Sacred Space Project Update - Make Note!

Major changes are underway in the church building! This week the two boilers in the "old" mechanical room and the air handler were shut down and are being dismantled and removed from their home of the past few decades. This removal is a major milestone in our project! First, it means that preparation can begin in that room (new flooring, electrical work, and mechanical work) so that we can continue moving forward with new systems for our geothermal system. The two pictures below show the boilers before demolition began and in the middle of being deconstructed.





Second, and here's the place where you really need to pay attention: as of this week we have NO heat (or air conditioning) in the Sanctuary or Fellowship Hall! Please watch the weather as you prepare to come to services & events at church. If it's cold outside, wear a sweater for worship, adult Bible study class in Fellowship Hall, or Wednesday night supper. If it's warm outside, wear short sleeves. Our building will be like this for several weeks.

Easter Season: Discovering God Outside the Box

In 1945, German psychologist Karl Duncker conducted an experiment and instructed participants with the following challenge: to see if they could attach a candle to a cork board and light it. The trick was that the candle wax could not drip on the table below it, and they could only use a book of

matches and a box of thumbtacks, in addition to the candle, to complete the assignment.

Some participants tried to attach the candle to the wall using the thumb tacks, but the tacks wouldn't go all the way through the candle. Others tried to melt some of the candle's wax and use it as an adhesive to stick the candle against the wall, but that didn't work either. The actual solution to the puzzle required them to use the box containing the thumbtacks as well; they simply had to empty the thumbtacks out of the box and imagine it being used in another way. The candle could sit in the box, and the thumbtacks could be used to attach the box to the wall. That way, the box would catch the wax, preventing it from dripping on the table below.

It seems simple when you think about it, and for some participants it was. If they were presented with thumbtacks, an empty box, and a book of matches, almost all of the participants completed the task pretty easily. However, if they were presented with a box that was already filled with thumbtacks, participants were over 50 percent less likely to solve the puzzle.

The experiment was designed to measure what Dunker called "functional fixedness." He hypothesized that the original function of the box to hold the tacks limited people's ability to imagine any other alternative for it.

I wonder if you and I approach our faith with a functional fixedness based on our ideas about who God is and how God works in the world. Early in our faith journeys, many of us were actually taught to put God in a box. However, as we have grown, we've discovered that these boxes aren't necessarily helpful, because we follow a God is always working outside the boxes we put God in. The resounding message of Easter is that just when we think we have God pegged...God always surprises. The Holy One always breaks down our preconceived notions, never adheres to our expectations, and is more expansive than you and I can comprehend.

Our sermons throughout this season of Easter will invite us to think – and ultimately – to live out our faith "outside the box." To consider how we view people who are considered "outside the boundaries" of our own traditions. We'll be looking at the out-of-the-box ways in which God works in the world, learning from outside-the-box people in Scripture, and discovering together what it looks like to be a church who lives out our faith outside the box. Join us in worship throughout this Easter season!




