Meal Programs Serve the Poor and Homeless of Milwaukee

The designated Mission of the Month for February is our church's meal programs. What better for our church to respond to Jesus's message in Mathew 25 verse 35 where he says "for I was hungry and you fed me and I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. The "I" in his quote referred to our less fortunate brethren living amongst us.

Our church volunteers at 5 different meal programs in the area. All cooking is done in our church kitchen and all serving is done on site. The programs are one of the many ministries under the leadership of the Mission Committee.

On the first Monday of each month we serve the meal at **St. Ben's** church on 9th and State St. St. Ben's feeds around 150 people each night. Jim Schacht is leading this program. He can be reached at <u>jamesschacht@hotmail.com</u>.

On the second Thursday of each month we cook and serve the meal at the **Guest House** on 13th and Juneau Ave. We serve about 65 meals each night. Tom Van Cleave is leading this program. He can be reached at tvancleave@ameritech.net.

On the 3rd Friday of each month we cook and serve two meal programs.. We feed about 100 meals at **MacCanon Brown's Homeless Sanctuary** at 18th and Locust St. John Fruncek is leading this program. He can be reached at jfruncek@gmail.com. On the same night we feed about 100 people at the **St. Vincent's** program on 2nd and Clarke St. Terri McClellan is leading this program. On the 4th Friday of the month from January through October we serve the meal at the **Milwaukee Rescue Mission** on 19th and Kilbourn. There we serve about 100 meals to the residents of the Joy House and their Safe Harbor programs. Lori Aeschbacher is leading this program. The Danger of Certainty

"Certainty is the great enemy of unity. Certainty is the deadly enemy of tolerance." This profound statement is a quote by the archbishop of the conclave in the book and movie of the same name.

Certainty - of our own views, piety, and value or of another's worth - closes our minds and hardens our hearts. It gives us license to judge, exclude and oppress people who look or act differently from us or who have different cultures, beliefs or life experiences. We stop being open to God, we reject grace, and we stop loving.

Throughout history we have seen the atrocities this kind of certainty has spawned - from the religious persecution of the Inquisition and the continual subjugation and abuse of women to the genocide of indigenous people, the enslavement and marginalization of African Americans and the systematic extermination of millions of Jews. The certainty that these people were inferior (even subhuman) and/or evil was manufactured and normalized by those in power to increase their power and wealth and then accepted by others out of fear, ignorance or greed.

We are seeing this certainty manifest itself again today in our treatment of immigrant and LGBTQ+ communities. Both groups have been subject to degrading lies and stereotypes that would have us believe immigrants are criminals who take our jobs and eat our cats and dogs and LGBTQ+ persons are sexual deviants who violate God's natural laws and corrupt our children. In fact, they are none of these things. They are simply vulnerable groups who are convenient scapegoats for the powerful and easy targets for discrimination, hate and violence.

The Bible tells us that all people are made in God's image and all are loved by God - that includes immigrants and LGBTQ+ persons. Our God is big enough to embody male and female, black and white, immigrant and citizen, gay and straight, trans and cis. Rather than judge, stereotype and demean, God has called us to love them as neighbors and share with them the Good News of God's saving mercy and grace.

I Corinthians 13 says love is patient and kind, is not proud or self-seeking, keeps no record of wrongs, always protects, trusts, and hopes. This radical love does not hate, exclude and oppress. It opens its arms and makes room for all people, perspectives and experiences. It challenges us to see the child of God in everyone. It eschews certainty for compassionate ambiguity. Without this humble and courageous love, the scripture says nothing we do will ever be worthy in God's eyes.

Romans 12:2 admonishes us to "not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind". What would the world look like if we gave our certainties to God and allowed Him to transform our hearts and minds so we could love unconditionally? If we encountered an immigrant, would we seek to understand their struggles and dreams rather than denigrate them. If we met an LGBTQ+ or trans person and felt uncomfortable with their sexuality or confused by their pronouns, would we try to get to know them rather than shun them. Would we stand with them against the hate, injustice, oppression and violence they endure every day?

