditure on master planning- they will likely report back in February or March with a potential vote in the spring on expansion -shouldn't our building recognize that we are in this city church mentality? As we pray, we are trying to poise ourselves for where MDPC will be and fit into where our city will be in 2050.

<u>Clerk's Report</u>: (Bob Holloway and Joe Stockdale)

Joe Stockdale gave an update on the Presbytery Meeting in San Antonio which he attended along with pastors from MDPC, Dan Aikins, Clay Brown, Beth Case. He also gave a brief update on the work of the Nominating Committee. Very close to filling all positions for the Class of 2027. Thank you for all the great nominations! **Bob Holloway** gave mention to the ECO National Gathering in Dallas- January 2025- he encouraged us to go and see what other ECO churches are doing and what the focus is. Make yourself available to go! It's a good foundation as a leader. *Those rolling off in 2024 were asked to look at their Job Descriptions as we look to provide the most updated information to our new officer candidates when asked to serve.* Bob indicated that Elders again would get information encouraging you to look at those jobs in relation to Metanoia. What would God do in the decision making?

Finance Report: (Bob Davis) We are in good shape because we are in a big city, and we are following our four pillars. We are in a new season of the year when Marcus is looking at 2025 Budget. Our budget to date, we have done very well. Credit to the staff for looking at budgets, understanding budgets, and trying to live within their budgets. Thank you, Marcus and staff. In one area on the expense side, we are looking into a reason why we are over. On the contribution side, we are doing extremely well. Some may be giving a little earlier in the year which makes cash flows easier to manage throughout the year. We do expect the gap to close but can be hopeful it doesn't! Marcus mentioned the five big projects this summer- the last one being CLC roof project starting today, and monument signs up and running in next week or two. Concrete for pickleball needs 2-5 weeks to cure.

Hopefully it will cure quickly so we can open in November!

Omnibus Agenda:

Beth introduced the Omnibus Motion below for September. As we typically do, it was asked if there were any items that needed to be removed for separate consideration. Beth mentioned earlier tonight that part of cleaning the roles for BPC is also to release those who wish to share the love of Christ back in Brazil or out of state in the US or elsewhere. Thus, the reason for the large number of membership transfers. Also please note in b. that we usually baptize the children of members -the parents and/or grandparents. Our Baptism team is intentional about getting to know these families and their relationships to the church. Dan updated us tonight that Paige Buck was wrongly cleaned from the roles in college. Also, the Menards have a family connection to MDPC, but currently live away in Chicago for her medical residency and they are with a church that does not do infant Baptisms. Prayer Ministry:

- Plans have begun for the 2025 **Partner in Prayer** season. Thanks to the diligence of Annette Erickson and Diann Turet, automations have expedited the process of adding new pray-ers and assigning new lists. A letter to all MDPCers will be sent in November. This letter from Rev. Beth Case will invite new participants and provide instructions for receiving new lists in January.
- The MDPC staff continues to pray twice weekly. Each Tuesday and Thursday, a different member of the staff leads in a prayerful or devotional time. Highlights are when we are led by our musicians in songs of prayer and praise.

Second Family:

- Second Family volunteers expended 91 hours to support their care partners during September 2024.
- We currently have 9 care partners and have been busy attending to each one's special needs. We assisted one care partner with doctor appointments and a visit to the hospital for a gel injection in her left knee. One care partner has kept her volunteers very busy with several doctor appointments after falling in her bathroom. One care partner is out of rehabilitation and is back at home with her beloved dog and now has home healthcare to assist her 5 hours a day for 5 days. We are pleased to announce that we have a member of the church with a certified therapy dog, and we already have appointments scheduled for visits with our care partners. Visitation keeps us very busy each month and is most beneficial to check on their health and wellbeing. Several care partners are taken on long walks and to lunch every week with long visitations. Others are taken to the grocery store weekly and others to doctor appointments.
- Mobile meals are being delivered on Mondays and Thursdays of every week and we now have 4 deliveries with 4 stops.

