2023 ANNUAL REPORT

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Pastor, Head of Staff John E. Morgan

Looking back on the events and experiences of the past year reminds me of the spiritual practice of Saint Benedict's Examen where one reflects on the events of the day to notice God's presence and discern God's direction in life.

On January 28, 2023, I was installed as the Moderator of the Presbytery of Eastern Virginia. I will moderate my last meeting on January 26, 2024. It has reaffirmed my love for the PC(USA) and how much I appreciate this Presbytery. We have a strong healthy Presbytery and not everyone in our denomination can say that. In February I will become the Moderator of the Presbytery Council, which is a little like the "Session" of the Presbytery.

Leading our pilgrims on a trip to Israel in late February, early March gave me so much to reflect on. The experience was invaluable as it brought the stories of the Old and New Testament to life in vibrant colors. The impact of being there has given me new insights for preaching. But it has also made these past months more painful as I see the Palestinian people, who I met in the West Bank, suffering because of the Israeli/Gaza war. My heart breaks for the loss of innocent lives and the aggression against the people in that special place.

In June Williamsburg Presbyterian Church said goodbye to Rev. Dr. Rachel Hebert. Her eight years with us were a joy and we wished her well on her new call in Pittsburgh. But that meant we had to do some shifting of responsibilities in staff. A Williams took the Campus Ministry which he was already involved in leading. I took on the pastoral leadership of the Christian Outreach Ministry. Pam and I picked up the preaching and pastoral care needs. The Administration Ministry will report on their work to look at a new staffing model for Williamsburg Presbyterian Church.

The Session of Williamsburg Presbyterian Church also had a major transition. Our Clerk of Session for over a decade, Bill Riffer, stepped down after his faithful service. He is a faithful servant and a trusted colleague who loves this church. We welcomed Diane Schwarz as our new Clerk in June. She has done a great job, especially with all the on-the-job training (i.e. surprises). The Session gathered for a day retreat at Stonehouse Presbyterian Church in November. We studied and discussed a couple of chapters from N. Graham Standish's book "Becoming a Blessed Church: Forming a Church of Spiritual Purpose, Presence, and Power." This resulted in our revising our Session agenda to be more intentional about seeking God's guidance in our decisions and spending more time in prayer with one another.

Personally, 2023 has been a joy filled year! In addition to the powerful experience of our trip to Israel, my family experienced other significant events. I was pleased to be asked to be a guest preacher at Wells Memorial Presbyterian Church in Avalon New Jersey. Also in May, Ellen and I celebrated our 40th wedding anniversary with a weekend in Washington D.C. On Father's Day, June 18th, I was invited to New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in D.C. to officiate at our granddaughter, Sienna's, baptism. We also made it to her first birthday on November 4 in Arlington. Then, on December 28th I officiated at our daughter, Grace's wedding in Arlington VA to Dr. Ziad Achkar. These are some of the great joyous privileges I have as a pastor, husband, father, and grandfather!

I always end my report saying what a privilege it is to serve as your pastor at Williamsburg Presbyterian Church because it continues to be rewarding, meaningful and a great joy.

Though the pandemic might feel long gone, this year we continued to transition out of that period and to provide meaningful care to our members and to intentionally find ways to engage members and visitors. I am very grateful for the opportunity to serve in this role as pastor for congregational care. Caring for one another is one of the ways we live and become the Gospel. This congregation is gifted with passionate people committed to sharing God's love for one another and our community.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

We commissioned another class of Stephen Minsters, and we now have 15 Stephen Ministers: Becky McKinley, Toby Lane, CW Stacks, Pat Underwood, Ellen D'Orsogna, Ann Schulte, Karen Lee, Denise Dwight Smith, Gini Campbell, Kelly Kirkpatrick, Skip Perry, Ric Cheston, Suzanne Holiday, Elenor Knowles and Lynn Turner.

Seven Stephen Ministers currently have a care receiver. Three Stephen Ministers and their care receivers agreed it was time to close their relationship. Three Stephen Ministers serve as the ministry's leaders: Becky McKinley, Allen Hogge, and Judy Austin.

This ministry is providing Christ centered care to people in need in our congregation and community. If you know anyone inside or outside our congregation who needs care, please contact Becky McKinley, Allen Hogge, Judy Austin, or me. Stephen Minister are available to walk the journey with those who face life's challenges.

Looking into 2024. We will add two more Steven Leaders to the leadership team. I will transition to a liaison role and Stephen Ministry will become fully lay led.

PASTORAL CARE

I am grateful that members of our congregation are becoming more comfortable letting me know who needs care. Members caring for members is one of the best ways for me to learn about people's needs. The deacons are doing a phenomenal job connecting with their families, helping them reengage with the life of the church after the pandemic, and informing me of who needs a phone call or visit.

I started something new at the end of 2023. I asked our Care Connections Team, and Continuing Care Community deacons to give me a list of people to visit. I have enjoyed the opportunity to get to know our members apart from immediate pastoral needs. I will continue this approach in 2024.

GRIEF

I facilitated four journey groups totaling 15 people. Participants were both members and those from our community. These grief groups are based on the narrative approach of remembering and finding strength from our loved ones' stories. Grief never goes away. Instead, we weave grief into the tapestry of our lives.

We also have a monthly grief support group facilitated by retired pastor Bruce Minett. Attendance varies from 4-10 people. The purpose of this group is for people to come as needed. This group has begun to go out for lunch occasionally which brings about 20 people.

In addition to grief support groups, a deacon provided the Stephens Ministry grief books at appropriate intervals and the daily meditation book *Healing After Loss* by Martha W. Hickman. *Healing After Loss* is a favorite among those who have lost loved ones.

During Advent this year, Rev Julie Hester led a small group in a writing workshop. This workshop was well received and was just one more way for those grieving to transform their grief during the holidays.

