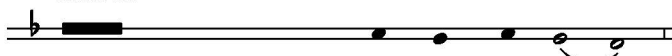

THE HOLY GOSPEL *Luke 2:22-40*

Deacon The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, “Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord”), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, “a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.” Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord’s Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, “Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.” And the child’s father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, “This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed- and a sword will pierce your own soul too.” There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

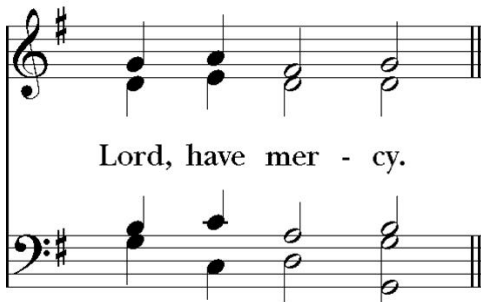

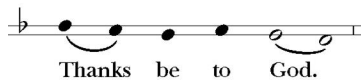

About the music at today's service

Sir George Dyson, composer, teacher, organist and administrator was born in Halifax, Yorkshire, England in 1883. He spent four years (1904-8) in Italy and Germany on a Mendelssohn Scholarship before embarking on his career as music master at a succession of public schools, including Rugby, Wellington and Winchester. He taught at the Royal College of Music (where he had been a student under Stanford) before becoming in 1937 the College's director, a post he retained until 1952. He died at

Winchester in 1964.

The composer Caroline Shaw was the youngest recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for Music for her composition *Partita for 8 voices*, and is also possibly the only choral composer who can say she has collaborated with Kanye West. Her music is renowned for its use of extended vocal techniques, the most basic of which can be heard in *and the swallow*, a setting of Psalm 84 which ends with the singers evoking the sound of autumn rains. Shaw

About the music at today's service, cont.

spoke of how she was thinking of the Syrian refugee crisis as she composed the work; 'There's a yearning for a home that feels very relevant today. The second verse is: "The sparrow found a house and the swallow her nest, where she may place her young" which is just a beautiful image of a bird trying to keep her children safe – people trying to keep their family safe.'

The Tudor composer Robert Parsons wrote sacred music of distinction both in Latin and in English, as well as secular vocal and instrumental consort music. He was appointed to the Chapel Royal in 1567. Little else about Parsons is known with certainty beyond the legacy of his compositions and the fact that he died of drowning in the Trent at a young age, reputedly at the height of his powers.

Ave Maria has become Parsons' most famous and well-loved motet since it was included in the *Oxford Book of Tudor Anthems* in 1978. Settings of the *Ave Maria* are not frequent in Englan – even William Byrd only set the text as required by the liturgy in his two books of *Gradualia* (1605 and 1607) rather than as stand-alone pieces. Parsons simply sets the lines found in the Gospel of St Luke and has no invocation for the dead (authorized by Pope Pius V in 1568). This is a magical setting, and it is not surprising that there is a beautiful

'Amen' coda. Initially the piece gives the impression of using a cantus firmus in the top part, but it is in fact free-composed throughout. Parsons starts each medius phrase one note higher than the previous one, beginning on F and then moving up to D with long slow notes before reaching 'benedicta tu' when it joins the other voices in equal importance.

The German composer Sigfrid Karg-Elert's real name was Karg, the 'Elert' having been added early in his career at the suggestion of his concert-agent. He studied at Leipzig Conservatoire, served for a time as professor at Magdeburg Conservatoire, and was appointed in 1919 to Leipzig Conservatoire, where he taught pianoforte, theory and composition. Though his earliest ambitions lay in the direction of composition, his chief distinction during his student days, and for some years after, was as a pianist of unusual brilliance. Some meetings with Grieg turned his ambitions once more towards composition, and the result has been a very large output in a great variety of forms - over 100 songs, sonatas for violin, many sets of pieces for the piano, a symphony, string quartet, and a large corpus of organ music. *The Choral-Improvisation on 'Nun Danket'* is one of his best-known compositions.
