I have heard most of the economic reasons for wanting to get a jump start on finishing out the last quarter to get the stores in the black, but really, even before the end of October, we are walking through Christmas trees in department stores and hearing of black-Friday sales. I've been reading a lot lately about being fully present in the moment and not hurrying through life, but our culture wants us to hurry up and get in the Christmas shopping mode. It is no wonder that at times we feel out of step with the world around us. My soul seems to be crying out, "I'm not ready for this season that you are promoting."

Like the seasons of nature, where God has ordained a rhythm to creation, so are seasons of the Christian calendar. As fall brings the change of color in the trees before the trees go barren for the winter, so I want to celebrate Thanksgiving Sunday and Christ the King Sunday before moving into the preparations for the celebration of Christ's birth. With the way the days of the calendar fall this year, we have a Sunday between Thanksgiving celebrations with our families and the beginning of the Advent journey. More than just a transitional Sunday, this is a Sunday to reflect on Jesus being the most important person in our lives. He truly is our King.


Thanks for your patience with my little rant. By the time this newsletter gets to your homes, it just might be December. Christmas sales circulars have a way of congesting the mail system. Welcome to December and the beginning of the Advent season.

Advent means "arrival" or "coming." It is a time of preparation during the four weeks leading up to Christmas, when we not only prepare our hearts for the annual celebration of Christ's coming to earth, but also look towards the future of Christ coming in glory, being enthroned in his rightful place at the center of all creation. This is the culmination of the spiritual life with God, it is the longing of our hearts—the day when there is no more death, mourning, or crying, or pain. The old order of things passes away and the new comes. God's dwelling place will ultimately be with us. Now we wait with the Holy Spirit's assurance of things to come.

So as we wait, let's commit to live each day for God, enjoying living fully in the moment, loving the person in front of us and being mindful that our actions are either bringing Christ into the present reality or making it harder for others to see our Christian witness. We are either painting a picture for others of a new order or we are contributing to the darkness around us. When

we live for Christ and strive to bring him fully into each present moment, we celebrate the spirit of Advent—the coming of Christ.

C.S. Lewis, in his classic work The Screwtape Letters, portrays Screwtape,



the high-ranking demon instructing his apprentice nephew Wormwood on how to disrupt a Christian's spiritual growth. The goal is to get the person either stuck in the past with former hurts or disappointments or get them so fixated on the future that they are worried and unable to enjoy the present moment. Why? Because the present is the moment in which time touches eternity.

Missionary Frank Laubach once stated that "Every now is an eternity if it is full of God." Christian philosopher, theologian and author Dallas Willard stated that "Eternity is now in session." Jesus prayed in John 17:3, "Now this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent." Eternity is here for the person who has spiritual eyes to see.

Friends, it is my prayer for you that every day during this Advent season you will be filled with the closeness of Christ. Author and counselor John Eldredge states that "the goal of human existence is union with God." My prayer for you is that you will ask these questions of yourself: "What does it look like for me to be united with God in this current circumstance?" "What events will I attend during this Advent season that will bring me closer to Christ?" "Are there certain things that I should say no to this year so I can minimize my anxiety around my calendar?" "What is one special thing that I can do for another person that will help them to experience Christ or think favorably of Jesus?"

I hope to see you in worship and especially for our Lessons and Carols service with traditional Advent Scripture readings and hymn singing with accompanying orchestra on Dec. 17. I hope you will also be in church for our beautiful candlelight Christmas Eve services and our New Year's Eve Day Covenant Renewal Services.

During this season of anticipation, may we join the early church in its prayer, "Come, Lord Jesus." In Christ,

Archives dedicated in memory of faithful servants

In advance of Marvin Church's 175th anniversary, the Marvin Trustees unanimously approved the dedication of the church's archives in memory of Marvin members Alex Beall and Mary Hammond. In recognition of these two members' commitments to maintaining the history and preservation of church documents and memorabilia, a bronze plaque has been placed near the door of the Archives Room on the lower level of the sanctuary.





The story of the steeple





On April 12, 2020, a hail storm damaged shingles on the steeple, causing the shingles to begin falling off. The steeple exterior was decaying, and the cupola exterior was also decaying. Inside the steeple, multiple full cut oak and pine boards were bolted together to make extremely strong columns for the steeple frame during original construction.

The picture at left was taken inside the steeple looking up toward the weather vane.

The main columns extend approximately 100 feet up into the internal area of the weather vane.


Through the years, construction workers left their names and dates of when they worked on this interior steeple frame. Our

2023 workers also left their names and dates on the steeple walls.