When we say Beloved Community includes all, that means the immigrant and the LGBTQ+ individual as well as our friends and family. If we struggle to accept them, we understand the failing is not theirs but our own and it is our responsibility to confront and overcome the entrenched biases, fears and judgments that keep us from loving as Jesus did.

Beloved Community must start within us. We cannot build a better world if we are not willing to become better ourselves. We must do the hard work of growing past the lies and false certainties the world wants us to believe. We must have the courage to stand up for our God and our faith and with the marginalized and oppressed. Only then can we offer the same unconditional grace and love to others that God has so freely given to us. Only then can we truly become Beloved Community.

Notes from the Board

On January 21, the Servant Leadership Board (formerly Accountable Leadership Board) met for the regular monthly meeting. In attendance were SLB members: Tom Van Cleave, Lori Aeschbacher, Don Behrens, Hui Zhang, Craig Walker, Chelsea Montague, Jeff McClellan and Tom Groble. Also in attendance were Pastor Gary Holmes, Erin Norris, Nell Nash, Laurie Jeffery, Kathy Schluter, Sam Swartzberg and Dick Steinmetz.

Opening Prayer and Consent Agenda

Tom Van Cleave opened the meeting in prayer reflecting our Vision Statement of "Building a Beloved Community".

The November meeting minutes were approved as written.

Devotion and Pastor's Report:

Rev Gary Holmes presented a devotional exercise and readings from 1 Peter 4:10 "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

Through questions, he asked us to reflect on our unique gifts and talents on how God is calling us to serve this year and how we can encourage others to find a calling within the church.

Vision Statement and Storyline (Action: Building a Beloved Community):

Kathy Schluter presented an update on one of our four Vision actions highlighting several actions that have been taken to date including: sermons on Beloved Community, articles in eJOY, Wed night classes and a recent preacher swap with Zao UMC. There was discussion on the congregation's perception of what Beloved Community means and how it translates into our church identity.

Materials in the form of flyers, banners, bookmarks and stickers were shown to be displayed inside and outside the church as reminders of our church identity.

Hospitality Update:

Beth Groble presented quarterly worship attendance, new members and new guests that show a slight uptick over the past year. On engagement, the new members that joined in June and Nov 2024 have found a calling within the church by attending or participating in various activities, events, programs, classes and small groups.

There was a request for SLB members to connect with returning guests each Sunday to be relational and identify church programs / activities that can meet their needs.

Financials:

Erin Norris presented the financial position for six months highlighting that income and expenses are on track.

Capital Campaign:

Tom VC presented an update on our three-month Capital Campaign highlighting that we accomplished our pledge goal with a current total of \$1.031M. He mentioned that he expects 5 to 10 additional pledges. Several members requested their pledge be used for additional seating in the Narthex that was not in the original Capital Campaign scope.

Notes

On projects, we have completed five projects – Fellowship Hall, Sanctuary Lighting, NE Ramp, IT connectivity and Chapel seating. There are two primary outstanding projects – Sanctuary Sound and Narthex. Based on discussions with Business Manager and Finance Committee on identified funding, the SLB approved a motion to move forward with Sanctuary Sound in Feb/March and Narthex lobby & Office Space in May – Sep projects. Note: Create an opening to Fellowship Hall from Narthex is under a cost review. Furthermore, the Board recommended that the Capital Campaign update be communicated to the congregation on January 27th.

Misc:

Tom Groble conveyed that the church calendar will be changed from our current fiscal year ending in June to a calendar year ending in December that coincides with our Conference. The Board will present that change at the March All-Church Meeting.

The SLB recognized Lori Aeschbacher faithful service on the Board as she has fulfilled her 3-year commitment.

Closing Prayer: Rev. Gary Holmes closed the meeting with prayer.

Our next meeting will be held on **Tuesday**, **February 1**8, with the closed session beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Wesley Room. General session will begin around 7:00 p.m. A Zoom option will be provided. All are welcome.