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MODERATOR OF THE DIACONATE

It is a gift to me to serve with our compassionate and committed deacons. Working with Janie Moyers moderator, Copper Perry, vice-moderator, and Jo Ann Youhaus, secretary, we developed a new diaconate model to reduce the workload on our deacons, improve care for our members, and allow people to serve with their gifts. The biggest change in this new model is how we provide care for our members. All Continuing Care Communities have one or two deacons. We have a two-person team to care for those who welcome a child into the family, who are in the hospital, facing an illness or in hospice care. In addition, we have a team of three people (Care Connections) who help members stay connected to WPC. We continue to evaluate how we are providing care and adjusting as necessary.

Each year we have a Hail and Farewell potluck during our April meeting. During this meeting we thank our outgoing deacons and welcome our incoming deacons. I always enjoy the chattiness of this group. It is hard to get their attention to have the actual meeting.

In addition, I invite all the new deacons and their spouses to my house for a barbeque. It is a wonderful time of getting to know one another. We had our second Hail and Farewell Potluck during which we thanked the outgoing class and welcomed the new class. It was very well attended, and we received many positive feedback responses.

MEMORIALS

I presided over six memorials. It is a gift to share in the celebration of life of our dear members and to learn how they lived out their faith. It is always a convicting experience.

NEW MEMBERS

We received 37 new members in 2023. We have a good system of sending a letter or email after the first visit, a telephone call after the 3rd visit, and then several people helping potential new members connect with the WPC people and ministries.

We now do a New Member Orientation Luncheon. New Members sit with elders, staff, and other new members during lunch and get to know one another. Afterwards, we watch a video about how to connect with life of the church. After each section, we stop the video to give an elder time to discuss the specifics of their ministry and how people can get involved. We have received very positive feedback with this approach for new members.

MEMBER and VISITOR ENGAGEMENT

In August, we held another "What's Next" event with our church leaders and group facilitators. Eighty people attended. We covered group values, ways to best communicate the groups message, and how to foster healthy group environment and loyal volunteers. Overall, we received positive feedback but realized we need to do this event in the spring. August is too late to make any significant adjustments.

The Fall Gathering was in October due to calendar conflicts. October is not a good time. In 2024, the Fall Gathering will be the Sunday after Rally Day.

Welcoming Visitors. Martha Squire volunteered to oversee the "Welcome" cart in Stevenson Hall during coffee fellowship hour. Our goal is to intentionally welcome visitors AND MEMBERS.

WILLIAMSBURG LANDING STREAMING WORSHIP SERVICE

Fifteen people volunteer to usher at the Williamsburg Landing for the Streaming service. Dick Sahlen, Duncan McIver, and Harold Herring agreed to serve communion each month. Williamsburg Landing is very supportive on this ministry and our members and non-members are grateful to worship as a community. Thank you to everyone who serves.

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CONTINUING EDUCATIONS

I started Soul of Leadership 18-month program through Shalem Institute of Spiritual Formation. We meet each month in clearness committees*, attend four residencies in Ammerdown Retreat Center outside of Bath England, and read four books every six months. These readings are accompanied by reflection papers.

*Parker Palmer describes the "Clearness Committee," a method invented by the Quakers, that protects individual identity and integrity while drawing on the wisdom of other people. The Clearness Committee is testimony to the fact that there are no external authorities on life's deepest issues, not clergy or therapists or scholars; there is only the authority that lies within each of us waiting to be heard. The function of the Clearness Committee is not to give advice or "fix" people from the outside in but rather to help people remove the interference so that they can discover their own wisdom from the inside out." PEVA

I agreed to serve on the Commission of Ministry and served as liaison to Kirkwood Presbyterian Church and Hidenwood Presbyterian Church.

DIRECTOR OF EDUCATIONAL MINISTRIES ADRIAN "A" WILLIAMS

The mission of the Director of Educational Ministries is to further the work of WPC through service, worship, fellowship and education for children, youth and college students, as well as young adults, adults, families and intergenerational groups. Often this position is shortened to "DEM."

Engaging youth and families:

With the above goal in mind, we offered new and diversified educational opportunities in 2023:

- Confirmation class moved to Christian Education and redesigned with focus on workshop and retreats
- Online and at home Lenten devotionals introduced
- You Tube and Vlog reflections created weekly during Lent
- Returned to Children's Sunday in March
- Stations of the Cross art exhibited for visits during Holy Week
- Home summer curriculum developed for elementary age
- Third Sunday of each month established as Family Sunday

Building WPC Congregation and Community

To foster a more connected community with families, youth, and older members, we emphasized the broader definition of family and added some new programs to mix in different generations:

- Churchwide "Game Day" attracted participation from young adults.
- Youth retreats enjoyed by middle and high school students at Massanetta Springs Christian Conference Center in Harrisonville VA and Montreat Christian Conference Center in North Carolina
- Youth Conference transitioned to include intergenerational participation.
- Día De Los Muertos "All Saints" art event held
- Blessing of the Animals families celebrated their precious friends cats, dogs and gerbils felt blessed!
- Layout in the high school room changed to modernize and make a better setting for programs and gatherings.

Encouraging creativity to better understand WPC's congregation and community.

Thriving Congregations – The overall goal of Thriving Congregations is to strengthen our relationships and develop a better understanding of who we are as a church and thus our place in the Williamsburg Community. The 2023 chairman of this program is Joseph Kinard. In 2023, the DEM created and supported key programs to which all members of WPC were invited:

- Supper Seminars
- Listening Sessions
- Fall 2023 Town Hall
- Training in Montreat

Serving the college students

U Kirk Ministries- One way WPC serves college students, faculty and alumni is through UKirk, a nationwide PCUSA program. U Kirk is open to all who enjoy faith and fellowship and is formed around inclusion and diversity. This long-standing program at WPC is one way we encourage multiple entry points to church life.

