Meeting was called to order. Motion was presented.

As part of the motion discussion, the team reviewed the proposal (Attachment 1), which Dan prepared through conversation and feedback with Alf and Amy. In discussion, the proposal was updated (reflected in the attachment) to clarify that the support for Moving and Resettling Expenses is a reimbursement from MDPC in order to better align with The Outreach Foundation's policies. Discussion also included The Outreach Foundation's excitement for this partnership, Bin's family's likely need for support and community after moving to Houston, Bin's initial schedule and approach to ministry, and God's seeming orchestration of this partnership with Bin through The Outreach Foundation.

Motion passed with unanimous support.

Meeting adjourned.

Attachment 1 - Proposal: Mandarin Specialist Church Planter Support – Bin Wang

Motion:

To approve a two-year commitment of support as outlined below for The Outreach Foundation China Specialist, Bin Wang, for the purpose of new church development for Mandarin speakers in the Houston area with funds from Outreach Ministry's balancing budget:

Year 1 Support
Up to \$10,000 – Reimbursement for Moving and
Year 2 Support
\$40,000 – Living Expenses

Resettling Expenses*

\$40,000 – Living Expenses \$10,000 – Medical Insurance

Explanation:

MDPC has identified Bin Wang as a potential church planter to the Chinese diaspora in the Houston area. Bin is an ordained pastor of the official church in China (CCC/TSPM) and served in China until 2020 until he and his family moved to the United States for seminary studies. In 2023, they were called to serve with The Outreach Foundation (TOF) as a liaison between TOF, the church in China, and US congregations. Bin and his family live in Charlotte, NC.

\$10,000 – Medical Insurance

Pastor Alf met Bin while traveling to China on a TOF vision trip. After spending nearly two weeks with Bin, Pastor Alf was impressed with Bin's Christian character, pastoral leadership, intercultural savvy, and passion for lost people to hear the Gospel and obey. As they shared about their ministries, Pastor Alf explained MDPC's multicultural congregations. The idea piqued Bin's interest. After the trip, Bin asked Alf to consider a partnership with MDPC for a Chinese church or congregation through MDPC.

Simultaneously, Alf, Amy, and Dan began a conversation about MDPC's future in church planting and developed plans for the Church Planting Task Force (Task Force). The Task Force is early in its work and is not ready to shape a vision for partnering with Bin. Even so, Alf, Amy, and Dan discern that God is leading us to partner with Bin through TOF for church planting. The Task Force agrees but is also not ready to lead the partnership.

Outreach Ministry's Strategic Initiatives Committee (Committee) is the appropriate team to take initial ownership of the partnership and funding. The Strategic Initiatives Committee will invite Bin to apply as a local Mandarin-speaking specialist and fund the partnership through the Outreach Ministries balancing budget.

Later, the Committee and Task Force may agree to transfer leadership to the Task Force.

In partnership with Bin through TOF, MDPC will:

- Fund Bin's work through OF as a missionary church planter in the Houston area,
- Provide pastoral and relational support to Bin and his family,
- Collaborate with Bin's vision and plan for an ECO church plant in the Houston area,
- Develop outcome metrics with Bin and assess progress,
- Provide ministry support to Bin's ministry when appropriate and available, and
- Remain flexible regarding God's leading and blessing on the above-outlined plan.

In partnership with MDPC through TOF, Bin will:

- Engage the ECO church planting assessment and coaching process within one month of moving to Houston,
- Develop an initial church planting plan with the help of ECO,
- Prayerfully discern the locations around the Houston area to focus his ministry efforts,
- Develop outcome metrics with MDPC to assess progress,
- · Work toward developing an independent church plant for Mandarin-speaking people, and
- Remain flexible regarding God's leading and blessing on the above-outlined plan.

<u>Call to Order:</u> Pastor Beth Case called the meeting of the Session of Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church to order at 6:32 pm in the Chapel. Beth opened with an update on Pastor Alf followed by a reading and the promises from Psalm 121 and prayer specifically for Alf and Shari.

<u>Call for Quorum</u>: The Clerk, Kelly Handel, affirmed that a quorum was present. A reminder was made to check in on the MDPC app!

Emotionally Healthy Leadership (Rachel Poysky)

We are in a year long conversation on The Emotionally Healthy Leader since the Session retreat—This month Rachel led us in a discussion of living into our values based on content in a book by Brene Brown <u>Dare to Lead</u>. **Know Your Values** -the values that we name are the values we should carry into every aspect of our lives with integrity. These values should be consistent across your life, especially as Christians, and should incorporate professional and personal values. The human condition is to be inconsistent. Rachel shared that she had a date night conversation many years ago that impacted her family life ever since: **What do we value, what are our priorities, and how do we arrange our lives around that?** It is important to name what is important to us and live out of those values in what you say yes and no to-- we should operate out of our values and priorities- Rachel read an excerpt from Brene Brown's book <u>Dare to Lead</u> and noted that we should pick values that are what is true for us, not what has been named *for* us!

