

Wednesday Black History Month Classes

Join Highland members on Wednesdays, February 21 and 28 at 6:15 p.m. in watching an inspirational speech given by Bryan Stevenson at a United Church of Christ General Synod assembly luncheon last year. Drawing on his faith and experience, including his work as an attorney defending vulnerable clients, many individuals on death row, Stevenson talks about how to engage the work of justice with courage, compassion, and a fierce hope for a better world.





Stevenson is the founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative, a human rights organization in Montgomery, Alabama, that has won major legal challenges by exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of persons in prison, including those with mental illness, and aiding children prosecuted as adults. He also led the effort to create the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery, which several of our church members visited on a 2022 trip to visit racial justice sites in Alabama.

We will watch the speech over two Wednesday nights, with time for discussion. Please be warned

that some of his stories mention physical abuse, including physical and sexual abuse of a jailed child.

Because his audience is made up of Christian leaders, Stevenson does not shy away from how his faith has been the guiding point of his life's work, and he gives a rousing call to action to people of faith.

Lent at Highland: What's Saving Your Life?



Remembering Don Burke

On Sunday, March 3 at 4:00 PM, we will honor the life of Highland's beloved Pastor Emeritus, Don Burke. I'm so glad that Joe Phelps will be returning to Highland help lead Don's service, and I'm grateful to Kathy Collier for helping to plan this service to honor Don's rich history of meaningful liturgy and worship at Highland.



Not long after Don began as pastor, the church asked when Don would plan their first revival, which was traditional for a new pastor to do. However, according to our history book by Peter Smith, Don thought this was simply a way for a new pastor to "strut his stuff and have a protracted meeting of hotshot preaching." So, he responded in a different way, holding services that year on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday – services we still hold dearly as part of our Lenten tradition today. I'm still so grateful that Don was able to be with us for Holy Week last year. I know he treasured the chance to participate in these beloved rituals with the Highland family, 50 years after he first began them.

I'm holding Don closely as we begin a new Lenten season and look forward to hearing more stories as we remember and honor his beautiful legacy among us on March 3. You can learn more about Don's life in <u>this lovely tribute</u>.

An Update from Finance and Faithful Giving Ministry Groups

We write to you on behalf of the Finance and Faithful Giving Ministry Groups as we are considering a change in one of Highland's practices. Historically at Highland, only the Financial Secretary (and the counters) have had knowledge of any financial contributions made to the church by families or individuals. This information has been kept completely confidential from all other staff, including the Pastor and lay leaders. We have been discussing the prospect of allowing the Pastor to have access to general information related to people's financial contributions. We

think a change like this could have a meaningful impact on the financial health and well-being of the church and would allow for greater transparency and intentionality in conversations related to giving. The reasons for this proposed change are multifold as we discussed last month at the QCC, but some are outlined below:

- It is important that we thank our givers, especially as there are so many other places where their money could go. Currently, our Pastor can't personally thank people for their financial gifts, like we see happen in many other non-profits and organizations.
- Being able to more effectively fundraise is a key to the future thriving of a stand-alone organization such as our church. Especially given the significant needs of our building and our Sacred Space campaign, it would be incredibly beneficial for our Pastor to know some level of information about giving to be able to have more personal conversations with donors.
- As the leader of the church, our Pastor is privy to so much private information about our lives. We do not believe that entrusting this financial knowledge would change their behavior. In fact, we believe it would allow the Pastor to be more knowledgeable about situations potentially in need of pastoral care. For example, a member's unexpected drop in giving can be a sign of other pastoral concerns, such as illness or unemployment. For our Financial Secretary to be the only person who knows this significant level of information often puts them in situations that we do not believe that this staff member should be responsible to handle on their own.
- It seems that the dominant trend of pastors not knowing any information related to giving is changing with the ever-changing landscape of the world around us. In fact, this change in practice is being strongly recommended to Highland and other churches by numerous organizations, including the <u>Lake Institute on Faith and Giving</u> and Ashley|Rountree (with whom we consulted for the Sacred Space campaign). As we continue researching and learning from other organizations, we want to point you to a couple short articles (2-3 minute reads) that we have found helpful in this process:

We know that this possible change may come as a shock to many of you, and to others, it may be a surprise that there was so much privacy related to finances to begin with. Again, please know that we hold confidentiality in the highest regard. As of now, there are no specifics "set." We hope to continue to have open and honest conversations about this potential change in the coming months.