Midyear 2023 brought a change in my role with UKirk Ministries as I moved into the Campus Minister role prior to the start of the Fall semester. Pastor Rachel Hébert had been in this role prior to her call to Shadyside Presbyterian in Pittsburgh, PA. Within this new role, I worked to redesign and support the ministries of UKirk here at WPC and on Campus, including:

- Visioning with Campus Ministry Team, UKirk Students, and other Campus Ministers
- Encouraging diverse entry points into the life of WPC
- Holding weekly office hours
- Supporting student led affinity groups and events that provide needed support to college age students.
- Leading weekly "Dinner & Dialogue" on Mondays
- Convening the monthly community breakfast, "Feeding Faith"

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC MINISTRIES

CHRISTOPHER BECHLER

Music awakens worshipers to the presence of God and helps to illuminate the word of God as it is read and preached. Our music ministry leads the congregation in song, offers anthems by vocal and handbell choirs, and inspires the congregation with preludes, postludes, and other special music.

Chris Bechtler, Director of Music; Norman Elton, Organist and Assistant Director of Music; and Rebecca Elton, Carol Choir Director, lead our music ministry. The music ministry includes seven ensembles and groups:

- Chancel Choir (directed by Chris)
- Sanctuary Ringers handbell choir (directed by Chris)
- Genesis Ringers handbell choir (directed by Chris)
- Westminster Ringers (college handbell choir, directed by Norman)
- Youth music program (middle and high school ages, led by Chris)
- Junior Choir (3rd through 5th graders, directed by Chris and Rebecca)
- Carol Choir (Kindergarteners through second graders, directed by Rebecca)

May the time, talent, and dedication of the professional staff and volunteers continue in 2024.

Organ Music

Organist Norman Elton continued to awaken our senses to the glory of God as he played our magnificent pipe organ at the beginning of our worship services and accompanied the choir and congregation in singing anthems and hymns.

Adult Choirs

The Chancel Choir leads worship almost every Sunday and sings on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Christmas Eve. Chancel Choir membership ranges in age from 18 to 92, including five college-age singers. The Chancel Choir added several new members to its roster in 2023, and we have also joyfully welcomed back members who had not sung with us since before the pandemic.

In December, the Chancel Choir sang a setting of "I Saw Three Ships" arranged for organ and piano, and including the children's choirs, adult handbell choirs, and guest student singers in the choir.

The Genesis Ringers handbell choir welcomed four new members in 2023. We rang in worship in the spring, fall, and in December.

In the spring, Genesis Ringers attended the Area 3 handbell festival in Roanoke, Virginia. There we rehearsed and performed music with other handbell ringers, worked with an experienced handbell director, and enjoyed great fellowship. We plan to go to the same festival in 2023 in Ocean City, Maryland.

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Sanctuary Ringers enjoy playing challenging music for small handbell ensembles. Sanctuary Ringers rang in worship several times in the spring and early summer. After one member stepped down and another moved away, we are looking for a few more experienced ringers to keep the group going.

Youth Music

The Presbyterian Youth Fellowship gathers to sing after dinner at our weekly meetings. We explore hymns and songs from many time periods and traditions, and we look forward to planning and leading music for the Youth Service coming up in the spring of 2024.

Children's Choirs

The Carol and Junior Choirs continued to grow in faith and musical experience. They sang in worship several times in the spring and fall, for our Advent/Christmas music.

The children's choirs also helped lead the music in the Family service on Christmas Eve. Rebecca Elton ran rehearsals for the Pageant during the Gather Together time at the beginning of the Sunday School hour. Any child or youth that came to Sunday School in December learned the anthem "Bethlehem Night." The Carol and Junior choirs also learned the accompanying handbell part during their weekly rehearsals. Before the Pageant, the WPC children sang an anthem, "Emmanuel Will Come," with members of the choirs playing bells.

Westminster Ringers

The Westminster Ringers, our handbell ensemble of William & Mary students led music in worship many times over the course of the year, playing challenging and interesting music from many different styles. They also performed at Grand Illumination at Market Square, in front of thousands of listeners.

Open Door Concert Series

The mission of the Open Door Concert Series is to nurture community through the presentation of the musical arts.

The Open Door Concert Series concluded its fourth season and began its fifth in 2023. This year, we welcomed a rich and diverse range of artists:

- Alcee Chris, organ (January 29);
- Presbybop jazz ensemble and Cantori chamber choir (March 19);
- Molasses Creek and Coyote folk musicians (May 7);
- Gabrielle Goodman (singer) and the Duke Ellington Tribute Band (September 24); and
- The Seamus Egan project. (November 5)

This year, 1,491 people attended the concerts.

Many enjoyed post-concert receptions in front of WPC's doors at the Richmond Road entrance, where we shared refreshments and got to meet the musicians.

Planning for the Open Door Concert series is an ongoing activity. We have most of the 2024–2025 season planned and are starting work on the next season. The Administration Ministry is committed to developing the tools for effective human resource management in its efforts to identify, develop and retain superior staff equipped to nourish, sustain, and grow a vital faith community and support the broad range of ministries of WPC. We purposefully lead and facilitate the communication of long-range strategies, developed through active participation across our church family.

The members of our ministry bring a wealth of experience to our work, extending across fields of accounting and financial management, human resources, law, and corporate management. They have knowledge of WPC, PEVA, and PCUSA organization and leadership. Over the past year we have continued to work closely with Dr. John Morgan, Pastor/Head of Staff, and Stephen Foster, Director of Finance and Administration, to provide oversight of personnel and administrative functions.

We celebrated the years of ministry of Pastor Rachel Hébert, Associate Pastor for Community Care, as she continues to grow in faith and service in accepting a call at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh. Her departure from WPC on July 1, 2023, created some reassignment of job responsibilities and increased workloads for other staff members. The Administration Ministry formed a Staffing Review working group which has been actively seeking input from the church ministries, the congregation, and other comparable churches to determine the best staffing model for our future. We hope to have results and recommendations by mid-2024.

