Basics of United Methodism

We encourage you to learn more about United Methodist beliefs and structure by taking Methodism 101, a course for adults offered by our pastors once or twice a year. We also teach basics of our faith to our 6th and 7th graders over the course of the school year in Confirmation class, with a makeup opportunity offered every few years as needed for youth who miss Confirmation. Here are some basics that highlight distinctions near and dear to United Methodist identity:

Grace as a Means of Salvation – When we talk about God's grace, we mean God's loving presence with you throughout your life. We believe before you are ever aware of God, God loves you and tries to draw you in relationship with God with every breath you take. This grace that goes before is called *prevenient* grace. We do not believe God will force you to choose to be in relationship with God, but when you accept that love and recognize the saving work of Jesus Christ in your life, we refer to that as *justifying* grace. Once you have received that love of God, you will also need to grow in love of God and others. That lifelong journey of faith where the Holy Spirit empowers you to love better and better is called *sanctifying* grace. Methodists the world over understand our relationship with God and the salvation that comes through it in these terms of a healing journey in grace.

The General Rules – Methodists have been called, since the earliest days of our formation, to follow three General Rules. These are: do no harm, do good, and stay in love with God. That last rule is simply a call to be disciplined in our faith by practicing works of piety (i.e. worship, prayer, studying the scriptures, fasting) and works of justice and mercy (i.e. opposing oppression, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting those in prison).

Practicing the Sacraments – United Methodists recognize two sacraments: baptism and communion. We see both sacraments as a representation of God's love in our world. Baptism is the public moment of recognizing that God's prevenient grace is already active in the life of the one being baptized. Since we also believe that the power of baptism comes from God, we do not rebaptize people, because for Methodists that is like saying the work God did in you didn't take. If you were baptized in a Christian tradition, your baptism is honored here. When it comes to communion, we practice Open Table. For us, God already loves you and welcomes you to the table. We do not believe we have any right or need to keep you from that invitation and expression of love. All are welcome at the table – no exceptions.

Wesleyan Quadrilateral - How do we know what God's will is for us in any given moment? That is not always clear. When we approach such questions, we look to four sources for discernment: Scripture, tradition, reason, and experience. First, we go to Scripture. Our founder, John Wesley, believed all things necessary for salvation are found in Scripture. However, we also recognize that Scripture contains contradictions and cultural contexts that need to be accounted for as we seek wisdom within it. Tradition acknowledges that we are shaped by a faith tradition that helps us understand how we relate to God and Scripture. Reason acknowledges that we use our brains to seek understanding of God's will. Experience allows us to bring our current moment, perspectives, and community into the conversation. All of these things work alongside one another to help us understand how to be the people of God.



Big Tent – Sometimes you will hear United Methodism referred to as a Big Tent denomination. What that means is that we seek to be a place where people of all walks of life are welcome. We know that these days we are often pushed into our ideological corners where we only relate to people who agree with us. However, we know that God loves all of us, so we make room in our church and at the table for everyone. Some say that waters down our message, because it is difficult for the UMC to take hardline stances on certain issues. The way we see it, however, is that we are simply acknowledging the deep complexity of most things in our world today. We make room for all kinds of wisdom, even when that wisdom disagrees.

Connectional Church - Also, we are a connectional, rather than a congregational church. We are connected to all the other United Methodist churches in the world. We support collective ministries together, such as the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) which is the second or third largest relief agency in the world. We are also connected in Annual Conferences, geographic regions where a bishop oversees all the churches in that region. Besides encouraging and equipping the churches in a region, the Bishop appoints the pastors who serve at each local church. These appointments are made or affirmed every year, usually in the Spring to begin service July 1.

Core Committees and their Leadership

United Methodism has a long tradition of empowering lay people to lead their church. As part of this effort, most UMCs have five core committees who do much of the work of the church. With the exception of SPRC, which handles confidential staff issues, the committee meetings are open to anyone, though usually only those appointed to the committee have vote.

Church Council – This is the main governing body of the church. All other committees report to this committee. When a statement, policy, or vision needs to be affirmed for the church, Church Council is often where this occurs. Ours meets the 4th Tuesday of every month at 6 p.m. in the Gathering Room and online.

