- 1. Why do we find it uncomfortable to identify conduct as "good" or "evil"? Why do churches struggle with those distinctions?
- 2. What is the basis of John saying Cain was of the evil one and that his deeds were evil?
- 3. Do you feel more comfortable declaring someone's deeds evil or someone's deeds righteous? Why?
- 4. Christians are commanded to love one another. Do you find every Christian lovable? How do we reconcile that?
- 5. John establishes a connection between Jesus' love for us and our love for one another. (v16). What is the connection? Then John gives a test to show whether we have that kind of love (v17). What is that test?
- 6. What excuses might be given for not helping another Christian in need? Are those valid?
- 7. If we have the capacity to meet that need but don't, how does Jon evaluate that person? What encouragement does John give to help one another inverses 19 to 22?