Other major responsibilities and accomplishments in 2023 include the following:

- Proposed, recommended, and amended the contract for Pam Hrncir, from part-time Covenant Pastor of Congregational Care to full-time Designated Associate Pastor effective January 1, 2024. This is a one-year contract which can lead to a permanent call.
- Reviewed, updated, and approved the Policy and Procedures Manual. All staff members were given a copy.
- Completed a review of all job descriptions. These will continue to be updated based on any changes identified in mid-year or annual reviews.
- Service on the Strategic Financial Model Task Force by Administration Ministry members.
- Reviewed and approved any insurance policy renewals and other facility or personnel requests which impact the Administration budget.
- Reviewed and approved as necessary any Facility Use Requests.
- Continued efforts to strengthen the relationship between the WPC staff and the Administration Ministry members.
- Administration Ministry members also supported the "What's Next," Fall Gathering, and Thriving Congregations discussions.

The Administration Ministry is grateful to all the staff at WPC and the work they do every day to make WPC an inviting and welcoming church for all.

Intergenerational Ministries

The Christian Education committee continues to focus on strengthening our WPC church family by offering intergenerational opportunities designed to bring members and families from our church and community together.

• WPC Families: WPC Families events are meant for all families, all church members and guests, of all generations! Events are created with the intent to engage and entertain our youngest (and not so youngest) church members, visitors, guests, and their families. 2023 events included:

Trunk or Treat: Our Trunk or Treat event was quite successful again engaging many congregational and community participants.

The 2023 Advent Celebration was well-attended, once again being offered in the afternoon just before the Williamsburg Christmas parade. This annual event brings in children from the church and from the greater community, allowing families time to connect with each other.

In addition to these events, we continue to try to make sure that regular churchwide programming and seasonal activities are considered from the perspective of all generations and their needs. This included children's tables at a number of events, zoom lives and YouTube recordings of special services and events for those who were homebound or otherwise unable to join us onsite, at home activities for families and those in continuing care when they couldn't be at events, a community Ash Wednesday event, and worship aids for all ages including worship bags, labyrinths, prayer rocks, prayer blankets, beeswax, and alternative worship spaces.

Adult Ministries

WPC's Adult Ministries continues to serve an ever-diversifying set of needs and interests and has continued to be a motivating factor in the development of WPC's mission and vision.

• Groups which gathered regularly in 2023 included: Presbyterian Women's circles, Men's Squares, Bible and Bacon, four Sunday morning groups, five weekday bible studies, three book studies, three reading groups, two support groups, two affinity groups, two art groups, and at least three faith and fellowship small groups.

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- Gather: Young Adults Williamsburg returned to a First Friday schedule welcoming both church members and community members to join us for bowling, wine tasting, dinners, seasonal events, picnic parties and more!
- Presbyterian Women: Nine current and very active Circles meet monthly from September through May. The annual fall and spring gatherings offered special speakers and collections, which are used to support international PW grant programs. We also continued to sponsor the Gift of Christmas campaign and other programs at WPC, including our Chajul student ministry, Crockpot Ministry, Summer Meals for Kids program, FISH, and Salvation Army collections.
- New Opportunities this year included: Family Sunday School, Thriving Congregations Events, and more.

Earth Care Ministry

The Earth Care committee provides both educational and experiential opportunities for members and friends to learn more about key environmental issues. The following Climate/Environmental Justice topics were introduced during 2023. Articles in the Kirk Newsletter highlighted the PCUSA Assembly's voting on becoming a Fossil Free congregation. The articles specifically highlighted how church members can be informed of the issues and to be aware of how various PCUSA presbyteries are divesting themselves from fossils fuels and supporting green infrastructure investment. WPC member Reid Kirkpatrick's Lenten reflections on caring for creation were included in Kirk Connections electronic newsletter.

August Earth Care and Book club members partnered together to read and discuss Barbara Kingsolver's *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle*. The author documented her family's challenges to grow and buy locally produced food during an entire year. The discussion focused on how members noted how we now can buy anything, anytime and from anywhere in the world, and forget how much of an environmental cost it can be to eat out of season.

June 3rd, six of our WPC members participated in the annual Clean the Bay Day. Collectively with fifty volunteers, we cleaned up 657 pounds of trash on the Colonial Parkway along the James River. The most common items were cigarette stubs, bottles, and cans. The largest items included crab buckets and chairs.

Ten of our WPC members signed up for a guided kayak tour through a section of the Dragon Run on October 25. The Dragon Run is thirty-five miles of pristine swamp at the headwaters of the Piankatank River in the middle Peninsula of Virginia. The State has designated it as a one of the few bodies of water that has seen minimal change over the centuries since colonization of the area in the 17th century.

We always look for new members to join us in providing unique education and activity opportunities that allow us to enjoy God's creation as well as learn how we can be better stewards of its resources.

Stay tuned for our 2024 Theme on how we can be effective to help our environment.

Global Missions Ministry

WPC's international mission is active in several places in the world and includes the missionaries we help support, our sister churches, and trips taken to show and experience God's love.

Our largest efforts to date have been in Guatemala. We have two sister churches, Central Presbyterian in Guatemala City, and the Presbyterian church in Chajul. Until the pandemic, we had traveled each year to be with them for a week. Since then, we have maintained contact with both churches and were able to go back in June 2023. The team included Linda Eaton, a fluent Spanish speaker. We all noted how much easier and more rewarding the trip was with Linda along. We hope to attract other Spanish speakers before we go again.

In Congo, our missionaries are Inge and Larry Sthreshley. Larry is a health liaison who designs and manages the development of health ministries that work from the community level up through the ministry of health. Inge's work includes nutrition, home gardening, and clean cook stove missions as well as oversight of the Methodist Presbyterian Hostel, a mission guest house and small conference center. We currently send \$4000 a year in support. In addition, we have a sister church, Lokoro, in Kinshasa that we have been able to send a \$2100 donation each year.

Elmarie and Scott Parker serve in Lebanon. Elmarie is the regional liaison to Iraq, Syria and Lebanon who works to strengthen the relationship between the church in her region and the church in the US, including developing practical ministries and planning learning visits. Scott has been asked by the Middle East Council of Churches, for whom he serves as writer in residence, to lead their efforts in responding to children traumatized by unrest and war in Iraq and Syria who now are refugees in Lebanon. WPC donates \$4000 to their support.