Staff Parish Relations (SPRC) – This committee serves as a church equivalent to a human relations department, setting staff positions, salaries, and aiding with hiring and evaluations. They also oversee staff appreciation, and nurture healthy relationships between staff and congregation. Ours meets the first Tuesday of every month.

Trustees – This committee oversees the property and safety of the congregation, and is the legal body for entering contracts on behalf of the church. Our Trustees meet the 2nd Tuesday of every month at 5:30 p.m. in the Gathering Room and online. **Finance** – This committee receives and prepares the budget for the church, raises funds, and nurtures a culture of generosity among our people. Ours meets the 3rd Tuesday of every month at 6 p.m. in the Gathering Room and online.

Nominations (Lay Leadership) – This last committee is the only one chaired by the Lead Pastor, and meets at least once a year to set the nominees for leadership in the other committees.

Worship

The Gathering - We gather each Sunday around the Light of Christ at 9 a.m. in Hines Hall on the west end of the building. Led by a full band playing a variety of popular music styles, we are immersed in sound as we sing and pray together. We share the stories of God's people and we break bread together at God's Holy Table. All are welcome.

Traditional – Sundays at 11 a.m. we worship in the Sanctuary through the music of our Chancel Choir, through the collective affirmation of reciting creeds and liturgy, and singing hymns that have been with us through the ages. We also share in communion every week. All are welcome into this intergenerational and longstanding service of worship.

Online Communion – For those traveling or homebound, most Sundays we gather at 12:15 p.m. on our Facebook page to have elements of bread and juice blessed over the internet and to share prayers and community with one another. Children First - Children grades K-6 spend an hour on Wednesday nights preparing the music and message of Children First, a children-led worship service on the first Sunday of the even months at 9 a.m. in Hines Hall. This service is filled with creativity and inspiration to remember Jesus calls us all to have childlike faith, and to let the little children lead us in worship and communion. **One Worship** – Taking place in the Sanctuary at 11 a.m. the first Sunday of the even months (February, April, June, August, October, and December), One Worship is a dynamic service that brings together the best of both contemporary and traditional music styles. Featuring musicians from the Gathering Band as well as the Chancel Choir, OneWorship is our humble attempt to honor both styles of worship in a joyful, healing, and unifying service that allows all of our church to worship and take communion together in the same space.



Nursery

We love spending time with our Littles on Sunday mornings! All Pre-K children are welcome to the Nursery during both services. During this time, teachers facilitate fellowship among our Littles and assist in learning through play. From 10-10:45 teachers lead a Sunday School lesson through stories or puppets and facilitate a coordinating craft or activity. Snack is served during this time. Our Nursery is open from 8:50a.m. – 12 p.m. on Sundays.

Kids

We offer Sunday School year-round for all ages. During the school year our children are grouped by grades, and during the summer we have our mixed ages (grades K-6) FUNday School which is a way for us to teach Bible stories through Art, Lego, and Science. Here is the breakdown of what Sunday School looks like during the school year each Sunday from 10-10:45 a.m.:

- Preschool Nursery (first floor, Wee Friends wing). We have a group devotional with a craft and snack.
- Kindergarten & 1st Grade Explore & Discover Room (first floor next to the Parlor).
- 2nd & 3rd Grade Upstairs Room 213D.
- 4th & 5th Grade Upstairs Room 206D. Our children learn how to use their Bibles in this class.
- 6th Grade Upstairs Room 208D. This class offers our Confirmation class, as well as exploring what it means to become a young adult in our church.

Youth (7th-12th grade)

Using our approach of Naïve Reading we will do a deep dive on a biblical passage each week. We will ponder – what are things we noticed and what are questions we have? We will discuss these together and even pull out some resource materials to gain a deeper understanding. Meets Sundays from 10-10:45 a.m. in the Youth area on the 2nd floor.

