Thank You, Fred Bogert

In Luke 10, a lawyer approaches Jesus and says, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Of course, Jesus immediately throws the question back at him. "What does the law say," Jesus asks the man, "and how do YOU read it?" And he responds, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength, and love your neighbor as yourself."

Like a student in a spelling bee, he immediately spits back the correct answer. Maybe it's why Jesus is so quick to say, "You have given the right answer. Do this, and you will live." We often know the right answer. "Just do it," like Nike would tell us, are the words we really need to hear. In fact, the verb Jesus uses here could actually be translated to mean "keep doing this." Because loving God and loving one another are not a one-time occurrence that we check off the list. We keep doing them. And of course, we will never get it right 100% of the time, which is why we are to keep at it. "Keep doing this," he says, and "you will live."

When we set out to truly to love God with all that is within us, and to love one another as ourselves, I think we discover something that we can't know from simply saying the right answer, which is that these things can't happen without the other. There is something about loving God than is always going to lead us toward a greater love for our neighbor. And there's something about loving our neighbors, and being loved by our neighbors, that always helps us to discover even more about God's love for us.

If I could summarize in just a few words what Fred Bogert's ministry with Friday Church has meant to us, I would say that he has beautifully lived out the answer to this question in Luke. Because Friday Church is an embodiment of what love of God and love of neighbor look like. And Fred has kept at it! For over a decade, he has showed up, week after week, with passion, and creativity, and JOY, and humor, and a God-sized imagination. With a love and belief in this community of faith,

and a love and awe and wonder for the God who meets us here.

Grady Nutt once said late in his life, "I believe that the essence of living is this: to look back across your life, and with a solid smile on your face, to say, "Wow, I'm really glad I did that." And Fred, I know that you have not just a solid smile, but a HUGE smile on your face when you look back over the past years at Friday Church. And we have the same. We're really glad you did that, too.

So let's keep doing this, friends. Keep loving God, and keep loving one another. Keep at it. And by God's grace, which is higher and wider and longer and deeper than you and I can ever imagine, "you will live."

It used to be dirt and rock but is now permanently filled with heat pumps, blowers, duct work, and other essentials that will one day cool the sanctuary.

These fears were allayed when I stumbled into Highland Baptist Church after moving to Louisville in 2015.

I'm incredibly thankful for the community I've found here (especially in the Good Time Gospel Hour group). I would be honored to have the opportunity to follow my mother's example and grow my faith through service as a deacon.

When I was a child, I did not attend church except sunrise services on Easter with my aunt and VBS with the lady next door. Around the age of 14, I started going to church with my cousins, I made my private profession of faith when I was 16, then joined that church publicly at the end of a week-long revival and singing about 30 verses of the hymn "Just As I Am."

I continued going to that church for many years until the pastor started preaching against the sins of homosexuality. My partner and I left and went to a much more moderate church, where I served as a deacon and on many committees. Eventually, some students from Southern Seminary starting causing problems for me. My pastor recommended that I try attending Highland, where his friend Joe Phelps was pastor. When I came here I just wanted to sit in the pew and be fed! But after about a year I was asked to be a greeter, and later to serve on the worship committee and as a deacon. I am very honored to be asked once again! I can't think of another group of people that I would rather walk beside in this crazy world we live in!


ApplePay and PayPal Now Accepted on Highland's Website