WPC sponsored a trip to the Holy Land in February 2023. Kathy Matsushima and CW Stacks were the organizers and there were 24 participants. A report was presented to the congregation on the trip with slides of important places. We now are concentrating on praying for peace in the Middle East. We would like to find a way to encourage those Christians we met as well as all peaceful people there. All ideas are welcome!

Mission Statement: As members of the Body of Christ the Hunger and Homeless Team enables members of Williamsburg Presbyterian church to support local agencies uniquely qualified to serve those in need, with emphasis on housing and food insecurity, through volunteering and providing financial assistance.

Agencies supported by H&H in 2023 (total amount given was \$49,450):

The Summer Meals for Kids program is supported financially through designated funds.

In addition to WPC's support of these agencies the Hunger and Homeless Team held the following events and activities which gave members of our congregation and community an opportunity to serve and donate.

Salvation Army Bell Ringers: WPC had 19 one-hour shifts staffed over 3 days with 16 volunteers.

Community of Faith Mission: WPC staffed the Winter Shelter for three nights in December 2022 at three churches; 32 WPC volunteers served an average of 16 guests per night. This winter (2023) WPC hosted the Winter Shelter over the New Year's holiday.

Peninsula Habitat House, January 25, and August 23: In January seven volunteers worked on a house, and in August five volunteers worked on a new style of house.

Food Drives: April 29, WPC's food drive successfully collected approximately 1,500 pounds of food for House of Mercy, FISH and Grove Christian Outreach. **June 17, WPC** collected 1,000 pounds of food for the Summer Meals for Kids program.

Offering of Letters: In May, WPC members sent 50 letters to our senators and representatives on behalf of Bread for the World, which provides food to needy Americans. The letters encouraged support for the Farm Bill before Congress.

Summer Meals for Kids: WPC finished another summer serving 14,355 meals to 270 children. 400 volunteer hours were given.

Day of Caring, September 15: WPC provided 24 volunteers who worked around the Grove neighborhoods repairing decks and making other improvements for some of our senior friends. Work was done in the Grove Outreach Center, including yard work.

Habitat, Eastern Shore, Oct. 19-21: This year WPC had 13 people attending with a large variety of work accomplished. WPC has been involved with the Eastern Shore Habitat for 18 years.

Rise Against Hunger, Oct. 14: WPC packaged over 55,296 meals with 208 volunteers. Volunteers representing 9 different organizations and 121 WPC members. Financially we began the year with \$17,972.18. WPC raised \$25,748.00 from October 1 to November 10 which included \$1,000 from Kiwanis Club and \$5,000 from Synod of the Mid-Atlantic. WPC paid Rise Against Hunger \$22,143.54, leaving a current Balance of \$21,576.64 to be used to support our 2024 fall event. A plaque is hanging in the Welcome Center commemorating WPC having packaged over 500,000 meals over the past ten years.

Crock Pot Ministry: Together with other churches, the Crockpot Ministry served five locations, providing 92 meals per month. WPC Presbyterian Women Circles and individuals donated ingredients for over 200 meals this year.

FISH: In 2023 WPC donated 366 bags of food.

From-His-Hands, Hotel: WPC served a total of 189 meals to homeless staying in several area hotels.

From-His-Hands, Grove: Two WPC teams prepared and served 100 meals for Grove Christian Outreach.

Kirk Krafters meetings are open to all crafters who enjoy knitting, needlepoint, and crocheting. The Kirk Krafters presently have 18 members and we welcome new members all year long.

Monthly meetings are held the second Tuesday of the month at 1:30 in the WPC library. Projects include hats, scarves, lap robes, prayer shawls, baby blankets and twiddle mitts that are given to our congregation and others.

90 hats, 10 scarves, 15 baby blankets and 6 lap robes were given during the Christmas season to FISH, Grove, and the House of Mercy.

25 children's hats and 6 prayer shawls were given to our mission in Guatemala.

Prayer shawls mainly go to members of our congregation who may need some warmth and comfort in a time of worry or loss.

It's been a little over two years since WPC began sponsoring the Safi family from Afghanistan. The two children are in the 5th and 6th grade. The father has been working weekdays at a local warehouse and on weekends at a coffee shop. The mother is a homemaker.

To help them with their schoolwork and knowledge of English, WPC has provided weekly tutoring for the children. The children played on Legacy soccer teams for their age group, took swimming lessons this past summer, and attended day camps. The committee provided transportation to these activities.

The children have a working knowledge of English. The parents are struggling to learn. Both have been offered classes and tutoring at Literacy for Life.

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The committee has been working closely with William and Mary Law School to file all paperwork necessary for permanent immigration status.

The family has been paying ³/₄ of their rent and all utilities for the past several months. The goal: to have them be responsible for all expenses beginning March 1, 2024.

Tutoring Ministry

The impetus for the Tutoring Committee came from observation of the number of Hispanic families attending the Trunk-or-Treat event sponsored by the Christian Education Ministry. The idea was amplified by information regarding the decline of test scores of students being taught by remote learning during the pandemic; students of color showed a much higher decline than white students.

A committee was formed to further study the concept. The concept was refined from mini workshops to a pilot in-school tutoring program. Current school safety requirements make it very difficult to obtain permission for students to leave the school property.

Matthew Whaley Elementary School responded to our inquiry asking if help was needed. Anya Bobrinskaya the LIEP coordinator for Matthew Whaley, provided the names of two second grade teachers who wanted help with math and literacy. Ralph Simmons, Stephanie McGuire and Linda Eaton worked with Amanda Venable, and Harley Stewart and Meg Calderwood with Sarah Shay.

