Vote on 2024 Ministry Fund Budget

We will vote on the proposed 2024 ministry fund budget over the weekend of December 1-3. You can <u>click here</u> for the budget consolidation details. Much work has been done by staff, lay leaders, and the Finance and Personnel Ministry Groups to help make reductions to this budget in light of current giving trajectories and upcoming debt payments that will begin in mid-2024, and we are grateful for everyone's diligent work. There have been cuts made across the board to this budget, and none of them have been easy to make. Here are some of the highlights from previous churchwide discussions:

• This budget reflects an \$80,000+ reduction in ministry, mission, and facilities budgets, including a \$35,000 decrease in the mission budget.

- It should also be noted that our mission and justice teams currently have almost \$100,000 in projects funds that will carry over to next year that they can also spend in their work. Therefore, our hope is that this decrease won't feel as significant with these other funds available.
- Other groups have made what we call "meaningful cuts" changes that would make a budgetary difference without being detrimental to a particular ministry.
- The personnel budget has increased 2%, but this still includes almost \$30,000 of reductions, including a \$4,000 reduction in the choral scholars line, eliminating the summer youth intern, and decreasing the hours of our custodial staff. These cuts were, by far, the hardest to make.
 - The remaining increase to this budget is in large part because we have received bids for staff health insurance that are 50-100% higher than what we current pay and we need to prepare for what will likely be a significant increase to these costs starting June 2024.
- Tracy Holladay and Susan Pierce have worked hard to determine an estimated amount of debt payment we will begin to incur in mid-2024 to begin to pay for our Sacred Space work, and they think \$61,200 is reasonable. However, this number will double in 2025.
- Even with these significant budget reductions, we are also incurring significant increases. Therefore, this is a relatively flat budget from 2023.

Recognizing Sharon Sanders



On Sunday, we celebrated Sharon Sanders and the incredible gifts she has shared with us over the past year and a half as our Interim Organist and Music Associate. Below are Kathy Collier's words of recognition for Sharon: *Interim* is a Latin adverb meaning "in the meantime". Interim is the time between, and you can use it as a fancy way of referring to a time you squeeze something in.

Today we are noting how you *squeezed in* many hours of practicing both organ and piano in preparation to lead Highland's worship services. To *squeeze in* additional time, that meant arriving at church on Sunday mornings before 7 a.m. or practicing late into many evenings.

Squeezing in involved spending hours poring over organ literature to find music that would connect scriptures to hymns to proclamations noting appropriate tempos and dynamic levels so worship experiences would be heightened for many.

Squeezing in meant making sure ministers and lay leaders understood Highland's rich and beautiful practices of intentional worship planning as well as visual elements placed in our sacred space for deep connections to God, our Creator.

The words: *squeezing in* to describe an interim time may sound negative but I know that you and God worked closely together these past 17 months and I'm pretty sure time was suspended for you. How do I know this? Because after your time each day serving as a professor in the Kent School of Social Work at the University of Louisville, the time you gave to Highland was not *squeezed-in-time* but rather time filled with love and joy for every note rehearsed and music chosen and played.

So today, it is my great honor, on behalf of our faith family, the Worship Ministry Group, the Music Ministry and your involvement with almost every ensemble from Sanctuary Choir to Children's Choirs to Orchestra to Handbells, we say *thank you, thank you, thank you!*

Sacred Space Project Update

Geothermal drilling and piping in the parking lot is largely complete. The pipes have been pressure tested to ensure that all joints and connections are ready to go.

Creation of the new mechanical room underneath the chancel in the sanctuary continues apace. Eventually this room will house the HVAC hardware for the sanctuary. Excavation has reached the door that the choir members use to enter the back of the choir loft. The first picture below shows the mechanical room and the second shows the reach of the room in the sanctuary.


