


QCC on September 22

131 and Still Not Done, Highland's Faithful Giving Season Begins!



As we enter our time of pledging for our 2025 Ministry budget of \$1.3 million and ongoing pledging/giving toward our Sacred Space campaign we invite you to join us in celebration of our heritage. For over 130 years Highland Baptist Church has been a staple of the community of the Highlands and beyond. As we celebrate our 131st year as a church and a congregation, we look for new ways to build on that legacy. One critical part of that legacy is the generosity of the congregation in allowing Highland to fulfill its ministry. We strive to continue this life changing work!

As you know, we have two ongoing financial needs. First, we hope that you will consider how you are able to provide financial support for the ministries of Highland Baptist Church and make a

pledge to the 2025 Ministry Fund.

Second, we continue the Sacred Space campaign that was started two years ago to ensure our Sacred Space remains welcoming and usable for current and future generations. With the physical work finishing up, we still have financial work to do to support the new HVAC system. The very generous gifts we have received so far have given us much of the funds necessary, though we still need approximately \$900,000 in gifts/pledges. At present, we are paying almost \$550 a day on our loans. Every dollar given now helps decrease that expense. During this giving season, we hope you will consider whether you are able to make a new, or increase your current, commitment to the Sacred Space campaign.

In the coming weeks, you will hear more about pledging for 2025. You will receive pledge cards in the mail. We hope you will prayerfully consider how to participate in this moment - how you can support our church to build upon the best parts of our 131 years of community, activism, inclusion, and Christ-lead love that Highland Baptist Church has brought to our congregation, to Louisville, and beyond.

Discovering the Unshakable: A Three-Part Worship Series

In 1952, Harry Emerson Fosdick gave a series of lectures at the Pacific School of Religion called "A Faith for Tough Times." That year in the State of the Union Address, President Truman warned Americans that we were "moving through a perilous time" at the threshold of the Cold War, and by the end of the year, the U.S. had tested our first thermonuclear bomb in the Pacific.

I have often heard Fosdick's lectures referenced for their depth of spiritual wisdom during such a tumultuous time in our country, but I've never come across a copy of them. However, this week I discovered a hidden gem: <u>audio recordings of his lecture series available online</u>. As I've been listening to such rich history, I am amazed at how Fosdick's words in 1952 transcend time and seem to speak directly to us in 2024, almost 75 years later.

Fosdick says, "The hydrogen bomb makes everything seem perishable...But can it be that life is not all flux? Is there something else here – abiding, everlasting? That question goes to the heart of

our faith. What does life mean in a mess of a world like this?

Christian faith maintains its assurance, despite the world's disorder, by centering its attention on something else – not fast nor noisy but quiet, unobtrusive, inconspicuous, and vital...The highest use of a shaken time is to discover the unshakable. When everything that can totter is staggering, then is the time to get your eyes on what stands firm."



This week, we begin a 3-part worship series called "Discovering the Unshakable" inspired by Fosdick's lectures and the wisdom of the Psalms. To kick off this series, we have the privilege of hearing from our Honor Deacons. This Sunday, September 22, I will be interviewing Procter Eubank, Nancy Goodhue, Jim Hawkins, and Reece Little in worship. Over the years, Procter, Nancy, Jim, and Reece have each experienced and discovered ways to stay spiritually grounded in the midst of challenging seasons in our world and in their own lives. What a gift that we can receive from the deep wells of wisdom and spiritual insight they will share with us. Believe me, you won't want to miss hearing from them!



Christian Nationalism: Reading and Learning Together

As many of us do, I'm always paying attention to what others are reading and adding books to my

list to check-out from the library or purchase. When several people mention a particular book to me, I usually bump it up the list. That's exactly what happened earlier this year when a pastor friend recommended the book *The Kingdom, The Power, and The Glory: American Evangelicalism in an Age of Extremism* by Tim Alberta as one of the most insightful and important reads on what is happening in the evangelical Church today. The next week, Robert Davis shared that he was reading it, too. Then Robin Ramsay Lee mentioned it at lunch one day. I purchased the book that day, and it's come up in countless conversations ever since.



Alberta writes from his perspective as a political journalist, a practicing Christian, and the son of an evangelical pastor. After the unexpected death of his father in 2019, Alberta expected to receive condolences and love from his father's congregation at the funeral. Instead, person after person offered him critical remarks about his recent political writing. "In our house of worship," he writes, "people were taunting me about politics as I tried to mourn my father."

After that experience, he sets out to interview pastors, churches, and organizations across the country in order to piece together what he believes is the foundational problem in evangelicalism. "America," one pastor says to him. "Too many of them worship America."

As *Publishers Weekly* has shared, "Alberta adeptly illustrates how Christian nationalism is 'destroying the evangelical church' on a big-picture level, as well as how it's justified individually,

framed scripturally, and blared over pulpits...While he suggests a 'true Christianity' might still be salvageable, Alberta's own evidence reveals how deep the rot has already spread. It's an incisive, unsparing look at a movement in crisis."

On October 16, 23, and 30, Bruce Maples, Robert Davis, and I will be co-leading a Wednesday night series on Christian Nationalism and will facilitate discussion around excerpts from Alberta's book. While reading the book in advance is not necessary, we wanted to give you plenty of time to join us in reading before the conversation if you're interested. If you're like me, you might consider bumping this book up your list. It offers significant insight into this election season and awakens all of us to the dangers of marrying our love of "God" and "country."

Young Adult Collaboratory at Princeton Theological Seminary

I am so excited to share about a grant program Highland has received! Highland has been invited to participate in the Ministry Collaboratory at Princeton Theological Seminary on Sept. 19th – Sept. 22nd. The Collaboratory is designed for churches that want to enhance and understand how to better serve the young adults within their community. Funding for the Collaboratory was provided by the Lily Foundation.

There are two main requirements for our participation in this program. First, the Collaboratory requires that each church send the pastor working with young adults AND a young adult from the church. Abbi Wolfe, the chair of the Young Adult Ministry Group, has graciously agreed to travel with me and be our young adult representative.

The second requirement is that by participating in this Collaboratory, Highland will be awarded a \$500 micro-grant to put on an event for young adults in our community. The catch is that we cannot do an event at the church itself but must use the money out in the community. The Young Adult Ministry Group will be working and coordinating plans for that future event.

This is an amazing opportunity to strengthen our already growing, strong, and vibrant young adult community here at Highland. When Abbi Wolfe and I return, we will be sharing more about what we have learned and future plans for our use of this grant.

Pema Chödrön, an 87-year-old American Buddhist nun, lives and teaches in Nova Scotia. She wonders, "How can we relax and have a genuine, passionate relationship with the fundamental uncertainty, the groundlessness, of being human?...Discomfort arises from all of our efforts to put ground under our feet, to realize our dream of constant okayness...When we embrace the groundlessness of our situation and relax into its dynamic quality, that's called awakening to our true nature, to our fundamental goodness."

Retreat attenders will look to Pema Chödrön's teaching about the three commitments that lead to a deep experience of freedom. We will also consider a few Christian theologians who affirm our groundedness in God. Join us on this experience of collective wondering, tangible practice, and mutual efforts to embrace human groundlessness while loving a grounded God.



Rev. Dr. Lauren Jones Mayfield and Rev. Dr. Tyler D. Mayfield will co-lead the retreat. Lauren serves as the Interim Director of Field Education at Louisville Seminary, where Tyler also works as the Interim Dean and Professor of Old Testament.