On March 12, a Minute for Mission describing the Tutoring Outreach Mission was presented to the congregation by Linda Eaton. The overview described the need for tutors at Matthew Whaley, the process for becoming a volunteer, what the commitment to tutoring would involve (generally 2-3 days a week for 1–2 hours each day) ending with a specific example of the level of function of some of the identified students. Concurrently Sherry Volk, WPC Director of Communications, created a visual display for the lobby and an outline form on which interested members could register. Fifteen volunteers responded!!

In May, an online survey was sent to all Matthew Whaley teachers who had helped with the pilot and all volunteer tutors. The responses were universally positive with 85% of the volunteers wanting to continue to volunteer and teachers requesting more weeks of volunteer help. Small buckets of roses were presented to the cooperating faculty.

Two WPC members tutored at the Williamsburg-James City County LIEP Summer School at James River Elementary School, Ralph Simmons in fourth grade and Linda Eaton in Kindergarten. Summer school classes ran Monday through Thursday, July 10-27.

Starting fall of this year, the requests by teachers from Matthew Whaley for tutoring volunteers increased from four to twelve (300%). We were able to place eight tutors.

We were unable to participate in Trunk-or-Treat this year because of illness on the part of three of the participants. Also, sadly the son of tutor Meg Calderwood, passed away. Meg is not tutoring for the present and we send her our profound condolences.

Debbie Muse, a new member, has volunteered to tutor with Sarah Shay. Welcome Debbie. Also, Sareem Pillai, a student from William & Mary, is volunteering in Math with Christine McBee (4th grade).

We have had an encouraging and joyful year. We are always looking for ways to best serve some of the students in need in our church area. A poinsettia was dedicated to our volunteer tutors – many of whom responded with beautiful examples of joy in God's work.

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Special Offerings Ministry

WPC collects two special offerings each year – One Great Hour of Sharing is presented in the spring and Christmas Joy Offering in December.

One Great Hour of Sharing supports three programs- Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People. Amount collected: \$22,025. Christmas Joy Offering provides financial support to church workers and their families who face unexpected needs while the remaining 50% of the offering targets Presbyterian-related schools and colleges and assists students in need of scholarship funding. Amount collected: \$10,221.

ENDOWMENT FUND AL THOMAS

Several WPC members and staff volunteer to manage the WPC Endowment Fund. Committee members, in addition to myself, include Martha Squire (Elder), Hank Vernon, Joseph Kinard, and Jim Austin. Pastor John Morgan is an ex-officio committee member and provides valued guidance and support. Stephen Foster provides accounting for Fund assets, and Vanessa Gamble and Martha Reier provide administrative support.

ENDOWMENT FUND

The Endowment Fund was originally established by Session in August 2014 and revised in October 2018 to include three accounts. The **Charitable Account** supports worthy community organizations requesting funds for programs not within our WPC budget. The **Ministries Account** supports existing or planned projects/programs within our WPC budget. The **Buildings & Facilities Account** supports projects or projects not covered by the WPC Capital Reserve Fund.

Each year, 4 percent of the Fund value, based on an average of the last three years' ending value, is available for grants. Donors may assign gifts to or among the three accounts at their discretion. Gifts not assigned by the donor are divided equally among the three accounts. The Endowment Fund Resolution establishing the Fund may be obtained from the Church office.

ENDOWMENT FUND ASSETS YEAR END 2023

The Endowment Fund ended the year 2023 with assets totaling \$796,679. The Fund was established in 2014 with about \$25,000. By the end of 2018, its value had grown to \$127,200. Then, in 2019, a generous donor offered to match financial gifts to the Endowment Fund up to \$250,000. As a result of the prayerful and generous response of our Church members and friends, the "Gift of a Lifetime" matching campaign during 2019 was a complete success—resulting in donations exceeding \$500,000 being added to the Fund.

INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT

In 2019, the Endowment Committee selected the New Covenant Trust Company (NCTC), which is an investment management subsidiary of the Presbyterian Foundation, to manage the three funds.

TOTAL GRANTS AWARDED IN 2023

<u>During 2023</u>, five grants were awarded from the **Charitable Account** totaling \$17,000; three grants were awarded from the **Ministry Account** for \$3,576, and two grants from the **Building & Facilities Account**, totaling \$3,267. The grants awarded are as follows:

From the Charitable Account:

- Williamsburg Area Faith in Action for general operating expenses and to recruit new volunteers for the program.
- **Hospice House of Williamsburg** for bereavement services supporting families that are facing the loss of a loved one.
- Respite Care Center of Williamsburg to provide respite services for dependent seniors and social engagement for persons with early to moderate dementia.
- Massanetta Springs Conference Center as Williamsburg Presbyterian Church's contribution to their Capital Campaign.

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• **Virginia Peninsula Foodbank** funds to be used to replace shelving systems devoted to children's portable food bags.

From the Ministry Account the following awards were granted:

- Legacy Giving Program for initial start-up funds and to conduct an educational luncheon.
- Congregational Care for the What's Next Seminar program to equip congregational leaders in the future ministries of WPC.
- WPC Deacons for a "90th and Over Birthday Celebration" scheduled for April 2024.

From the Building & Facilities Account the following awards were granted:

- New improved **Audio-Visual equipment** for the sanctuary.
- New **Organ Cabling** in the sanctuary

GRANTS AVAILABLE IN 2024:

As the fund continues to grow though generous contributions and investment growth the amount available for grants increases each year, the total grant funds available in 2024 is \$31,751. The total amount available for grants from the **Charitable Account** in the year 2024 will be \$21,861. The **Ministries Account** will have \$4,292 available for grants and the **Building & Facilities Account** has \$5,599 available.