Pick five top values from **List of Values** handout-things that are really standing out-then ultimately narrow down to two – if you have too many, you are not going to be able to fall back on them...these should be values through which decisions are made- it requires practice-your behavior should line up with your value...Do a time assessment! It's a humbling exercise to see if your time lines up with values.

We went through this exercise ourselves and then in groups 3-4 discussed *Which of the Core Values listed do we identify with most?* We were encouraged to go through this exercise with your spouse, your family, and your teams at MDPC and at work. How can you lead out of your values? Spend some time with this, prayerfully consider it and in devotional time ask God to direct you in your values.

Clerk's Report: (Kelly Handel and Joe Stockdale)

Kelly, Joe, Carla, Jennifer and Marcus will get with each department in the coming weeks to go over proposed

changes to P&O...internal deadline we are shooting for is June 30^{th} . Officer Nominations are open through August 25^{th} ; at our next meeting we will nominate from the floor.

Treasurer's Report: (Chris Arend)

Chris shared a graph of *MDPC Contributions 2021-2025*. 250K short vs 360K so making up some ground and going in right direction. Chris shared *MTD Income Statement April 2025* – we are fully staffed now which is a great thingwe could move dollars underspent on personnel to cover the buffer but can no longer- Chris asked that as departments and staff, we continue to do what we do best...to think through dollars spent and be good stewards. Question came up about credit card fees- if pay online it does cost church money- however, there is an option to cover the fees when donating. Marcus added that roughly half of the cc fees were covered by the donor in the first quarter.

Master Planning Update (Mike Handel)

Mike briefly shared composition of committee- nine at- large, he and Cheryl Moore-co chairs, Marcus, Alf, Carter from staff, plus Merriman Holt – a "Dream Team" -their job is to build a vision of the church and facility in 25 years... they have begun to put conceptual ideas out there and going back to areas for input- committee is reflective of who this church is -example is committee member, Bill McDonald, who represents the Scouts and that corner of our property – if we please 80% but off-putting to 20%, we failed. This is a series of compromises, so if everyone is a little disgruntled, then our job is well done! We are working under the umbrella of our four core principles/goals. It has become crystal clear that to be relevant in the coming years, we need more of a welcoming presence- what does this look like? From the outside/inside? We want our solutions to be "the best all things considered." Before opening up for questions, Mike mentioned that we would need to hire feasibility consultants (approved by Session first) to determine our capability. We must have good children's areas- right now we are delivering excellent programming *despite* our facilities – we want to make our facilities a part of what the ministry wants to accomplish. We are constrained by our footprint as we know. Brett brought up again what Mike mentioned- there are many that don't know about this master planning effort- some that don't come to Sunday school, that are sporadic in worship, etc. but feel like this church is their home- Brett suggested a quarterly one- pager be sent.

Many, many questions and great discussion. Please go to the website and ask questions-email link to small groups!

Legacy Update (Marcus Vajdos)

Motion to approve \$50,000 from donated Legacy General Funds for alternate architectural review. Marcus, Mike Handel, and Sandy Ballard updated us with the details of this motion. The funds have not been donated yet, so if we turn down this motion, these funds are not available to us for this specific purpose. This is a gift and highly unusual. There is a big advantage to having an outside review and to turn over all stones at this point in our plans -to look from a different vantage point - whether this review is by an architect, a consultant or both. Beth clarified that the Motion is to **receive the gift** of \$50,000 from donated Legacy General Funds for alternate architectural review. It does not need a second, but it does need discussion which we've had before a vote. Motion Carried.

- 1. The meeting was held in person and started at 5:10pm. Deena Bankett and Chistina Morse attended online.
- 2. April minutes were approved with no questions
- 3. A devotional was led by Christina Morse
- 4. Mr. Arend asked for updates from the different committees:
 - a. Generosity: Mr. Wienert noted that the group is reviewing a new phrase to be used in the new covenant campaign. There were no significant changes to giving, as noted in the email shared.
 - b. Personnel: Ms. Morse explained changes to the sabbatical policy were approved in the last meeting, and the pastor's policy was approved. Changes to the non-pastoral staff remain under discussion. The 2025 budget has not been updated to reflect the financial impact, but it will be included in the 2026 budget. A new youth leader was hired and will start on June $1^{\rm st}$.

