Youth Winter Retreat

Our "Reset" Youth Winter Retreat was this past weekend and y'all, it was amazing! We had 25 amazing youth and six brave adults who traveled over to Camp Loucon in Western Kentucky for the weekend.

Throughout the weekend, we explored different themes related to what it means to follow Jesus. Our first session together we talked about "Pressing Start." We explored the call of the disciples and how Jesus invited those first followers to "press start" and follow him. Likewise, in our own journeys of faith, Christ is calling each of us to "press start" and follow as well.



We also explored what happens when following Christ gets difficult. What happens when we "Get Stuck?" What do we do when life gets hard? When there are big questions that we don't have answers for? When we see people proclaiming to be followers of Jesus but do things that harm and destroy others? We spent some time sitting in that tension, asking questions, and wondering what we are supposed to do when we feel overwhelmed.





Every journey needs a break and a time for rest. We explored what it means to hit "Reset" and find times to rest and grow in our faith, so that we can do the work and be the people Christ has called us to be.

And before we left Loucon, we shared communion together. We encouraged each other to keep "pressing start," so that we can do justice, love kindness, and do so humbly together. We encouraged each other to be honest when we feel "stuck." We encouraged each other to hit "reset" when we need moments of rest. It was a beautiful and holy weekend.

Remembering Don Burke

On Sunday, March 3 at 4:00 PM, we will honor the life of Highland's beloved Pastor Emeritus, Don Burke. I'm so glad that Joe Phelps will be returning to Highland help lead Don's service, and I'm grateful to Kathy Collier for helping to plan this service to honor Don's rich history of meaningful liturgy and worship at Highland.

Reparations Fund Update

Last October, Highland paid \$2,700 to secure a building that an African American woman planned to rent for a new business. That business, CoLab, had its grand opening on January 11 (see CoLab's website here and an article about its grand opening here).

Highland's Reparation Fund group is partnering with MOLO Village to find individuals who need some financial support to take the next step to reach goals for career, education, or home ownership. The owner of CoLab was the first.

This week \$5,000 was given to MOLO Village to go toward tuition at Simmons College of Kentucky for another African American woman to begin her journey toward becoming a nurse. She will begin classes this summer.

The Reparations Fund group continues to look for Black organizations to partner with on behalf of Highland and is thankful for the church's generosity.

Wednesday Black History Month Class

Join Highland members on Wednesday, February 28 at 6:15 p.m. in watching an inspirational speech given by Bryan Stevenson at a United Church of Christ General Synod assembly luncheon last year. Stevenson talks about how to engage the work of justice with courage, compassion, and a fierce hope for a better world.

Stevenson is the founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative, a human rights organization in Montgomery, Alabama, that has won major legal challenges by exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of persons in prison, including those with mental illness, and aiding children prosecuted as adults. He also led the effort to create the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery.

This will be our second Wednesday night watching this, with time for discussion. Please be warned that some of his stories mention physical abuse, including physical and sexual abuse of a jailed child.




