

AS WE GATHER

What a contrast we hear today, between someone who trusts only in other people, who are like the "chaff that the wind drives away" (Psalm 1:4) and the one who trusts in the Lord, who "knows the way of the righteous" (Psalm 1:6), as Jeremiah writes. But that difference pales when we read the Gospel and Epistle. Luke's writing of the Beatitudes continues with the woes and laments about people who have all they need right now. And the Epistle tells us plainly that those "who have fallen asleep in Christ" believe with Paul what is "of first importance": that Christ has been raised and that we shall stand with Him. In fact, our Lord is "the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:20). Today we reflect on what we believe and confess, on which we receive power to live, and by which we shall stand forever.

EPISTLE READING


1 Corinthians 15:12-20

We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that He raised Christ, whom He did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. NICENE CREED





POSTLUDE

OFFERTORY INFORMATION

Tune composer Phoebe Palmer Knapp (1839-1908) played a melody to Fanny Crosby and asked, "What does the melody say to you?" Crosby replied that the tune said, "Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine!" and proceeded to recite the entire first stanza of the now-famous hymn. Fanny Crosby (1820-1915), blind at the age of six weeks, was a lifelong Methodist who began composing hymns at age six. She became a student at the New York Institute of the Blind at age 15 and joined the faculty of the Institute at 22, teaching rhetoric and history. "Blessed Assurance" was published in 1873 in the monthly magazine edited by Joseph Fairchild Knapp and Phoebe Palmer Knapp, Guide to Holiness. The entire hymn is focused on Heaven, a place where "perfect submission" and "perfect delight" [stanza 2] will take place. The earthly existence is one of "watching and waiting, looking above" [stanza 3]. As we submit ourselves to Christ and are "filled with His goodness" and "lost in His love" [stanza 3], we are remade in Christ's image. The refrain calls us to "prais[e]...[our] Savior all the day long," echoing I Thessalonians 5:17, "Pray without ceasing." This hymn can be particularly troubling for some, as the text claims we are in perfect submission, perfect "this," perfect "that"... but that seems not quite right. Why are we claiming to be perfect? We can certainly recognize that we are not perfect by any means - only Jesus is perfect. Throughout our lives we can recount opportunities when we reluctantly submitted or hesitantly surrendered to what God was calling for us or to others. Our pride takes over when we cannot submit or surrender, so how can we sing that we are "perfect" when we know that we are not. As we wait and maintain our vision towards Heaven, the Promised Land, our faith in Jesus' perfection gives us assurance and confidence that our story and song will be of love and praise for our Savior and therefore shall become a story and song of love for each other. Lean into Jesus's perfect submission and His perfect delight – let that be your guide of mercy and love.
