Missions

March Mission of the Month

Mujila Falls Agricultural Center is our March mission of the month (MM).

The Center, a United Methodist mission, is located in Zambia. The missionary, Temba Nkomozepi, visited UMCWFB October 2023.

The Center supports the local community with the following programs: day care for early childhood education, a primary school, vocational/trade school, and farm management teaching agricultural best practices.

In a recent newsletter, Temba stated, "the work we, you and I, are doing reminds me of something I recently read on mission; In essence, mission work is a tangible expression of Christian love, compassion, and the transformative power of faith in action." Please support this important mission.

In addition, \$1,840 was donated to support California wildfire relief (UMCOR). Thank you from the Mission Team.



Socks Make a Difference for Northcott

In 2024, thanks to UMC churches around the state collecting old socks, Northcott Neighborhood House received \$2000. That is an actual ton of socks kept out of landfill!

Thanks to everyone who donated old socks to the collection at our church. Keep the socks coming!

Bring clean old socks to church and put them in the marked bin near the elevator. All kinds of socks are acceptable: threadbare, with holes, unmatched, any fiber (wool, cotton, synthetic, blends), and any size or brand.

The socks get sent to TerraCycle, with shipping paid by partner Gildan (GOLDTOE Socks). They are separated by material type and recycled into raw formats that manufacturers use to make new products.

Every shipment earns reward points based on weight for a chosen non-profit (One pound = \$1). The Milton UWF started this project in 2024 to benefit Northcott. Our church is partnering with the Brown Deer UWF for shipping the collected socks.



Missions

The May Mission of the Month is "Midwest Missions"

Midwest Missions is one of seven agencies in the UMCOR relief supply network. Their main function is packing of various kits of needed supplies that are sent to domestic and foreign people who in need of them because of they live in poor conditions or suffered a disaster. For example, during the week of February 9th, they sent out \$98,841 worth of supplies to Mexico and \$29,392 of supplies to Guatemala. Their website is <u>midwestmission.org</u> to get more detailed information about them.

The Mission Committee has decided to have our church get involved by sponsoring an off-site kit packing event on Sunday, May 4. We are planning on packing 50 Student Kits consisting of notebooks, colored pencils, crayons, one scissors, sharpener, erasers and pencils and 50 Personal Dignity Kits consisting of toothpaste, soap, shampoo, deodorant and various other items. The packing will start about 10:00 a.m. in the Narthex.



North Shore School for Seniors spring classes begin in March


North Shore School for Seniors (NSSS) registration is ongoing for spring, with some classes starting March 10. Classes meet Monday or Tuesday at church.

For more than a century, the International Institute of Wisconsin has been promoting a multi-ethnic, multi-cultural perspective through education, arts exchange, communication, social activities as well as immigration and naturalization services . Vote Joyfully!

April 1st (really) is a general election in Wisconsin. While the offices of Supreme Court and State Superintendent of Public Instruction may not be as high profile as some other positions, they are both extremely important to our state and therefore, it's critical that you vote.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction oversees all public schools and libraries in Wisconsin, evaluates their performance and promotes ways to improve them. It is a nonpartisan office with a four year term and there are no limits on how long someone can serve. The incumbent is Dr. Jill Underly and she has held that role since 2021. The primary that was held in February decided who would be her opponent.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court is the state's highest court, is made up of seven justices and is responsible for determining if laws violate the WI Constitution. Justices are chosen in non-partisan elections for a ten year term and there are also no limits on how many terms can be served. This year the court is expected to rule on abortion restrictions and a challenge to Act 10 which in 2011, eliminated union collective bargaining rights for public teachers and other public employees. Two candidates are running to fill one seat. Susan Crawford is currently a Circuit Court judge in Dane County and is generally considered to be a liberal. Brad Schimel is a Waukesha Circuit Court judge and is considered to be a conservative. Liberal justices now have a 4-3 majority so this election will be key to determine the balance of power on the court.

There is also another (the 6th in the last year) constitutional amendment question on the ballot. This amendment seeks to add Wisconsin's voter ID law into the Constitution. Wisconsin has had a strict photo ID law in place for many years and because of that, many feel this amendment is unnecessary. When this amendment passed the legislature, all Republicans voted for it and all Democrats voted against it. A YES vote would change the Constitution and a NO vote would oppose changing the Constitution and rely on current laws.

Some municipalities may have local elections such as school board or city trustees—you will need to check what is on your ballot before going to the polls. The very best way to find out if you are registered, where you vote, who your elected officials are and who is on your ballot is by going to: <u>MyVote.wi.gov</u>

The WFB United Methodist Church and Society team will once again be having a Voter Information table in the Narthex after the single service at 10 a.m. on March 16th. We will have plenty of nonpartisan info for you to take to prepare for the April 1st election and will be happy to answer your questions.



Meet Zao MKE Church

When we talk about building Beloved Community, we are talking about more than our congregation (although we are doing that too!). We also mean the broader community. For example, we have joined MICAH (Milwaukee Inner City Congregations Allied for Hope) and partnered with other churches and organizations, like Rooted and Rising and MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary, on several events and missions.

