eflections from the lead pastor

In December 1944, during World War II, the German army launched a surprise attack that became the Battle of the Bulge. Six days later, American General Anthony McAuliffe found his troops surrounded in the town of Bastogne, Belgium. Besieged by a far greater force of German soldiers and armored units, McAuliffe assembled the 101 Airborne Division and surveyed the situation. A small German party, under a truce flag, delivered an ultimatum: immediate and unconditional surrender or face total annihilation and great humanitarian losses to the civilians in the city.

Upon receipt of the message, McAuliffe read it, crumpled into a ball, threw it in a wastepaper basket and uttered the words, "Aw, nuts!" Command officers

in charge of the reply to the communication sought to find suitable language for the official reply.
Apparently, the dispatch read as follows: "To the German Commander. NUTS! The American Commander."
While the message

While the message was being sent back to German leadership, McAuliffe gathered his troops and stated, "Men, we are surrounded by the enemy. We have the


greatest opportunity ever presented to an army. We can attack in any direction."

In psychological terms, this is referred to as cognitive reappraisal—telling yourself a different story about what is happening. In other words, it's "flipping the script" or reframing the situation, looking at it from a different vantage point.

Word spread through American ranks of the courageous spirit of the 101 Airborne and their commander. Though the German forces attempted several infantry and tank assaults and the Luftwaffe bombed the city nightly, the Americans held the town until reinforcements arrived. For his actions, General McAuliffe was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the second-highest military decoration, second only to the Medal of Honor awarded by the President of the United States.

What a great story. Choosing to "flip the script" when

facing challenges is not always the easiest choice, but it can bring some great rewards for those who have eyes to see different outcomes than what might first be suspected. Are there Biblical examples of this? Absolutely.



In the book of Genesis, Joseph is sold into slavery by his brothers, wrongly accused of wrongdoing by Potipher's wife and forgotten by fellow prisoners he helped. It is 13 years before he is given the opportunity to become vice-regent to the Pharoah. When given the later opportunity to get back at his brothers for what they had done to him, Joseph has already "flipped the script" on his life story. "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good" (Genesis 50:20).

During his first imprisonment in Rome, Paul tells the Philippian church that his imprisonment helped to spread the gospel. As imperial guards were chained to him, he made Christ known to them, sharing the gospel. His imprisonment also inspired people in the church to be bolder in their witness to others (see Philippians 1:12-14). Paul "flips the script." Chain me to a guard and I have a captive audience. Put me in prison and the church witnesses more boldly.

On the Tuesday following Easter Sunday, Bibles and hymnals will be boxed up and relocated out of the sanctuary to prepare the space for the maintenance work (painting, floor refinishing, pew restoration, chancel modifications, lighting and sound work that will be done in preparation for organ installation.) Like updates done to our homes, this will require us to vacate our beautiful sanctuary for five months and shut down the space for use. Though this will be a sacrifice and an inconvenience (it always is), it will bring forth for the church an equally beautiful sanctuary ready to house our new Letourneau organ in 2025.

As I think about traditional worship in Pirtle Hall for the months of April through August, at first it seems like a long time to be away from a treasured sacred space. But using cognitive reappraisal, "flipping the script," I get excited thinking about some of the creative things we can do. The room is a very lively room, so congregational singing will be fantastic. Because the

(What we discovered when we did this in 2014 is that people got to know different people because they were sitting in different seats.) We can also insert video testimonies or pictures from Mission Week and VBS into the services, along with video greetings from some of our missionaries and summer mission teams. Ten years ago, we inserted some great testimonies from our children that inspired the membership. Being out of the sanctuary for five months might sound like something for

which you would like to reply, "Aw, nuts!" But what if God were to use this time to renew our church, celebrate our ministries and help us make new friends in our worship space? It may take a little "reframing" or creative imagination to get excited about this temporary change in our worship life, but I think most of us can agree that when we return, the sacrifice will have been worth it. Comprehensive maintenance like this won't have to be done for another 20 years!



