

THE ROAD TO RECONCILIATION

BUILDING A BELOVED COMMUNITY -Next Step: Becoming a Reconciling Church

Please join us the April 6 All Church Meeting following the 10:30 service to discuss becoming a Reconciling Church that more intentionally supports the LGBTQ+ community.





BACKGROUND

In May 2024, we adopted our church identity within our Vision Statement to "Build a Beloved Community." We defined Beloved Community as a place where all are welcomed and valued. Among other things, we committed to learn about the challenges facing marginalized communities and how we can support their ministries and advocate for their justice. In

particular, we decided to explore the possibility of becoming a Reconciling Church, which seeks to include, support and advocate for the LGBTQ+ community. As a Reconciling Church, we would join the nationwide United Methodist Reconciling Network similar to networks at other denominations.

WHY BECOME A RECONCILING CHURCH?

Several years ago, we adopted a Welcoming Statement centering on our commitment to be an inviting, caring, and inclusive church actively living Jesus's commandment to love God and others. Our Welcoming Statement extends to all "regardless of age, gender, marital status, race, sexual orientation, social or economic status, gender identity and physical or mental ability." Becoming a Reconciling Church aligns with our Welcoming Statement.

RECONCILING CHURCH CONTINUED



WHY BECOME A RECONCILING CHURCH? (CONTINUED)

Over the past year to prepare for the possibility of becoming a Reconciling Church, we have offered educational classes and sermon series, provided forums, published articles, and displayed banners and window signs promoting Beloved Community. We also adopted Zao MKE UMC as a sister church, formed an LGBTQ+ ally group and brought in Courage MKE and Pastor Colby Martin to talk about the societal, personal and religious challenges faced by LGBTQ+ persons.

Church Hosts Colby Martin in "Rethinking Homosexuality and the Bible"

Almost 80 members of the church and community gathered in Fellowship Hall on Saturday, March 29 to listen to Pastor Colby Martin discuss what the Bible has to say about homosexuality. Colby is a leading voice on progressive Christianity and the inclusion of LGBTQ persons. Colby discussed the Bible's preference for diversity and inclusion and the way scriptures in the Old and New Testament have been misinterpreted to condemn homosexuality. Rather than speak to consensual gay relationships, these scriptures address gang rape, the sanctity of marriage, divisions within the early church and sexual exploitation common in that day. Colby then posed thought-provoking questions for group discussion and answered questions. Colby's comments were based on his book, UNClobber: Rethinking Our Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality. Colby spoke at Zao MKE UMC the next day on the topic, 'Standing Firm: Being Christian in an anti-LGBTQ World'. Our church co-sponsored that event and several church members attended. Both programs were part of our effort to promote greater understanding and dialogue on the topic of homosexuality as our church considers becoming a Reconciling Church.

This action would demonstrate our support for LGBTQ+ and other marginalized communities and further our commitment toward healing, reconciliation and ongoing ministry. NO JOKE- VOTE ON APRIL FOOL'S

Pastor Gary has encouraged us all to take action with our faith and voting is a great way to do that. As citizens, we have the duty to vote to keep our democracy strong. As Christians, we hope and pray that our votes lead us toward a more peaceful, just, and safe nation and community.

On April 1st- TODAY!- voters in Wisconsin will select a candidate to fill a seat on the Supreme Court and will elect the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The Supreme Court election will be of particular importance since major issues will likely come before them in the next term, including reproductive rights, collective bargaining rights (Act 10), voting rights, and fairness. There is also another constitutional amendment question on the ballot regarding voter ID laws. In addition, most communities also have races for city government, school board, or judges. You can preview your particular ballot now by going to <u>MyVote.wi.gov</u> where you can also check your registration, and find your polling place location.

Our Church & Society team's goal is that 100% of eligible voters from our congregation vote in every election. We promise to provide education regarding the offices, the candidates, and the issues in an unbiased manner so that everyone can make informed decisions when they vote. 

Opening Prayer and Consent Agenda: Tom Van Cleave opened the meeting in prayer reflecting on how the current six-week sermon series John: The Gospel of Light and Life helps us understand the meaning of Jesus's life and our own faith journey to align with our Vision Statement of Building a Beloved Community. The minutes from the February meeting were approved.

Devotion and Pastor's Report: There was no devotion as Pastor Gary Holmes was sick.

KEY OBJECTIVES

Vision Statement: Fulfill the church's Vision Statement of "Building a Beloved Community by *Connecting, Growing* and *Serving.*

Promote Inclusivity:

Beloved Community (continued): Kathy showed that over the past year we have offered educational classes and sermon series, provided forums, published articles, displayed banners / window signs and formed an advocacy group on challenges facing marginalized communities that include LGBTQ+. A proposed next step in fulfilling our church identity as a Beloved Community is to join the United Methodist Reconciling Network and become a Reconciling Church. It was decided to add this subject to the upcoming All Church Meeting on April 6th in a Q&A discussion. Vision Statement and Storyline Action – Beloved Community: Tom Van Cleave gave introductory comments on our Vision Statement of "Building a Beloved Community by Connecting, Growing and Serving" and our first Storyline action that centers on our commitment to be an inviting, caring, and inclusive church actively living Jesus's commandment to love God and each other. In addition, to learn about the challenges facing marginalized communities and how we can support their ministries and advocate for their justice.



Financials: Erin Norris presented the financial position for eight months highlighting that income and expenses are on track.

NOTES FROM THE BOARD (CONTINUED)

Misc: The church calendar will be changed from our current fiscal year ending in June to a calendar year ending in December that coincides with our Conference. That change should have little impact on the congregation and ministries. The Board will present that change at the March All Church Meeting.

Tom Groble presented a proposal for a capital bridge loan with Wisconsin UM Foundation up to \$600,000 to cover our upcoming Narthex construction costs. It was approved. Tom VC presented 10 policies, resolutions and statements that are specifically under the stewardship of the SLB and have been approved in past years that require a review. Our All-Church Meeting is scheduled for Sunday April 6th after 10:30 am worship.

Closing Prayer: Jeff closed the meeting with prayer.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 15th, with the closed session beginning at 6:30 pm in the Wesley Room. General session will begin around 7:00pm. A Zoom option will be provided. All are welcome.
