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MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary is the Mission Focus for January and February

MBHS Mission:

MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary (MBHS), located in 53206, is a daytime sanctuary and multi-resource center for homeless and at-risk individuals with core values of healing, spirituality, recovery, peer empowerment, dignity...and mutual transformation. MBHS is unique, in having 21 racially and economically diverse part-time employees. They serve 200+ households on a weekly basis. Five ongoing outreach events are: food access, tutoring, lead testing, healthcare access, and general resources to help hopeless individuals find a pathway forward.

Focus of the Designated Offering:

Phase three of the 5-story building development, the addition of a commercial kitchen, will provide a daily meal program for one of the most food-scarce communities in the country. MBHS has most of the money to start building and equipping the commercial kitchen. In recent years, UMCWFB has designated funds to be used for purchasing kitchen equipment. The Mission Team's current goal is to help raise funds so construction may start soon.

Collection Drive:

A second part of our mission focus is to collect long underwear, socks and blankets for both children and adults. Please leave items in the mission collection area near the elevator.

Service Opportunities:

Many volunteer opportunities are available: tutors, nurses, and drivers to pick up food or furniture, among others. Contact Don at mdonlybeck@sbcglobal.net for details.



Celebrating God's Faithfulness - Stepping into a New Year of Blessings

A letter from Pastor Gary Holmes

Dear Beloved Community,

As we step into a new year together, I am filled with deep gratitude and hope as I reflect on all that God has been doing among us. The closing weeks of the past year were marked by moments of joy, beauty, and genuine connection that reminded us who we are—and whose we are. Our expanded Narthex has already become a wonderful space for connection, offering a warm and welcoming place to greet one another and build relationships.

Other meaningful moments included our Thanksgiving Service and Festival Celebration Worship. At each service, more than 300 people gathered to worship God with full hearts and lifted voices, surrounded by the rich sounds of handbells, choirs, and orchestra. It was worship at its best—vibrant, prayerful, and rooted in thanksgiving. Each service then flowed naturally into fellowship as we gathered in the Fellowship Hall for brunch, sharing food, laughter, and meaningful conversation.

I am especially grateful for the Legacy Gifts Fund (Foundation and Memorials), whose generous sponsorship of the brunch made this expression of hospitality possible. Because of the faithful giving of this fund, our commitment to building Beloved Community was not just spoken—it was

lived. Around tables, stories were shared, relationships were strengthened, and strangers became neighbors. This kind of hospitality is not an “extra” in the life of the church; it is central to who we are.

Jesus understood this deeply. Again and again in the Gospels, we find Jesus at the table—eating with friends, welcoming the outsider, breaking bread with those longing for connection. In these shared meals, lives were changed and community was formed. As Scripture reminds us, *“They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people”* (Acts 2:46–47). The early church knew what we are rediscovering: faith grows stronger when it is shared, celebrated, and lived together.





As we move into this new year, we do so with a spirit of celebration and a renewed sense of purpose. The United Methodist bishops have offered a compelling vision for the church—to form disciples who **love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously**. This vision beautifully complements our call to make disciples and to transform the world. To love boldly means extending Christ's inclusive, passionate love to all. To serve joyfully means offering compassionate care grounded in prayer and gratitude. To lead courageously means standing against injustice and working faithfully for peace.

This is the work before us—and it is life-giving work. Rooted in worship, nourished by fellowship, and sent into the world by the Spirit, we step forward together, blessed to be a blessing.

I am excited for the year ahead and grateful to walk this journey with you. May God continue to shape us into a community that celebrates well, loves deeply, and serves faithfully—for the sake of Christ and the world God so loves.

UMCOR Flood Relief

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and the Wisconsin Conference of the United Methodist Church are working in the Milwaukee area to mitigate flood damage to homes for families without other resources.

Members of Gray Guys and the Habitat work crews have worked three days to remove damaged drywall and debris from homes. Work will resume in mid January. A few homes still need clean out work. But soon we will be installing drywall and rebuilding damaged areas. In February there will be a need to manage the warehouse inventory supplies. This should not require lifting. 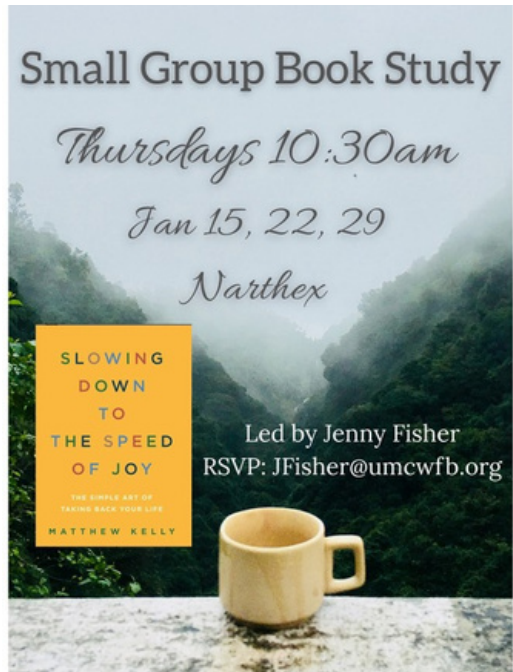