Now we are forming a relationship with Zao MKE Church. Zao is a United Methodist church located in the former Kenwood United Methodist Church on Kenwood Ave. across from the UW-Milwaukee Student Union. It describes its mission as Jesus Rooted, Justice Centered and Radically Inclusive. The Zao congregation is young, racially diverse and mostly LGBTQ+. Most have not attended a church before. Its pastor, Rev. Jonah Overton, is trans and uses the pronouns 'they, their'. Pastor Jonah began their career as an organizer in Chicago but felt a call to ministry and moved to Milwaukee a few years ago to plant the Zao church. Pastor Jonah preached at our church in January and is passionate about their faith and the LGBTQ+ community.

As part of this new relationship, our church will hold a community event called **"Rethinking Homosexuality and the Bible"** on **Saturday, March 29**. **Colby Martin**, a nationally known pastor, author and speaker, will help us explore the importance of an inclusive and caring community and the proper interpretation of the New Testament scriptures that are often cited to condemn homosexuality. Pastor Martin has authored the books, "Unclobber: Rethinking Our Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality" and "Shift".

Another part of this relationship will be our decision this May to become a Reconciling Church. The Reconciling Network that we would join is a United Methodist movement to support LGBTQ+ persons within and outside our church. It was originally focused on changing the denomination's policy against gay pastors and gay marriage. With the recent reversal of that policy, the goals of the Network have broadened to support and empower LGBTQ+ communities. The Mequon UMC has previously voted to become a Reconciling Church.

We are also developing a team of allies who will be intentional about knowing and supporting the Zao community. They will attend some services and events at Zao and support events on LGBTQ+ issues at our church. Allies are people who see LGBTQ+ persons as children of God who are equally loved by God. Allies do not expect or need LGBTQ+ people to defend their sexuality.

We recognize that the Zao congregation is vulnerable. Efforts to discredit their sexual preferences and eliminate their rights jeopardize their access to employment and health care, their ability to obtain federal IDs and passports and their equal protection under the law. They need straight and cisgender allies to stand with them. Our church can do that.

By forming a relationship with Zao MKE UMC, we are expanding our Beloved Community and acknowledging the enormity of God's love for all of humanity. We urge you to join us or, if you have questions, to learn more. When we enter Beloved Community, we find good people who, through their differences, expand our understanding of God's love and His vision for our church. Some of those good people just happen to be LGBTQ+.

Also in attendance were Pastor Gary Holmes, Erin Norris, Laurie Jeffery and Jean Erickson.

Opening Prayer and Consent Agenda

Tom Van Cleave opened the meeting in prayer reflecting our Vision Statement of "Building a Beloved Community".

The January meeting minutes were approved as written.

Devotion and Pastor's Report: Rev Gary Holmes presented a devotional exercise and readings from Isaiah 43:19 "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland."

Through questions, he asked us to reflect as leaders in the context of change on our spirit of renewal, trusting in God's guiding hand. May we be faithful stewards of this moment of renewal, leading with wisdom, grace and hope.

Vision Statement and Storyline Actions: Tom VC showed a document, and we read out loud our Vision Statement and the four actions that are key components as follows:

Vision Statement: Building a Beloved Community by Connecting, Growing and Serving.

In the next three to five years, our dream is to build a Beloved Community, committed to be an inviting, caring, and inclusive church actively living Jesus's commandment to love God and each other.

The Spiritual Journey Pathway, along with programming and experiences for a variety of needs and life stages, will nurture our spiritual transformation as a faith-based community as we commit to courageously:

- *Connecting with faith seekers within and beyond our church* in meaningful, caring and accepting relationships that welcome all.
- Growing our faith and developing a strong personal relationship with God through empowering worship and faith studies that grow our understanding and love for God. Serving in the world to make a difference with multi-generational services that reaches
 - into our area community and beyond as the hands and feet of Jesus.

.Vision Statement key components and our four actions:

- <u>Church Identity</u>: Nurturing a "Beloved Community" with a sense of place that is caring, authentic, feeling of acceptance, recognition, respect, seen, wellness, supported, safe place; meeting people where they are; healing; compassionate.
- <u>Spiritual Journey Pathway:</u> the compass or process for personal spiritual growth & relationship with God; we are invited to Connect, Grow, and Serve in our relationship with God and others; Faith building; ministry engagement.
- <u>Programming</u>: Provide engagement and programs to all ages and stages of life; attracts young families with children.
- Outreach: Meet the needs of the community; wholeness; complete; "Truly" alive

Financials: Erin Norris presented the financial position for seven months highlighting that income and expenses are on track.

Misc: The church calendar will be changed from our current fiscal year ending in June to a calendar year ending in December that coincides with our Conference. The Board will present that change at the March All Church Meeting.

The SLB recognized Don Behrens faithful service on the SLB as he has fulfilled his 3-year commitment. Also, we welcome Chris Kitchen as a new SLB member.

Closing Prayer: Rev. Gary Holmes closed the meeting with prayer.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 18th, with the closed session beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Wesley Room. General session will begin around 7:00 p.m. A Zoom option will be provided. All are welcome.
