PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION


Leader: Gracious God, we pause for a moment, to pay attention to the gift of breath, which is as ancient as we are old, as new as this morning's dawn. (Pause)

PSALM 51







These stanzas, excerpted from quite a few more, offer a reminder that the model for our dealings with others should be God's generosity rather than limited human tolerance. The text is effectively set to a broad and sturdy Dutch folk melody, probably from the 17th century.

Purge me from my sin, and I shall be pure; wash me, and I shall be clean indeed. Make me hear of joy and gladness, that the body you have broken may rejoice. Hide your face from my sins, and blot out all my iniquities. (Refrain) Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me, Do not cast me away from your presence, and do not take your holy spirit from me. Give me the joy of your saving help again, and sustain me with your bountiful Spirit. (Refrain) Deliver me from death, O God, and my tongue shall sing of your goodness. O Lord, open my lips and my mouth shall proclaim your praise. (Refrain) For in sacrifice, you take no delight, burnt offerings from me you would refuse, The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit; a humble, contrite heart you will not spurn. (Refrain)

SERMON

The Secret of the Lord's Prayer

INVITATION TO THE OBSERVATION OF THE LENTEN DISCIPLINE (responsive)

Leader: Beloved in Christ, at the time of the Christian Passover we celebrate our deliverance from sin and death through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Lent is the season of preparation for this great celebration, the means by which we renew our life in the Paschal mystery. We begin our Lenten journey by acknowledging our need for repentance, for in penitence, we name those things which damage us and others for what they really are, and we open ourselves to the One whose love knows no boundaries and whose mercy is demonstrated to us in the life of Jesus Christ. By taking an honest look at our lives and repenting of our foolishness; by praying quietly but with full hearts; by letting go of those things that harm us and by taking on works of love for others; by reading and feasting on God's Word, we observe a holy Lent, and prepare ourselves to come to our God.

Before Christ, let us confess our sin, how it is with our life, and our lives together:

Leader: Holy God, Holy Mighty, Holy Immortal, you are one who guards and guides our way.

All: Have mercy upon us.

Leader: To follow you is to trust you in paradox; that from a broken, aching heart,

All: rises a healing and hopeful heart.

Leader: that out of weakness and vulnerability,

All: grows the quickening of Christ's Love.

Leader: that in darkness and despair,

All: the radiance of Christ's Light shines.

Leader: Holy God, Holy Mighty, Holy Immortal, we fail to follow you; we turn away.

- All: Forgive us, we pray.
- Leader: As certain as the morning sun that rises, you are here, Lord.
- All: Forgive us, we pray.

KYRIE (responsive)

Leader: Lord, have mercy.

People: Christ, have mercy.

All: Lord, have mercy.

LITANY OF PENITENCE (responsive)

Leader: This day. This Evening.

All: There was evening, then morning, the first day. And it was good. Very good.

Leader: This day. This Evening. Ashes to Ashes. Dust to Dust.

All: We are grounded in the Source of All Being. This day. This Evening.

Leader: For needing evidence for every holy matter, and wanting none for our indifference to all injustice,

All: Forgive and accept our repentance.

Leader: For failure to speak and praise your name alone and that we do not make a defense for the hope that is within us,

All: Forgive and accept our repentance.

Leader: Restore us, O God.

All: Favorably hear us, for your mercy and forgiveness are great.

INVITATION TO ASHES

Leader: We will continue our journey to Easter with the sign of ashes. Tonight, you will be marked with ash and in the sign of a cross. You will hear the words from Scripture, "From dust you came. To dust you shall return. Be at peace." This ancient sign and ritual speaks of the frailty and uncertainty of human life, the truth of our impermanence and the need for Christ's love and light.

The sign with which we are marked reveals our desire to live repentant lives, individually and as the gathered beloved community, and our hope in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

In the name of Christ, we are invited to observe a holy Lent by self-examination and self-emptying love with practices of prayer and fasting; with works of loving kindness and mercy; and by meditating on God's good Word, ancient and new.

PRAYER OVER THE ASHES

Leader: From dust we came, to dust we shall return; and even yet, we sing "Alleluia" at the grave because death is not the end, only a sign of an impending resurrection. May these ashes tonight be for us a sign of our mortality, a desire for repentance, and a reminder that only by your gracious gift are we given everlasting life through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

This evening's prelude is a setting of a hymn written by Martin Luther in 1538. Luther wrote the text, paraphrasing the Lord's Prayer. The title translates simply, "Our Father in Heaven". He paired it with an existing secular tune. Our prelude is an adaptation of that tune by Friedrich Wilhelm Zachau (1663-1712), a German musician and composer.
