About Warden & Vestry Elections

For the warden elections for 2024, parishioners will be asked to elect one candidate for a 2 year term.

For the vestry elections, parishioners will be asked to elect 4 candidates total: 3 to fulfill 3 year terms, and 1 to fill a vacant seat.

Candidates' statements and videos will also be posted on St. Luke's website.

There will be a special opportunity to meet and greet candidates at coffee hours on Sundays January 7 and 14, 2024. The Annual Parish Meeting and announcement of election results will be on Sunday, February 4, 2024.

Elections this year will once again be held online. Election packets will be sent to parishioners in good standing via email and snail mail. Please look for your ballot on or around January 9. Michael Cudney (current incumbent)

Hello, I'm Michael Cudney, and I'm currently finishing up my first term as a warden here at St Luke in the Fields. It has been a privilege to serve this wonderful faith community for the last two years. I am very grateful for all of you who have put your faith in me to help lead our congregation.

We've all heard of stewardship as giving of time, talent and treasure. For myself, I've been able to give my time having been retired for six years now, from working in the classical music business. My childhood church eventually closed when I was a senior in high school, and seeing how my fellow council-members' faith aided them during that time left a powerful mark. As a vestry member at Saint Luke's, I hope to use my faith as a lantern along the decision-making path.

I hope that by being an earnest listener and eager question-asker I can help guide the future of our parish, especially in this time of inflation and change as we hope to plan for the coming years. I hope to emphasize thoughtful listening and a collaborative mindset in my approach to the vestry's work. I believe that my unique talents and my own perspective will be a boon to the vestry and St. Luke's as a whole.

I first came to St. Luke's on All Saints Day in November 2021. My grandparents are interred in St. Luke's, despite never stepping foot in our church.
