Faithful Fathering

2024 Funding: \$25,000

2025 Funding Recommendation: \$25,000 (Funds are not designated)

Faithful Fathering encourages and equips dads to be faithful fathers who prioritize physical presence, are engaged emotionally and lead spiritually by example. Programming helps to engage dads in raising a Godly generation that reinvigorates the Church on the fathering front.

Work Faith

2024 Funding: \$25,000

2025 Funding Recommendation: \$25,000 (Funds are not designated)

WorkFaith provides faith-based training and coaching for anyone who desires long-term employment. Their Christ-centered values, paired with a highly-structured program, help students increase their value and the confidence necessary for a successful transition back into the workforce.

Fuller Theological Seminary

2024 Funding: \$20,000 (20,000 O&A)

2025 Funding Recommendations: \$20,000 (Funds will be used as scholarships for The Antioch Ministry Experience Cohort, which offers a Master of Arts in Theology and Ministry (MATM) degree and the Master of Divinity degree in a hybrid format.

Fuller's Houston campus was founded to bring the rich programs of Fuller Theological Seminary to Texas. Scholarships to seminarians help ensure these future leaders in the Body of Christ may complete their seminary education without the burden of significant debt.

Young Life

2024 Funding: \$50,000

2025 Funding Recommendations: \$50,000 (Funds are designated as follows: \$33,000 for Greater Houston Region, \$16,500 for Next Gen Leaders, \$16,500 for Campership and \$17,000 for West Houston Young Life)

Operating on middle and high school campuses, Young Life introduces adolescents to Jesus Christ and helps them grow in their faith. Young Life's Urban Program has expanded to include chapters that minister specifically to unwed mothers, college students and students and young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The Developing Future Leaders (DFL) initiative is a comprehensive two-year leadership training program designed to recruit, train and deploy qualified Latino and African American Young Life staff throughout Greater Houston.

The Get Together

2024 Funding: \$7,500 (\$4,000 O&A)

2025 Funding Recommendations: \$7,500 (Funds are not designated)

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The Get Together is an open network of business people who gather over lunch to collaboratively use their business expertise, resources and networks to meet significant needs of local, Christ-centered nonprofits.

The Gathering of Men

2024 Funding: \$6,000

2025 Funding Recommendations: \$6,000 (Funds are not designated)

The Gathering of Men brings disciples to maturity in Jesus Christ through outreach and service. Formats for gathering include small groups and large outreach breakfasts.

Home Encouragement

2024 Funding: \$18,000 (\$5,000 O&A)

2025 Funding Recommendations: \$15,000 (Funds are not designated)

Home Encouragement strengthens marriages and encourages strong families in the Greater Houston area. They offer dinner dates for married couples, premarital training classes, as well as relationship coaching, marriage retreats, and other enrichment programs.

Casa El Buen Samaritano

2024 Funding: \$40,000 (Plus Mission Market: \$446)

2025 Funding Recommendation: \$35,500

Casa El Buen Samaritano shares the love of Jesus Christ while providing whole-person (body, soul, and spirit) healthcare to low-income and uninsured families in more than 110 zip codes in Houston and surrounding areas. Volunteer nurses, doctors and dentists treat patients for a number of general health issues. www.casaelbuen.org

Easter Seals of Greater Houston

2024 Funding: \$25,000

2025 Funding Recommendation: \$20,000; Restricted – Adult Disability Program

Adult Programs of Easter Seals Houston offer recreational opportunities to promote physical, mental and spiritual health to adults with disabilities through bi-weekly meetings, bowling, fields trips, education, self advocacy, skills training and touch based technology training. These programs offer many clients their only opportunity for socializing, and provides respite for the adult participants' caregivers. Houston Area Parkinson's Society

year of age, and fills the gap left with federal programing, to ensure that cost is not a barrier for families with limited income.

By providing a safe, home environment, they allow mothers to stay with their young children while receiving care and treatment. Santa Maria Hostel partners with more than 130 community-based organizations to provide a full spectrum of care and support to women in recovery.

*Formation/Discipleship** Grow in Christ's likeness. We want people that commit to Christ to then continue to grow emotionally, relationally, spiritually...to be transformed, conformed, reformed by the renewing of your minds.

*Service/Outreach-Go Together to Live Generously. A part of witness is sharing Christ verbally; part of the witness is service. There are a variety of ways to serve dependent on the person and particular situation.

