Engaging with the Liturgies of Cole Arthur Riley

"Liturgy comes awake in the arms of the collective. This is my invitation.

We get free together." ~ Cole Arthur Riley

Have there been occasions when you wanted to participate in liturgy that has not yet been written? What does it mean for us, as a primarily white congregation, to think together about Black Liturgies? How can we find healing and empowerment from the spiritual practices offered in this beautifully written work?



In her latest book, *Black Liturgies: Prayers, Poems, and Meditations for Staying Human*, bestselling author Cole Arthur Riley explores the sacred, often communal experience of liturgy, including breath prayers, poetry, letters, confession, benediction, and more. For the next three Wednesday nights, we will come together to consider these compelling questions!

- August 28 This will be an *embodied liturgy experience* led by David Tribble and Noelle Tennis Gulden.
- **September 4** Using quotes and examples from the book, Erin Phelps and Vicki Runnion will *lead a discussion about the communal concept of liturgy* and what it means for us to engage with black liturgy specifically.
- **September 11** Join Abbi Wolfe, Brooke Hasl, and Sally Evans for a *collective liturgical* writing experience with a white, anti-racist focus as an act of solidarity and liberation.



Following our 11:15 AM worship on Sunday, September 8, the congregation will finally celebrate our traditional "Gather Round" day. Reservoirs of Faith

This weekend was full of events to thank, affirm, and equip our deacons at Highland. Every time I am with our deacons, I am reminded that they are the heartbeat of our community of faith. They

help me keep a "pulse check" on the life of the congregation, and they give of themselves in such beautiful and selfless ways to care for the family of God in this place.



On Saturday, our incoming and returning deacons gathered at Robin and Buddy Lee's house. Our time was rich with sharing stories, building stronger connections, receiving from the deep well of Bob Cunningham's pastoral wisdom, and preparing ourselves, both logistically and spiritually, for the year ahead.





On Sunday, we ordained Kelly Garrett, Noelle Tennis Gulden, Bonnie Lindsay, Corey Moran, Genene Nisbet, Charlie Suer, and David Swim to deacon ministry, and we installed Gene Streible, Roy Fuller, Greg Bunton, and Bruce Carroll to another term of deacon service. I shared with them about the book *The Giving Tree*, which tells a story about a tree who gives and gives of herself until she has nothing but a tree stump left. I suggested that a better model of service for all of us is what Bernard of Clairvaux, a 12th century monk, once pointed out. He said that some of us spend our lives like "channels" and others like "reservoirs." "If you are wise," he said, "you will be reservoirs and not channels. The channels let water flow away, and do not retain a drop. But the

reservoir is first filled, and then, without emptying itself, pours out of its overflow. How many there are who are devoted to works, who are never anything but channels, but remain dry while trying to pass on life-giving grace to souls! We have far too many channels in the Church today, and far too few reservoirs."

We took time to acknowledge one of the overflowing reservoirs of faith among us, Procter Eubank, and affirmed him as an Honor Deacon at Highland. Procter has served from such a deep well of love for Highland, having been here since he was two years old! He has served eight terms as a deacon, his first in 1971 (see bulletin photo below), and twice as a Chair of Deacons. We are evergrateful for Procter and Joey and the ways they both selflessly pour out their overflow for the sake of others.



To our outgoing deacons, Kim Clark, Libby Cunningham, Kim Fritschi, Walter Hargrove, Robert Kahne, Kathey Golightly Sanders, Allison Todd, and Marilyn Whisler, I don't want this weekend to pass by without thanking you for your servant leadership over the past three years. We ordained and installed you in the midst of COVID - with masks on, being careful not to get "too close" during the laying on of hands. You have served in such significant ways in the midst of joys and griefs, congregational transitions, and brave new beginnings. Highland is the beautiful community of faith that we are because of people like each of you. And to Tyler Swim, our outgoing Chair of Deacons: you have brought such faithful dedication to our shared work, grounded in your deep love for the family of God in this place. Thank you for your servant leadership and all the ways you have guided us.

Thanks be to God for all of these deep reservoirs of faith, service, and love among us. May we learn from, give to, and receive from these deacons as we journey in faith together.


Pema Chödrön, an 87-year-old American Buddhist nun, lives and teaches in Nova Scotia. She wonders, "How can we relax and have a genuine, passionate relationship with the fundamental uncertainty, the groundlessness, of being human?...Discomfort arises from all of our efforts to put ground under our feet, to realize our dream of constant okayness...When we embrace the groundlessness of our situation and relax into its dynamic quality, that's called awakening to our true nature, to our fundamental goodness."

Retreat attenders will look to Pema Chödrön's teaching about the three commitments that lead to a deep experience of freedom. We will also consider a few Christian theologians who affirm our groundedness in God. Join us on this experience of collective wondering, tangible practice, and mutual efforts to embrace human groundlessness while loving a grounded God.



Rev. Dr. Lauren Jones Mayfield and Rev. Dr. Tyler D. Mayfield will co-lead the retreat. Lauren serves as the Interim Director of Field Education at Louisville Seminary, where Tyler also works as the Interim Dean and Professor of Old Testament.