Welcome HOME

We are called. Called to love, to uplift, to encourage, to champion, to challenge and to see people. Sometimes in a space as big as Marvin, people can feel lost in the crowd. That's not God's heart, so a team of Marvin people partnered with God's heart and got to praying: How do we help the people who walk through our doors feel seen?

We came up with an idea called Welcome HOME Sunday School class. This is a four-week, bi-monthly class led by our own laity who are gifted in teaching, sharing and seeing people. HOME—History, Overview, Ministry, Explore. The four weeks will include a brief history of Marvin, an overview of spiritual gifts, a deep-dive into the Discipleship Pathway and ministry opportunities and exploring how to plug in.

This Sunday School class will give newcomers or even longtime members a place to learn about themselves and the gifts God has given them and about where they are on the Discipleship Pathway, and then will launch them into ministries and opportunities to fill their cups and sharpen their iron, creating a space for people to be loved, uplifted, encouraged, championed, challenged and seen!

How's our health?

Three years ago, Marvin Church used a spiritual life inventory to give us a snapshot-in-time of our church health. Our purpose as the Body of Christ is to be disciples who make disciples. A blood donation is the gift of life



The January blood drive collected 32 units. This means 96 people and their families will have a better, brighter tomorrow.

Currently in the United States only 3 percent of the population donates 100 percent of the blood supply. Just a few years ago the number was 7 percent. As the need for blood grows, the supply continues to dwindle. The need is real as told

by someone who attends Marvin church. "I had a liver transplant and due to complications needed two additional surgeries. I required a great amount of blood and platelets. I would not be here today without the transfusions."

Human blood is absolutely amazing. God created something that man cannot reproduce. Scientist have spent years trying to manufacture artificial blood and are not even close. The only source of blood is donors like you. Marvin Church has a long and rich history of mission work and giving back a little of the gifts God has given each of us.

We know not everyone can donate. Many have medical reasons and should not donate. For the rest of us please consider donating at the remaining Marvin drives this year: April 14, June 23. Aug. 25 and Nov. 10.

We know it's the job of super heroes to save lives, but ordinary people can save lives every day. While going about their day to day lives they pause for 30 minutes and donate a unit of blood. Three lives are saved with that one unit.

A blood donation is the gift of life. Who knows, maybe you really are a super hero!

Sanctuary renovation: It's moving time!

Easter Sunday, March 31, will be the final service in the sanctuary before it is closed for Phase 1 renovations. Services are scheduled to return to the sanctuary in mid-September. However, before the contractors can begin their work, we need to clear out the sanctuary and surrounding spaces.

If you have ever moved houses, you know what a big job it is to box everything safely, make sure boxes are labeled

properly and store them securely until they can be unpacked. Because the work will begin the week after Easter and we will use the space through Easter, there is



not much that can be packed ahead of time.

We need a group of volunteers to make this move happen. How can you help?

Serve on the packing team to pack items. Another team will move boxes to their temporary location. Contact Regina Childress (rchildress@marvin.church) to serve.

Donate boxes. They should be clean, sturdy and have lids or flaps that close.

We will box items on Tuesday, April 2. Volunteers should meet in the sanctuary at 9 a.m. for instructions. If necessary, we will continue working on April 3.

In September, we will need another team to reset the sanctuary and other spaces to prepare for worship. Watch for details about our move-in date later this year.



Africa update: preparing for floods

At the very end of January, Tanzania received a lot of unexpected rain, which led to a lot of flooding. These floods wiped away entire roads, a few bridges and even some homes.

Losing even just one bridge makes the journey to and from places in Tanzania far more difficult. In the U.S. if a road is under construction, we have plenty of detour options. That is, however, not the case in Tanzania. They rely heavily on the few main roads they have.

After reaching out to Alfred Niau and hearing just how bad the flooding was, it became quite evident that there were some things that needed to be repaired and some things that needed to be built entirely new, quickly.

With the rainy season just around the corner in the middle of March, Alfred and the Amazing Grace Church in Tanzania got to work digging trenches and fitting them with concrete to divert water faster and more efficiently from potential flooding. Their prayer with these trenches is that the Amazina Grace Church and the family homes in the area will be spared from any damage in the upcoming rainy season.