*Evangelism/Conversations**. Know and share God's story. With this framing, everything on our agenda tonight should be looked at through these filters and the two scriptures of great commandment to love God your neighbor as

Alf opened us in prayer.

Call for Quorum: The Clerk, Kely Handel, affirmed that a quorum was present.

Vision Framing (Alf Halvorson)

We have been doing master planning for the last twelve months. Some feedback on the congregational town hall presentations has been that some felt it clinical and perhaps we are just doing this because it's been 25 yrs- What about the theology, the Bible, our call as disciples??? Should we build something based on connection, evangelism, formation, and outreach? Probably in January of 2026, we will do some vision casting for the new year. Alf shared some bad news first before the good news! The Great Commission says go and make disciples- - but it's been hard for the last 5-20 years due to the secularization of society. Some churches are languishing, some have closed. Alan Roxburgh wrote a book about this in 2015, but this has generally been the thinking for the last 20 years...when you graduate seminary, you are entering the mission field -the church is in trouble, we are going against the wind-rowing against the current-it's going to be hard. Roxburgh lifts some of the challenges: If you were born in the years 1925-1945, there is a 60% chance you are in church today, if born in 1946-1964 (Boomers), there is a 40% chance, if born in 1965-1983 (GenX), there is a 20% chance- and if born after 1984 (Millennials and Gen Z), there is less than a 10% chance you are still in church. Do you see the trend, do you see the not good news, the uphill battle? Why would we do a Master Plan when these are the statistics? We are an outlier church- growing when others are declining and there are broader indications that might give us hope. A recent study, The Quiet Revival Report, interviewed 13K people in England and in Wales- it quantified some info that we are seeing also anecdotally in the US that is encouraging: Gen Z church attendance has tripled in the last 6 years in England and Wales- we have seen an increase from 2018 to

2024 in males from 4% to 21% and females 3% to 12%. Overall, a percentage increase from 8 to 12% in adult attendance. Anecdotally in US, Tim Keller -started 30 years ago Redeemer Pres in Manhattan- at that time 1 in 100 in an office building was attending church and called themselves a Christian. When he wrapped up his ministry, 10 of 100 attending church. Before 2018 in England and Wales, it was mostly grandmothers and moms taking families to church- now it's young males leading charge in this renovation. Gen Z and millennials returning to church and asking questions about ultimate value; in the UK Bible reading has doubled from 2018 to 2024; Bible sales in the US have grown from 9.7m to 14m; some impact players culturally are now going to church- this is a change!; Gen Z buying the most Bibles and having the most chats online about what type to buy.

Why the return? In the UK, which is 10-15 yrs ahead of us in secularization, that culture is not satisfying hunger and not answering the profound questions, providing hope, and the meaning and purpose we are looking for in life. There is a phrase, especially in worship, "Ancient Future"- some want old hymns that have stood the test of time- something lasting- to be put to a new tune, beat, etc. Elite institutions are now less about studies and more about political fights and takeover of admin buildings – we are seeing a strong pushback in those going to schools –

What is solid, positive, and where can community happen?

Carrie Neuhoff – the number one use of generative AI was Ideation- now the number one use of Chat GBT is therapy or companionship. Studies find that if you are connected to a church, generally you have more close friendships and relationships - if not, people are more isolated and lonelier and looking to a bot for human relationships. Seeing an increase in male churchgoers.

Trends suggest we have leveled out and up ticking- Carrie Neuhoff's podcast at the beginning of the year – we are in revival but a retreat but by mid-year- "the revival is winning in America and Europe"-instead of having the wind at us, we are beginning to feel some wind at our back – we have a little current with us!

For 5-10 minutes in groups of 3-5, think about the area in which you are serving and ponder as leaders how you sense we are doing:

Are we ready for people to come back? Do we have staff in place to answer questions they have? Are we ready to start new small groups? Do we have answers to questions on evangelism? Do we know the Gospel ourselves and do we know how to share it? Can we help disciple – help others be transformed by Christ? Outreach-young people in particular want to serve...MDPC can connect people immediately in this way, so we are ahead of the game perhaps in this area?

Looking into the rest of 2025 and into 2026 as we contemplate a master plan, when you hear these statistics, are we encouraged by the possibilities of renovating or adding to our physical plant, and does it help us meet needs when people are coming or will come?

Clerk's Report: (Kelly Handel and Joe Stockdale)

- Kelly and Joe gave us an update on P&O Review it's going very slow, but this is due to the updating of language throughout and an emphasis on streamlining! will let you look at it before we finalize, but don't be shocked by all the changes!
- Ioe introduced our time for Officer Nominations via QR online nominations close tonight!

