

Easter: What the Bible Says

In many streams of Christianity, Easter is even more important than Christmas. Why? Because it celebrates Jesus' divinity and the purpose of His coming to the earth. The Easter holiday commemorates Jesus' resurrection from the dead and His promise of eternal life to all who believe in Him.

The account of Jesus' resurrection can be found in all four of the Gospels — Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Each book (Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24, and John 20) tells a slightly different account of the story from the authors' differing perspectives. What's consistent across all books is that Jesus was previously in the tomb where He was buried after his crucifixion and that His body was mysteriously gone after three days.

In some accounts, Jesus Himself appears; in others, it's angels that bring the news of His resurrection. But in any case, Jesus' body has been removed from the tomb without explanation. The Biblical accounts then tell of Jesus appearing to Mary Magdalene, the disciples, and other followers (Acts 1) before finally ascending into Heaven

For three days following His crucifixion, believers at the time questioned whether Jesus really was the Son of God. By all appearances, it seemed death had defeated Him. But upon His resurrection, He proved that He was not just a human but divine. The apostle Paul summarizes the sequence of events in <u>1 Corinthians 15:3-8</u> when he says, "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, and then to the Twelve. After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and last of all he appeared to me also..."

This account is a declaration of what Christians believe: that Jesus Christ came to earth, died for the sins of humanity, and defeated the powers of death through His resurrection. Easter is the yearly celebration of this miracle and the hope for believers of their life in Christ, which includes the forgiveness of all their sins and the promise of their eternal life.


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

National Self-Care Day April 5

History of National Self Care Day

'Self-care' is the act of caring for oneself through means that help us feel our healthiest and happiest. It has become the most common form of healthy living and allows us to do something that will otherwise be considered selfish — prioritizing ourselves. It has existed since the dawn of mankind, before notions of medicine, therapy, or other healthcare systems, when humans had to rely on themselves to achieve optimal health through practical means. Self-care was originally used for institutionalized patients, to help them develop self-worth through acts of personal care and preservation. It became a popular term in the medical field to truly understand mental awareness concepts like post-traumatic stress and to help patients suffering from such conditions navigate their way through life.

Modern self-care as we now understand it was popularized by the civil rights movement of the Black Panther Party in the 1960s. It began with the party meeting the needs of community members through the establishment of health clinics, food distribution, and creating programs at a time when it was even harder for people belonging to the minority sections to gain access to healthcare. The concept became even more personal when leaders of the group adopted a more mindful approach to avoid activist burnout. They encouraged activists, leaders, and other members of the community to prioritize themselves and their mental and emotional states through activities like yoga and meditation.

Today self-care has become a global approach to catering to one's needs and is encouraged through any means that helps you feel your best. Chicago-based development coach, Laura Schwartz, is the pioneer of National Self-Care Day and has created the holiday to remind us to take a break and put ourselves first

HE WILDERNESS is a theme woven throughout the tapestry of Scripture. It's the dark gray thread that makes the other colors pop. Many great stories involve a wilderness. The Lord called Moses while he was tending sheep on the west side of the wilderness. John the Baptist preached repentance in the midst of the wilderness of Judea. Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness before He began His public ministry. Perhans the most notable

Perhaps the most notable account of the wilderness is Israel's journey from slavery in Egypt through the wilderness and into the promised land.

The entire Book of Numbers is set in the midst of Israel's wilderness. In fact, the Hebrew title for this book is translated "In the Wilderness."

If you live long enough, you will endure a wilderness (or several wildernesses) of your own — a season of unfamiliarity, barrenness, and wildness. Over the past year, it seems the whole world has endured a wilderness — a pandemic that has interrupted every semblance of normalcy. The wilderness feels wild. It is wild. But it's not arbitrary.

The Lord ordains the wilderness for His people for a purpose. He lets the discomfort of

the unfamiliar, barren, and wild prepare us for the next season. He reveals the idols in our hearts — the things or people we look to for purpose or meaning besides God. He removes distractions and refocuses our attention to set squarely on Him. Above all, He remains with His children in the wilderness. He never abandoned Israel in the wilderness, and He will never abandon any who have put their faith in Christ. (See Matt. 28:20.)


You might be in the midst of a wilderness season. Familiarity and comfort seem out of reach. The uncertain and wild are your reality. Friend, while
