

My name is Claudia Deede. My journey to this place has been an adventure! I heard my first call to ministry when I was twelve years old, but it took until I was fifty-eight to answer! I grew up Presbyterian and joined the UMC in 1976 when my husband and I moved to Menomonee Falls. Starting in August, our congregation will conclude Sunday services by lighting the Candle of Peace, Hope, and Reconciliation. This ceremony, approved by our Servant Leader Board and Pastor, offers a powerful way to express our commitment to God's all-inclusive love.

Honoring Victims of Injustice

A Concerns Box is now in our sanctuary. We invite you to submit forms naming specific victims of injustice, oppression, and neglect worldwide. Each week, we will acknowledge these individuals, embodying our belief that God's love can overcome all divisions.

An Inspiring Legacy

This candle ceremony has deep roots in the anti-apartheid movement in South Africa. Many Methodist Churches there lit a candle wrapped in barbed wire for victims of violence, praying for them by name and for victimizers. This powerful witness fostered non-violence, integrated their congregations, and significantly contributed to ending apartheid and establishing South Africa's first interracial democracy.

A Call to Action Today

More than 50 United Methodist Churches in the U.S. have recently adopted this ceremony, recognizing the escalating violence and division in our world. By opening our hearts to all whom God loves, we can transform hopelessness and fear into shared experiences of peace, hope, and reconciliation. We may not have all the answers, but by witnessing to God's expansive love, we can help bring light into the world that darkness cannot overcome.

YOUTH

Earlier this month, a group of ten youth and five adult leaders traveled to West Virginia for a nine day trip to participate in the Appalachia Service Project, working on home repair and community connection. They worked in two teams. One group worked on installing J channels, underskirting, and siding on a mobile home, while the other team took on interior projects—installing cupboards, trim, flooring, and also painting.

Throughout the week, our youth showed up each day with hard work, great attitudes, and a spirit of service. The adults were truly inspirational, guiding and encouraging the group every step of the way. Beyond the physical labor, the trip was filled with meaningful connections—with the homeowners they served and with each other. They returned not only with sore muscles but with full hearts and a deeper sense of what it means to serve as the hands and feet of Christ.




