Dear Faithful Discerner,

Since ancient times, the Catechumenate has been a way of intentionally welcoming adult converts into the Church through a period of intentional prayer, fasting, and Christian education. Today the Episcopal Church carries on this tradition in various ways by inviting all people to find a home within its expression of Christ's One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church. While being Christian in the present world may feel different than the first century, our experience remains grounded in the quest for spiritual growth, and a renewed sense of belonging to the divine life of God in Christ.

The Catechumenate Program (also known as the Adult Formation Program) at St. Luke's is designed to prepare adult parishioners for Baptism, Confirmation, Reception, or the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows at the Easter Vigil. The shape of this process is formed by the values and practices of the Early Church, as both a journey of initiation into Christ's Body and continued growth in the same. The Catechumenate Program is a way for people to find their way "home" to St. Luke's. Whether you are coming from another tradition, no tradition, or a life-time with the Episcopal Church, we invite you to explore a deeper life of discipleship with us.

The program consists of three parts (more details can be found within this packet). The first part, The Discovery Series is open to anyone interested in the subject matter. The latter two parts are for those who have completed the Discovery Series and wish to proceed as candidates to be presented to the Bishop at the Easter Vigil.

All candidates are paired with a sponsor who will introduce them more deeply to the life and ministries of St. Luke's. Candidates are expected to attend all four sessions of the Discovery Series and to participate in all subsequent meetings of the program. This includes full participation in the liturgies of Holy Week.

All inquiries about the program are welcome. We hope you will join us as you feel the Holy Spirit at work in your life of faith.

Who participates in the Catechumenate Program?

At St. Luke's, we offer intentional preparation for the following sacramental initiation or ritual milestones in the Christian life:

Adult Baptism: This sacrament is intended for adults who (at least to their knowledge) have never been Baptized, and wish to become full members of the Church.

Adult Confirmation: This sacrament is intended for those desiring to make a mature declaration of their faith (always proceeding Baptism, especially when administered as a child).

Reception: For those who have been baptized and confirmed who seek to be received or ceremonially welcomed into the communion of the Episcopal Church.

Renewal of Baptismal Vows: For those wishing to renew or reclaim their faith, in some cases after a time apart from the life of the Church.

Candidates participate in the program together as a cohort throughout the entire process. Sponsors are chosen for each candidate in reflection on their unique spiritual journey and needs.

All are welcome to speak to a member of the clergy to discern what step might be right for you.