GRANT APPLICATION PROCEDURE:

The Endowment Committee welcomes applications for 2024 grants. Accomplishments during 2023:

- Coordinated fund raising efforts of various church groups during the year, so they did not overlap or conflict.
- Established a Legacy Giving team to encourage individuals to give gifts during their lifetime, such as a gift of appreciated stock and deferred bequests and estate gifts.
- Legacy Giving presentations made at church and remotely.
- Conducted an internal financial review of the financial activities, policies, and procedures at the church.
- Raised funds for Massanetta Springs conference center renovation
- Approved a petty cash procedure for church staff.
- Level II Study of the Capital Reserve Plan that included an onsite visit and walk through to update the list of items in the Capital Reserve plan.
- Provided a Financial Outlook and Status message to Session each month.
- Updated the church Gift Policy.
- Conducted an annual stewardship campaign to encourage members to renew and increase their pledges.
- Solicited from each ministry its budget request for 2024.
- Prepared an Operating Budget to fund the Ministry requests with the income available.
- Reviewed financial information monthly and compared it with the budget.
- Managed financial resources of the church.

STRATEGIC FINANCIAL MODEL PROJECT STATUS HANS SCHWARTZ

Project goal

Establish a Funding and Financial Operating Model to achieve balanced WPC budgets over the long term, identifying strategies necessary for implementation

This goal has not yet been achieved.

Since 2020 our church has been operating with annual budget deficits. We have been covering our budget shortfalls by drawing down our savings. Continuing to do so is not sustainable, particularly considering projected rising costs. While our ministries continue to carefully manage costs, additional income is needed now, and in the future, to close the gap and to support our staff and ministries.

We have seen positive gains in non-pledge offering, interest earnings and facility rentals. However, these areas are small in comparison to our shortfall in Pledge income, which supports 85 percent of the annual budget. If income does not grow sufficiently, it is clear that tough decisions will be necessary for reductions in staffing and program costs to balance the budget.

Progress in 2023

The focus of the Strategic Financial Model project in 2023 was on the following initiatives:

- 1. Align staffing level and personnel expenses with WPC mission to achieve an appropriate spending level within the total general operating budget
 - <u>Why this matters</u>: seeks to establish staff spending levels (now close to 60% of the operating budget) in consideration of both generally accepted guidelines and the need to support WPC's mission **Status: Administration Ministry is reviewing staffing needs to support our missions** within the framework of the number of active church members and the long term financial position of the church. This work is being done by actively seeking input from the ministries and the congregation. Recommendations are anticipated by mid-2024.
- 2. Implement a legacy giving program and campaign to strengthen WPC long term reserves

 Why this matters: grows legacy and bequest giving with flexibility to direct funds toward addressing our financial priorities and challenges.

Status: Legacy Giving program was launched in May. This program is designed to provide for the long-term mission of the church, ensuring there is funding for new ideas and initiatives while also extending existing programs. This fund is intentionally different than our Endowment Fund, as gifts to the Legacy Giving Fund are unrestricted. Accumulated funds will be applied to the evolving priorities and challenges of our church. As Legacy Giving increases, we expect this program will help to build a solid foundation for our future. 3. Form a small, permanent team for visitor engagement

<u>Why this matters</u>: local visitors who do not feel welcomed and valued are more likely to visit other churches and not return to WPC. We want our visitors to stay and support our membership growth. **Status: Streamlined Friendship Register new visitor processing; implemented rapid follow-up with all visitors who provide contact information (phone, email or mailing address); implemented** **dedicated visitor engagement team.** If you are interested in participating on one of these teams, please contact Pam Hrncir.

Prior Project Progress

Since project commissioning in 2021 the following initiatives have been implemented to improve our financial situation. These prior activities will take time to produce their anticipated full results.

- New investment approach for increased risk/reward for the Capital Reserve with the intent of increased returns.
- Take a renewed approach to our annual stewardship campaign, beginning 2022.
- Realign church office and support staff responsibilities for improved effectiveness.
- Improve pre-membership engagement and new member class.
- Communicate our financial position to the membership.
- Align outreach benevolence to member generosity by setting the budget equal to seven percent of prior-year total ordinary income. Note: 2023 budget presently frozen at 2022 level to address rising costs in other areas.
- Implement policy that directs undesignated bequests to the capital reserve fund, until the fund reaches a level to be self-sustaining, and the entire set-aside can be eliminated from the WPC Operating Plan thereby freeing up cash flow for use in other areas.

What we have learned since 2021

- WPC total giving per person, as measured by-member or by-attendance, lags that of peer churches
- Giving to designated funds, instead of unrestricted giving, limits our ability to address our financial challenges
- Pledge income grew from \$1,130,391 in 2019 to an estimated \$1,297,359 in 2023, an average of 4% per year, and is not keeping pace with our expense growth. The number of pledges has declined while membership has remained the same.
- Costs in the two largest areas of spending have increased
 - Staff and personnel costs, including salary and benefits (i.e., health insurance) have increased
 26%, or \$184,000 since 2019. This category now represents 59% of our spending, up from 57% in 2019; and does not include contractor positions funded by the ministries.
 - Costs for facility maintenance services and utilities have increased 11%, or \$26,000. This category represents 17% of our spending, down from 18% in 2019.
- Increasing the balance of the capital reserve fund would allow WPC to reduce or eliminate the capital reserve set-aside from the operating plan, freeing up cash flow
- Ministry discretionary budgets have been held flat for the past few years, perhaps stifling innovation
- Visions of significant facilities rental revenues are not viable. Without a dedicated adjacent parking lot, the hope for large events in Stevenson Hall is not realistic when compared to alternatives in our immediate vicinity.

What is next for 2024

- Continuing progress to align staffing level and personnel expenses with WPC mission to achieve an
 appropriate spending level within the total general operating budget. Administration Ministry is
 leading this work.
- 2. The coordinating committee to consider initiating work to develop a long-term strategy that increases WPC relevance to the greater Williamsburg community.

<u>Why this matters</u>: to sustain and grow membership it is essential to continuously align WPC programs and ministries with the interests of the evolving Williamsburg population demographics.

This activity will identify selected population segments, WPC strengths and develop messaging and actions necessary for increased population engagement with WPC. If you are interested in participating in this work, please contact a member of the coordinating committee.

The coordinating committee will continue to monitor WPC income and expense progress toward achieving a balanced budget and will make recommendations to our ministries or Session when necessary.