Senior Adult Ministry:

- The monthly Senior Adult newsletter is mailed to about 130 families (September to May). The newsletter contains descriptions of upcoming activities of Venturers, Encore Fellowship, Prime Timers, and Senior Adult Fellowship Lunch. Information for Senior events and activities are also online at seniors.mdpc.org
- **Venturers:** This year's kickoff meeting with 56 attending was on September 16 at Fratelli's Restaurant with Pastor Alf Halvorson speaking about the importance of cities with biblical examples. At the October 7 meeting, 49 heard Charles Denyer talk about G. H. W. Bush and Jim Baker.
- **Encore Fellowship:** On September 20, 27 Encore members went to the Music Box and heard hits of the 60's and 70's. On October 26, 36 plan to go to the Stratford Playhouse to see *Momma Mia*.
- **Prime Timers:** On September 11, eleven went to the Museum of Fine Arts to see an exhibit of Japan's Meiji era. On October 16, six had lunch at Hungry's Restaurant.
- **Senior Adult Fellowship Lunch:** The monthly Senior Adult Fellowship Lunch is held at MDPC Café to have lunch, meet new friends, and learn more about existing friends. Lunches are on the third Monday of each month. With each lunch meeting, collections, crafts, hobbies, talents, etc. are displayed which Senior Adults

want to share with others. The September 16 meeting featured *Art.* The October 21 lunch will feature *Something You Treasure*.

• We are in the process over several months of mailing postcards and phoning (by several callers) some 450 senior church members to inform them of Seniors Lunch.

- The Stephen Ministry team met for its supervisory meeting on September 10th and again on September 24th for continuing education. Mehrnaz Gill, guest speaker from Amazing Place, presented an informative talk on Dementia with helpful Q & A afterwards.

Finance Committee Minutes:

Sep 16, 2024 The meeting was opened in prayer by Bob Holloway at about 5:19

There was a quorum present, with the following people in attendance: Marcus Vajdos, Dena Bankett, Bob Holloway, Bob Davis, Chris Arend, Kyle Wienert, Tom Braschayko, Matt Fleming. Mandy Todd and Rosy Pereira attended online.

The Aug 2024 Minutes are to be reviewed by members with any comments forwarded as needed.

Bob Davis and Marcus led the meeting, and we discussed the following topics:

- The Monthly budgets were discussed with Partners contributions currently coming in approx. \$1.07
 million ahead of budget. Marcus pointed out that in discussions with Ava, that as of this point last year,
 51% of pledges had been given through July, and as of this year, we have received 55% of pledged
 donations. We believe that this year people are giving earlier in the year and more ratably instead of
 donating more towards the end of the year. We will continue to monitor the donations as compared to the
 pledged amounts. The rest of the expenses are coming in as budgeted except for the Facilities and Tech
 which was previously discussed as we have incurred a larger expense for onsite safety officers.
- 2. Marcus then updated us on the timing of the 4 projects currently happening on the campus. The restroom remodels are open and down to just punch list items to clear up. The pickleball courts are delayed due to concrete slab curing but will be progressing throughout the month. The Monument signs will be installed in early October, and the CLC roof replacement will also be starting early October.
- 3. Marcus then reviewed the various accounts from the Balance Sheet to see where we could clean up, consolidate or spend the money in these accounts.
 - We currently have \$4.6 million is the Legacy unrestricted account
 - The Memorials Fund account has \$123k, which we have agreed will be spent over the next few years to cover the maintenance and repair costs of the main organ which is expected to cost approx. \$250k.
 - The Ministers Retirement fund has approx. \$336 invested all in the TPF, and this is operating well.

- The schools grant will go to zero in the next 1.5 years as we continue to use, expense, and account for the grants given during Covid

- The Teaching Church fund is being used to pay for Maya and Luke Funderburk salary.

- The Senior pastor fund started at \$250k and has grown over the years due to income earned at TPF. This is for Alf to spend on his projects.

- Youth Trust, we will continue to look at opportunities to spend this on the youth and their activities.

- Admin special gift, we currently use \$25-40k per year on admin expenses.

4. 2025 Budget – Marcus will start to with the staff for their input on suggested budgets. He will also ask them for suggestions on ways to save money and ask them for their wishes list. The process of budget review and approval will be like the 2024 budget process.

- Table Hosts (average of 5) Facilitate table discussion after the message: Luke, Georgia, and Matthew
- 5. **YA Connect Table Sunday Morning (Sign Up)**: Edneia and Sally explained the purpose and accountability of the connect table, which is to engage with the church between worship services. Sally, Matthew, and Edneia will handle setup and cleanup, with table hosts serving from 10:45 to 11:15. The group signed up to support as their schedules allow, and Edneia will include it on Signup Genius for email reminders.
 - YAs were asked to brainstorm a creative way they can connect with MDPC members at the table with their co-leader the week they sign up.