Ways to Serve: Worship Support

Hospitality Team – This team makes sure people receive a warm welcome as they come in the doors of our church, helps them navigate the space, and is a first line of connection for them to get to know us better. To serve on this team, contact Marie Clapper to be included in upcoming trainings (marieclapper@gmail.com). Here are the ways they serve:

- Greeters Come about 15 minutes before the services and welcome people at our main entrance doors. Great way for anyone to serve, including families with children of all ages.
- Coffee Hour Hosts set up, replenish, and clean up the coffee and snacks that are available from 8:50 a.m. – 11 a.m. Different people cover each part, so you do not have to cover 3 hours of work, just your assigned part. Set up people get to bake cookies!
- Welcome Home Hosts Each month we invite people new to our church to a lunch after the 11 a.m. service. Some of these take place in parishioners' homes, and some at the church. We need hosts for both places, so if your home doesn't accommodate 10-12 people, you can be a church host!

Communion Stewards – These people buy the bread and prepare the juice cups each week for communion for both services. Pro tip: if you bring the bread, you pick the bread. To serve this way, contact Dixie Spears (dixiespears13@gmail.com). If you want to serve on Sunday morning, you need to let Pastor Michelle know before Sunday, or show up for service a little early and wave her down – she is usually frantically asking people to do that good work.

Chancel Choir – Love to make a joyful noise to the Lord? Or maybe you just think it would be fun to hang out with Ray and Matt more (you are right – that is a lot of fun). Chancel Choir would love to have you! They rehearse Wednesday nights in the Sanctuary at 6:30 p.m. for an hour. Contact Pastor Ray (ray@fumcbentonville.org) or just start showing up!

Gathering Band – Hanging out with Ken and Matt is also a lot of fun, and you get to play a wide variety of music for The Gathering service on Sunday morning, because Pastor Michelle insists God is found in all things, especially the wide variety of creative expression the Holy Spirit inspires.

Acolyte – Children are an integral part of our worshiping community, something we celebrate every other month in Children First. But another way they can regularly serve is as an acolyte, bringing in and carrying out the light of Christ for either service. Hines Hall Chair Set Up – While we all pitch in and put up the chairs at the end of the 9 a.m. service, we have a volunteer team who sets up the chairs beforehand. Teams arrive at 8:15 a.m. (or sometimes Saturday if there are no other events). If you want to serve on this team, let Pastor Michelle know and she will connect you (michelle@fumcbentonville.org).

Nursery – These volunteers love on and care for our kids aged 5 and under during the 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. worship hours. During the Sunday school hour, they also help as the kids are taught an age-appropriate lesson. We are also seeking to provide nursery on Wednesday nights to support Parents in the Parlor, Pastor Michelle's Wednesday Bible Study, and Chancel Choir Rehearsals. Ways to Serve: Church and Community

Congregational Care Team – This team consists of several subteams who care for people in our church community in significant life moments. This team does rely on confidentiality in some situations, so please sign up only if you can maintain that sort of boundary. - Home Visitation This team has people who regularly visit our homebound members and bring them communion.
- Card Team This team writes and sends cards to people who have had illness, loss, a celebration, or are in need of some encouragement.
- Prayer Team This team receives email updates of prayer requests from people in our community and commits to praying for them (to request a prayer, send an email to prayerteam@fumcbentonville.org).
- Funeral/Bereavement Meal Team This team prepares the space and the meals for people in our community holding a funeral through our church so their family can be fed and cared for in this critical moment in loss.
- Pet Loss Team This is the newest team, they take a care package to a family upon the death of a pet.

 Meal Train Team – This team provides meals for people in all kinds of situations – loss, illness, surgery recovery, and the birth of a new baby. Team members are given details of the needs (number in family, any allergies, etc) to be able to offer this love to people in such times.

Grounds Team – The people who serve on this team get to spend time in God's creation, give the gift of a beautiful grounds to downtown Bentonville, and save the church thousands of dollars a year. Toni Hinrichs helps coordinate this team (<u>toni@fumcbentonville.org</u>). You can serve by helping to mow, weed, edge, plant and rotate flowers, make seasonal transitions, or be available for landscaping projects.