Rebecca, Ruth, Nancy, Joan, Harley, and Gini coordinate various aspects of WPC worship as noted above and their reports are as follows:

Usher/Greeter Report

The WPC Greeters and Ushers created a welcoming and caring environment each Sunday morning as inperson worship attendance increased steadily during 2023.

- WPC had a group of 89 members, regular visitors, and friends of WPC who served as Ushers/ Greeters during 2023, thirteen of whom served for the first time.
- Ric Cheston joined the Worship Ministry team as co-coordinator of the Ushers and Greeters.
- In November 2023, an additional Greeter position was added at the Richmond Road entrance before the 11am service.

Flower Guild Report

The Worship Ministry's Flower Guild provided flowers to enhance the WPC worship experience all throughout the year.

- There are currently nine members of the WPC Flower Guild.
- The Flower Guild coordinates the weekly presence of flower arrangements donated by WPC members.
- On World Communion Sunday the Guild coordinates members providing home-baked bread for the Communion Table.
- The Guild also provides seasonal wreaths, Christmas and Easter decorations, and decorations for Palm Sunday, Pentecost, and harvest time.
- The Guild's ad hoc Christmas decorating committee's membership, which decorates the Sanctuary and Stevenson Hall, has risen to fifteen and continues to be a success.
- The Guild coordinates with the Diaconate to provide lilies and poinsettias, donated by the Congregation, to WPC families unable to attend services at Easter and Christmas.

Communion Servers and Communion Preparation Report

WPC served communion thirteen times during the 2023 calendar year on dates established by Session in its Standing Orders.

- During Sunday morning worship, sixteen servers secured by the communion server coordinator share the Lord's Supper. Servers are Elders or Deacons at WPC or their previous churches. Servers are sought through direct email communication between the coordinator and the Elder or Deacon.
- In the Spring of 2023, a brief orientation on communion serving details was shared during WPC new Elders and Deacons officers training. To encourage more members, who are eligible, to sign up and take part in the serving of communion information with communion, dates and early sign up was also distributed through email to all currently serving Elders and Deacons.
- For safety, serving guidelines were revised to include that all servers use the handrails on the stairs when going to and from the communion table in the chancel.
- The Communion preparation team sets up the elements for use on the Communion Table and the balcony for both Sunday services.

Liturgist Report

Liturgists made announcements and scripture readings at 50 Sunday Services with the exception of UKirk and Youth Sundays.

- WPC had a committed group of 63 volunteer liturgists in 2023, eight of whom were new members. Liturgist duties are evenly distributed so that liturgists generally have a ten month interval between assignments.
- To ensure the safety of our liturgists, all have been instructed to use the handrail when proceeding to the lectern.

Sharing Faith with the Children

This year the Worship Committee has added the responsibility of scheduling leaders for the 11 AM Service "Sharing Faith with the Children" time. Gini Campbell volunteered to assume these duties and schedule leaders on a monthly basis.

WPC DIACONATE JANIE MOYERS MODERATOR

The diaconate is experiencing its first year under a new model developed by Pastor Pam Hrncir and Past Moderator Ellen Peters, with Moderator Janie Moyers, Vice Moderator Copper Perry and Secretary Jo Ann Youhas. We are focusing on including the congregation in our ministry and strive to include more volunteers in many of our ministry and care teams. We have shifted from a model in which every family is assigned a deacon to a new model where care and ministry groups better serve those in need. We have moved Confirmation to Christian Education Ministry and terminated the Family Deacon committee. At this time, we have 7 CARE teams and 6 MINISTRY teams. There are 33 deacons.

The goal of this new diaconate model is to provide better care and reduce the workload for the deacons.

Care Connections is a new team, following in the tradition of the Family Deacon program. We intend to minister to those members who, through unavoidable circumstances, are less connected to the church than previously.

2023 has been a year of building and evolving. As we move into 2024, we are still seeking to identify members who may desire a connection to a Care Connections team member, and we're still seeking volunteers to be part of our team.

We began our work with a list of 19 individuals identified by current and out-going Deacons. Today, we have 36 members on our list. Two people on the original list have transitioned to the care of the Grief team.

Members and visitors enter the sanctuary week after week seeing different fresh flowers placed in honor of loved ones past and present, near and far. Immediately, our hearts are filled from taking in the pop of color and sweet soft scent the array of blooms brings us. I see smiles on the faces of those seated in the pews as they admire the elegance of the flowers. Many take photos at the end of a service and even step up closer and drink in the delicious smell of roses, lilies, mums, and freesia.

The worship services end but the joy brought by the flowers has just begun. A small team of volunteers take turns breaking down the large arrangement into multiple smaller arrangements to be delivered to members later in the week. But why?

Feelings of isolation, loneliness, sadness, and doubt can easily take over when one is not able to come to church for worship. While we have many online viewers worshiping from home, there can still exist a feeling of disconnect. The visits that accompany the delivery of a small arrangement bring that connection back and let others know we care and they are not forgotten.

The restored hope and sense of gratitude on a recipient's face when they open their door as they are greeted by a volunteer holding a small arrangement made up of the same flowers from the service earlier that day is one of the purest ways to share God's love.

"You brought those for me? You thought of ME? You remembered ME?"

We reply, "Yes, we remember you. We care about you, we treasure you, and we want to share God's love with YOU."

We often receive notes expressing appreciation for these small tokens of love. Here are a few quotes from these notes:

"You thought to bring us flowers? That means so very much!"

"Having them here will vastly improve my state of mind."

"A visit and a bloom lifts my heart and spirit far more than any medication." "A small gesture with a huge impact. Bless you."

Sure, it is just a few flowers. But such a simple gesture means so very much. And it is not only the recipients that feel uplifted, but the volunteers too. We often hear that it is better to give than to receive. The warmth of sharing a few moments with someone that receives an arrangement fills our spirits with God's love and goes a long way to healing a hurting heart. Simply stated, it is good to do good for another child of God. A couple hours of our time on a Sunday means the world to the handful of members each week that receive arrangements and a visit.