Treasurer's Report: (Chris Arend)

Not a lot has changed since June, the last time we met. Chris presented the MDPC reports found in packet as well as slides. He expressed that we have a talented finance committee that looks at the details and ensures we don't get comfortable – they look at anomalies and have further conversations and ask thoughtful questions. Are we comfortable with revenues and where we are spending money as of this summer? The answer is yes.

Master Planning Status Update: (Alf Halvorson and Marcus Vajdos)

Marcus updated us that two other firms will be looking at master plan and an RFP has gone out with all the data that they need to get back to us in September, with interviews with various ministries by end of year. Early January our hope is to have a final report to the congregation. Alf gave clarity to the reasoning for the extra sets of eyes on and the donated funds for this.

August 18, 2025

- 1. The meeting was held in person and started at 5:22pm. Jennifer Fernelius and Bill Enzer attended online.
- 2. June minutes were deemed acceptable for approval by consent.
- 3. A devotional was led by Dena Bankett
- 4. Mr. Vajdos asked for updates from the different committees:
 - a. Generosity: Mr. McCormack noted This year's pledge campaign theme: "Active Generosity Generosity Through Generations" with the focus on encouraging giving of time, talent and treasure. Plans to incorporate educational components beyond the fall campaign (spring activities, online resources, simplified financial reports for transparency). Online giving forecasting tools (AI-based) being reviewed by Ava and Diane for potential implementation.
 - b. Outreach: Ms. Fernelius noted there was nothing major to report. There is a discernment process underway with new partners. Mr. Vajdos asked about any discussion regarding the "Over and Above" and Julie will follow up with Amy Delgado in the next committee meeting.
 - c. Personnel: Ms. Vajdos noted there were three second interviews completed for the HR director's role. Candidates were sourced via LinkedIn Recruiter (approx. 80 applicants). One candidate identified as strong but still in discernment. Some positions were released, and job postings are ongoing. Clerk: Ms. Handel stated the group is still working on the Policies and Operations Manual but progressing slowly. The group anticipates a reduction in content (~30%). Some ministry sections may be trimmed heavily. Finance Committee review is still pending.
- 5. Mr. Vajdos reported on financials
 - a. 2025 YTD contributions currently \$112K under budget (as of July). Variance impacted by timing adjustment in budget spread. Mr. Vajdos explained that CY budget is based on PY (best year) results not the 5-years average. Other operating income is higher by \$112.7K primarily due to the recording of Unrealized Gains and Losses (URGL). The team will review the appropriate accounting guidance for accounting to URGL.
 - b. Personnel expenses are \$80K below budgeted; supporting ministry expenses were \$80K over budget primarily due to communication (employee benefits/timing). Overall operating expenses are in line with the budget. Outreach disbursements are higher than budget, mainly due to timing.
 - c. Mr. Vajdos stated the FY26 budget planning process will start in September

6. New business

- a. Mr. Vajdos explained the nature of the Teaching Church funds and asked for support to determine if these funds should be managed under Legacy or Finance. The fund was established to support the residency program and support training of ECO pastors. There are no current residents and no expected spending for the remainder of 2025. Upon discussion, it was determined Mr. Vajdos will perform further research on the business plan for the residency program and future projections needed to support the plan, including if there are any requirements to report use of these funds to the donors.
- 7. Unfinished businesses:

- a. Church buses: Mr. Vajdos noted the transaction with the new transportation company has not been finalized due to the low liability coverage. Discussions are still being held, and an update will be provided once the matter is resolved. Overall, the new services have been good.
- b. Create reserve accounts spreadsheet: No updates
- c. Discounts/Scholarships research on why no budget: No updates
- 8. Facilities & Deferred Maintenance:
 - a. Discussion of sanctuary projects: stained glass, pew reupholstery, AV/lighting upgrades, chancel renovation. Estimated costs: potentially up to \$1 million; need coordination with long-term master plan.
 - b. Past facility assessment reports exist and should be compiled for Finance Committee review.
 - c. Ongoing deferred maintenance line item exists but may require increase.
 - d. Action Items:
 - i. Locate and review facility condition assessment.
 - ii. Compile pipeline of upcoming 5–10-year capital needs.
 - iii. Consider sanctuary projects within deferred maintenance, not capital campaign.
