### **November Mission Focus**

November is a special time to be thankful for all that we have. Here at The United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay, we have two opportunities to share our bounty with our friends at Northcott Neighborhood House. Northcott is our November Mission of the Month where monetary and other donations will go to support their purpose of providing education, employment opportunities, and basic necessities to youth, families, and senior citizens in the Milwaukee area.

In addition, the Mission Team will immediately resume ongoing food collection. Please bring non-perishable food to the collection area near the elevator. We understand that this is a big ask, but our neighbors are in need. The ongoing collection will support food pantries at MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary and at Rooted and Rising. This is especially important while federal food programs like SNAP are shut down. Items most needed are peanut butter, tuna, canned chicken, beef and salmon, Dinty Moore beef stew, mac and cheese, and Ensure.

On Sunday November 23rd we will be holding our annual Thanksgiving Express. This is our major food collection for the food pantry at Northcott Neighborhood House. Empty grocery bags will be distributed starting Sunday, November 9th. Please return them with your donated food on or before November 23rd. Thank you for any groceries you are willing to share!

#### **Mission on Ninth Street**

Three years ago, the owners of a duplex on South 9th Street were inspired by an article in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel about the difficulty of finding rental housing for refugees. After some reflection, they decided to provide their duplex to refugee families in need of a safe, yet affordable, place to call home. However, they learned the families needed to move out of their subsidized housing in just one month, which was daunting since the repairs, improvements, and cleaning were projected to take several months.

After learning of the tight timeline, a friend pulled together a group of friends and members of UMCWFB and the Mission on 9th Street was born. The volunteers donated their time and considerable energy one Saturday in December 2022 to quickly ready the duplex. They cheerfully built, installed, painted, and scrubbed, enabling the two families, including three children, to move into pristine quarters just two weeks later.

Today, the school-age children have thrived while three new American citizen babies have been born. The families have adapted to their surroundings, learned English, befriended their neighbors, and worked hard to build their future in America.

Last summer, the owners decided to sell the property and joyfully, one of the Afghan families was able to buy the duplex with the other family remaining as tenants.

In gratitude, the original property owners made a generous donation to UMCWFB. One-half of the gift went to the International Institute of Wisconsin for refugee settlement. The other half was spent on purchasing tools to equip the UMCOR flood disaster trailer working in Milwaukee.

# **Tools Purchased for Flood Relief Trailer**

Mission Focus donations plus a special gift were used to purchase over \$1,300 worth of tools to be used on flood damaged properties in the Milwaukee area. With rebates and the remaining balance we will be able to purchase a few more tools or supplies.

We have completed three work dates and hope to schedule one more in November.

# **500 Student Kits Assembled**

Sunday, October 26th we assembled 500 student kits for Midwest Mission. These kits may end up anywhere in the world where there is need. The October Midwest Mission newsletter listed three shipments which were recently made to Ukraine, Guatemala and Guyana. Items included:

- 5,040 Personal Dignity Kits
- 16,800 Rice and Soy Blessing Bags that will feed 100,800 people in Ukraine!
- 2,800 Student Kits
- 4,600 Hospital gowns
- Miscellaneous hygiene supplies
- Sewing machines
- Wheelchairs
- Medical supplies

The total value of the three shipments was over \$370,000. Thank you for your help assembling the kits and your support of this UMCOR connected agency.


# Successful October Gray Guys Projects and Three Upcoming Work Days

#### A Summary of the October 21 Meeting

On Oct 21st, the Servant Leadership Board (formerly Accountable Leadership Board) met for the regular monthly meeting. In attendance were SLB members: Tom Van Cleave, Hui Zhang, Chris Kitchens, Vee Jefferson and Tom Groble. Also in attendance were Gary Holmes, Erin Norris, Laurie Jeffery, Dick Steinmetz, Jean Erickson, Beth Groble, Claudia Deede and Beth Stafford. The following is a summary of key discussions and actions:

- Devotion and Pastor's Report: Pastor
  Gary Holmes led a devotional
  discussion focusing on celebrating and
  encouraging faithful leaders. Scripture
  reminds us that encouragement and
  celebration are essential for sustaining
  faithful service. As leaders within
  UMCWFB, consider ways to celebrate
  and sustain the servants of the church
   staff and volunteers through
  words, prayer, or tangible support.
- Narthex Advisory Committee: Tom VC provided an update on the formation of this committee that will provide guidelines and recommendations on the final touches of our Narthex and building footprint that aligns to our identity as a welcoming, caring and inviting church. The areas of focus include: How we communicate through various media print versus digital display; our church identity through art, photos, banners; areas of dedication for displays, events and service; collections for missions; and signage & amp touchscreens for guidance.

- Stewardship Campaign: Gary shared the stewardship campaign theme of building a Beloved Community in the 4 "C"-able future centered around 4 "cs" (Celebrate what God has done; Connect with God and one another; Commit to the journey of discipleship; Contribute with joy and purpose). A letter from the pastor introducing our stewardship period will be sent on Oct 28th culminating in our Sunday, Nov 23rd Celebration of Gratitude with one worship service followed by lunch and festive music in Fellowship Hall.
- Misc: The Annual Church Conference will be held on Tuesday, Dec 9th at 7:00pm.

The following letter was written at the end of June, 2025.

"Be still, and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10

I'm sitting outside on my back porch on a beautiful Saturday afternoon. The tinkling of wind chimes, the sounds of nearby traffic and voices in the distance give me a sense of peace and calm. I am still.

My mother-in-law is dying. She's been fighting cancer for the last 6 months and she's worn out and ready to let go. She wants to go on her terms, which isn't necessarily easy for the family to accept, but at the age of 93 I believe that is her right. I pray that when my time comes I can have the grace to do the same.

Leaving the staff of this church after nearly 27 years is like a little death for me. Through the ups and downs and all arounds I have made this place my second home. I have watched people come and go, laughed and cried on a daily basis, and tried to be a faithful servant.

But as Christians we believe in life after death - in fact a more glorious life, where there is no more pain, no more suffering. While I don't know yet what God might be calling me to do in this next chapter of my life I feel certain that I will be led in the path in which I should go.

It has been my honor and privilege to work alongside you. I am grateful for the relationships - whether they were years in the making or simply a blink in time. I will always remember Pastor Dick Jones handing me a written job description for a Volunteer Coordinator position back in 1998 and saying "just think about it." (You can blame him.)