Prayer Shawl Ministry – This group gathers every Friday morning at 10:30 a.m. in the Conference Room (room 133) to knit prayer shawls for people in all sorts of life situations. Dorcas – Our FUMC sewing group, Dorcas puts together quilts and layettes for some of the more vulnerable newborns in Northwest Arkansas. They also periodically take on other projects for the community, such as sewing cornhole bags for Ozark Mission Project to distribute to area children's shelters. They meet the second Wednesday of nearly every month at 10 a.m. in Hines Hall to sew together, but they also have projects people can work on at home on their own time. School Partnerships – We work primarily with 3 area schools: RE Baker and Mary Mae Jones Elementary Schools and Gateway – Bentonville's Alternative Learning School, providing volunteers for all kinds of needs. Some examples include serving as a regular lunch buddy for an elementary kid, helping with administrative needs like laminating and cutting materials, teacher appreciation, and mentoring and interviewing high schoolers preparing for job interviews. Our Supported Ministries

Our church has supported the establishment of, and houses in many cases, four additional 501(c)3 organizations, and we continue to support them in various ways.

Second Street Pantry – A food pantry that serves people in Bentonville, Bella Vista, and Centerton, they disburse food and other goods on Tuesdays in two afternoon shifts. Beer & Hymns – The passion project of Ken Weatherford, Beer & Hymns gathers twice a month (once at Tonitown Winery and once at Bike Rack Brewing at 8th Street Market) around a different musical theme to sing hymns and popular music through the ages and to raise money for a different area non-profit each month. The year culminates in Beer and Carols which always benefits the Northwest Arkansas Children's Shelter, raising tens of thousands of dollars to care for vulnerable kids in the area. Wee Friends – A weekday daycare housed in the Douglas Wing, Wee Friends has an enrollment of around 75 kids, from infants to preschoolers. How to Join

Anyone is welcome to be part of our congregation without joining, and to engage in most of our activities (certain leadership positions require church membership). Membership involves taking vows to support the church with your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service and your witness – a commitment we hope everyone undertakes with seriousness and joy – and can be a significant step in your journey as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

If you are new to our community, and you choose to share your information with us, we will extend an invitation to a Welcome Home gathering. These take places in the homes of people in our church community, or they take place at the church, on a Sunday following the 11 a.m. worship service. These gatherings allow you to meet others who are also exploring our church and to ask any questions about us.

Following, or in lieu of, that invitation, one of the pastors will sit down with you to learn more about your specific discipleship journey. Pastor Michelle will most likely have the Four Questions Conversation with you. In it, she will ask you Four Questions to get at the heart of the passions God has laid on your heart. These four questions help her make connections for you with others in the church, or help you find ways to serve that are meaningful to you. The questions are:

- When have you most felt like a disciple of Jesus (or when has your life had the most purpose)?
- 2. What breaks your heart?
- 3. What brings you joy?
- 4. If you could do anything, there are no limitations, what would you do?

When you decide you are ready to join, reach out to Pastor Michelle (michelle@fumcbentonville.org) or to Pastor Ray (ray@fumcbentonville.org). We love to welcome you into membership in front of the congregation on Sunday morning, but we are very committed to our "All Are Welcome" stance and recognize some people are uncomfortable in front of a crowd, or in the case of foster children cannot be shown on a livestream, and so we can make arrangements for you to join at some other time and place. We just need to have a witness from the church to be present.

If you are new to Christianity and have never been baptized, we will baptize you as part of the service of joining. If you have ever been baptized in the Christian tradition, we will recognize that baptism and will not baptize you again. If you have been a member of a Christian church, we would also like to contact them to share with them that you have transferred your membership to us.

Whether or not you officially join us, we are grateful you have chosen to make this place your faith home. We do seek to be a church that welcomes all and builds a spiritual space for those who are far from home and feel far from God.


Looking for a Church Directory?

We have one! It is available on the app. If you are a church member, you can access the phone numbers, emails, and addresses of other church members. When you download the app, you will have a people option as one of your choices on the home page. If you are a member and that option has not appeared, first make sure you are signed into the app under the same email address that we show in our church directory. You should be able to sign in under profile. If the People option does not appear after you are signed in, then remove the app and try downloading again.
