Dear Highland Family,

We write to share an important update with you about how we ended the 2023 fiscal year.

You may remember that in December, we anticipated that end-of-year expenses could significantly exceed our income. We are overjoyed to share that Highland boldly stepped up to the challenge, and in December alone, we received \$367,000 in contributions! We ended the year having received \$1,238,262 for our ministry budget, in addition to \$824,616 for the Sacred Space Campaign. That's over \$2 million dollars for our shared work in creating a world where justice and Love are abundant. Thank you, Highland family, for your faithfulness and generosity!

Our 2023 budget was \$1,345,229, and our final expenses for the year were a bit below that at \$1,294,072. This means that unfortunately, we still ended the year \$55,809 behind our expenses, although this number is not nearly as high as it could have been. Thankfully, we have funds in our reserves to meet this additional need, but we also recognize that this is not a practice that we can sustain in the long-term, particularly as we prepare to take out a loan for our Sacred Space work.

The Ministry Council has named the church finances as an area that needs strategic visioning in the year ahead, both in terms of how we talk about giving as a church and in how we can proactively prepare for 2025. You will be hearing more feedback from the Finance Ministry Group on these topics at the Quarterly Church Conference on Sunday, February 4 at 4:00 PM on Zoom.

Even though we didn't meet our total 2023 expenses, we still begin this year with deep gratitude and high hopes. We knew that this situation was a possibility based on giving trends during our last capital campaign, and just like we paid off those expenses in a healthy and timely manner, we believe that we can do the same again this time. We look forward to continued conversations with

you about the ways in which we give to our shared work of Love at Highland in the year ahead.

Sacred Space Project Update and a Volunteer Opportunity!

"What's going on in the Sanctuary?" If you're not asking this question, then you might hear

someone else voice it in the coming days. While most of the Sacred Space Project work is related to HVAC systems for the sanctuary and Fellowship Hall, other projects have been part of the overall vision since the beginning. Two of those projects are relighting the sanctuary and repainting the sanctuary. Both of those require the use of scaffolding, which requires the removal of all the pews in the sanctuary. The pews are being stored at a warehouse within a mile of the church. Their removal began on Tuesday of this week.



This Thursday (tomorrow!) we're asking that everyone who is capable of moving stacks of chairs to show up between 3:00 and 6:00 PM to help relocate chairs within the building so that we'll have seating in the sanctuary on Sundays. Yes, our worship space will look a bit different for a few weeks on Friday evenings and Sunday mornings, with plywood on the floor and traditional chairs for seating, but it will all be worth it in 6 to 8 weeks when the lighting and painting are complete.

Additionally, we are looking for folks to come at 8:15 AM on Sundays to help set up the remaining 100-150 chairs before the 8:45 service begins. If you can help sometime over the next 6-8 weeks, please sign up for a date here.



Loving Our Own Bones: Disability Wisdom and the Spiritual Subversiveness of Knowing Ourselves Whole

On Sunday, I preached about the internal messages we tell ourselves and the inadvertent impact they have within us. We say things to ourselves that we would never say to anyone else! At least, I know that has been the case for me in my recent journey toward recovery. As I looked around the sanctuary on Sunday, I saw quite a few nods and tears wiped away from your eyes, which tells me that I'm not alone in this struggle.

The reality is that filtering out all the other noises in order to listen with every fiber of our beings to that still, small voice – that voice that calls us "Beloved" - is some of the hardest and yet most important spiritual work you and I can or will ever do. And it takes a lifetime! There's no easy way out, no way to skip or to find shortcuts around it, and no one else can do it for us.

But I believe it's worth it. Because I believe we are worth it. All of God's children are worth it. As Debbie Hoover so beautifully summarized the sermon on Sunday, let's start telling ourselves, "Beloved, you're worth it." And actually believe it.



If you'd like to continue learning and growing to love yourself as God created you to be, I'd like to invite you to join me for our upcoming Wednesday night class on the book *Loving Our Own Bones:* Disability Wisdom and the Spiritual Subversiveness of Knowing Ourselves Whole.

I deeply appreciated reading this book throughout my own recovery over the past several months and think that the author, Julia Watts Belser, a rabbi, Hebrew scholar, and wheelchair user, has such rich wisdom to share with us. Her writing challenges not only ableism but racism, sexism, and all the other prejudices that are so deeply rooted within us. She writes:

"In this book, I bring disability wisdom into conversation with my own religious tradition, with spiritual practice, with questions of the heart. Diving deep into my own disability experience has led me to unexpected insights as a teacher of Jewish text and tradition. Everything I know about God comes through these disabled bones."