Work accomplished:

- OSHA protocol requirements determined and met.
- Installation of anchors: Before work could begin, a worker had to crawl to the top interior section of the steeple to attach multiple anchors to the top of each column (the single crewman who climbed to the interior top of the steeple ascended into darkness at the top).
- Anchors were needed to attach safety lines to allow the crew members to travel up, down and around the steeple's exterior working surface.
- The old exterior steeple underlayment was replaced with three sealing layers.
- All existing shingles were replaced.
- The wood on the steeple dormers was replaced.
- The dormer venting louvers were replaced with metal instead of the original wood material.
- The cupola was cleaned and repainted




Music at Marvin

This is the final article in the historical series commemorating our 175th anniversary.

Sing the glory of His name; Make His praise glorious! (Psalm 66:2).

For 175 years Marvin Church has been singing the glory of our Lord and making that music glorious. The first historical evidence of a Marvin choir is in 1872 when choir members met at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoons for rehearsal. There was also a Sunday School Chorus, so music was being offered not just in worship but also in the Sunday School hour.



When the sanctuary was being remodeled in 1941, Mr. R. W. Fair made a gift of a new three-manual pipe organ with chimes. The pipes were put behind grillwork during that remodeling. By 2025 the installation of Marvin's new Letourneau organ should be complete, continuing Marvin's tradition of excellence in musical offerings. The new organ will preserve one-third of the unique pipes from the 1941 organ.


Through the early twentieth century, the Marvin choir continued to grow and be defined not only by the music sung in worship but also music sung on concert occasions. The choir performed Haydn's Creation, Mendelssohn's Elijah and Handel's Messiah. Clyde Wolford, who served as Marvin's music director for 30 years, began an annual tradition of a community-wide performance of The Messiah. This musical outreach into the community was strengthened by the establishment of the Marvin Concert Series in 1988. This concert series continues to the present, bringing special music and renowned performers to Marvin to enrich our members' musical experiences and to be an outreach to bring the community to Marvin.

The 2023-2024 Concert Series features a busy schedule which began with a Hymn Festival on Oct. 29 to celebrate Marvin's 175-year history. With Advent there will be a presentation of Handel's Messiah, the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols, the Robinson Handbell Concert and the annual Christmas Downtown



Concerts at noon on Wednesdays. There are further Concert Series offerings in the new year.

Marvin has a full menu of musical opportunities. In addition to



the Chancel Choir, there is Laude Chorum which enriches the 8:30 service, children's choir and a handbell group for adults. The Mewbourne Choir Enrichment Fund, established in 2007, has provided scholarships for college-age singers in the choir, workshops with noted choral clinicians, concert trips, choir retreats and numerous other enhancements to the music program.

The televising and livestreaming of our traditional services have introduced people to the powerful musical traditions at Marvin. With the establishment of the Core service, Marvin also offers contemporary music in the venue of Herd Worship Center.

As a church, we celebrated Marvin Methodist Church's 175th birthday on Nov. 12 with a commissioned choral anthem dedicated to this historic occasion. Noted composer Joseph Martin composed Call to Commitment and it was performed by Marvin's Chancel Choir accompanied by organ and full orchestra.

Strengthened and affirmed by our 175-year history of fine music, we at Marvin will continue to sing the glory of our Lord's name and make His praise glorious!







Sanctuary updates coming in 2024

A new LeTourneau organ is currently being built and is scheduled for installation in our sanctuary in 2025. Next year is the time to do all needed maintenance to the sanctuary. including painting, carpet replacement, LED lighting upgrades,

Marvin Church by-laws being re-crafted for GMC denomination

Beginning in March, an ad hoc committee met monthly to draft the corporate bylaws for Marvin Methodist Church, Inc. Marvin Church's move to the Global Methodist Church opened an opportunity to review our corporate status.

In 1994, Marvin Church adopted corporate by-laws to provide rules for the governance of the church in accordance with Texas business law requirements. In January of this year, the church voted to change the church's name by filing a certificate of amendment with the

Secretary of State of Texas. The Global Methodist Church Transitional Book of Doctrines and Discipline altered our connectional relationship. Under our new connection, we have more latitude to determine Marvin Church's governance.

To update and improve our operations, the current board of directors appointed by the 1994 by-laws, the

trustees of the church, will vote on the proposed new by-laws in December of 2023. The Administrative Council will vote on the proposed new by-laws at their Charge Conference meeting on Dec. 5. We will begin the new year under our new governance structure if adopted.