- c. Outreach: Ms. Fernelius reported no updates other than the \$591K payments subject to approval at the meeting being held today.
- d. Clerk: Ms. Handel noted the group is working with Marcus to rebuild the legacy committee, and a treasurer will be selected to attend those meetings.
- 5. Mr. Vajdos reported on financials
 - a. 2025 YTD contributions were lower than budget by \$350K.
 - b. 2025 YTD ministry expenses are \$57K under personnel; young adult ministry will update their budget. Support ministry is over \$53K primarily due to not booking outreach components and additional value for teacher appreciation. There was also a benefits expense increase for communication and media charge for insurance. Outreach expenses are not aligned with the budget due to timing. Ms. Vajdos also noted that there is an expectation for some savings within the new insurance policy. The unrealized gains and losses could be used to address a possible shortfall when in a positive market. The facilities budget seems to be extensively managed.
- 6. Mr. Arend explained the legacy concept and suggested the committee needs to discuss and clarify how the cash is allocated and set up for the purpose of being fully transparent. Consider a 5-year budget for certain projects. Mr. Davis reminded us of the need for a list of capital projects. Denna explained that a few years ago all capital projects would come out of the legacy budget. The legacy committee will meet in June and Mr. Arend will attend the meeting.
- 7. Mr. Wienert explained the Outreach reserves an amount for "rainy" days. There was a question regarding whether the \$200K expected for church planting will come out of the Outreach budget.
- 8. New business:
 - a. Mr. Davis provided updates from the Insurance Committee. There were changes to the policy and the office building was assessed to hold the highest amount, not the sanctuary. It was assessed that the risk of all three buildings being damaged at the same time is low, and it is possible that we are fully funded to cover the insurance deductible. The highest risk for this church is considered to be fire. It was suggested that the finance department reassess the numbers to determine if we have the required amounts fully funded.
- 9. Discussion:
 - a. Deferred "Create reserve accounts spreadsheet for details that include purpose, goals, restrictions" to next month's discussion.

A motion to adjourn the April Finance Committee meeting was made at 6:40pm. Mr. Arend closed in prayer.

Attachment 1 - Proposal: Mandarin Specialist Church Planter Support - Bin Wang

Motion:

To approve a two-year commitment of support as outlined below for The Outreach Foundation China Specialist, Bin Wang, for the purpose of new church development for Mandarin speakers in the Houston area with funds from Outreach Ministry's balancing budget:

Year 1 Support			Year 2 Support

Explanation:

MDPC has identified Bin Wang as a potential church planter to the Chinese diaspora in the Houston area. Bin is an ordained pastor of the official church in China (CCC/TSPM) and served in China until 2020 until he and his family moved to the United States for seminary studies. In 2023, they were called to serve with The Outreach Foundation (TOF) as a liaison between TOF, the church in China, and US congregations. Bin and his family live in Charlotte, NC.

Pastor Alf met Bin while traveling to China on a TOF vision trip. After spending nearly two weeks with Bin, Pastor Alf was impressed with Bin's Christian character, pastoral leadership, intercultural savvy, and passion for lost people to hear the Gospel and obey. As they shared about their ministries, Pastor Alf explained MDPC's multicultural congregations. The idea piqued Bin's interest. After the trip, Bin asked Alf to consider a partnership with MDPC for a Chinese church or congregation through MDPC.

Simultaneously, Alf, Amy, and Dan began a conversation about MDPC's future in church planting and developed plans for the Church Planting Task Force (Task Force). The Task Force is early in its work and is not ready to shape a vision for partnering with Bin. Even so, Alf, Amy, and Dan discern that God is leading us to partner with Bin through TOF for church planting. The Task Force agrees but is also not ready to lead the partnership.

Outreach Ministry's Strategic Initiatives Committee (Committee) is the appropriate team to take initial ownership of the partnership and funding. The Strategic Initiatives Committee will invite Bin to apply as a local Mandarin-speaking specialist and fund the partnership through the Outreach Ministries balancing budget. Later, the Committee and Task Force may agree to transfer leadership to the Task Force. In partnership with Bin through TOF, MDPC will:

- Fund Bin's work through OF as a missionary church planter in the Houston area,
- Provide pastoral and relational support to Bin and his family,
- Collaborate with Bin's vision and plan for an ECO church plant in the Houston area,
- Develop outcome metrics with Bin and assess progress,
- Provide ministry support to Bin's ministry when appropriate and available, and
- Remain flexible regarding God's leading and blessing on the above-outlined plan.

In partnership with MDPC through TOF, Bin will:

- Engage the ECO church planting assessment and coaching process within one month of moving to Houston,
- Develop an initial church planting plan with the help of ECO,
- Prayerfully discern the locations around the Houston area to focus his ministry efforts,
- Develop outcome metrics with MDPC to assess progress,
- Work toward developing an independent church plant for Mandarin-speaking people, and
- Remain flexible regarding God's leading and blessing on the above-outlined plan.
