2025 Pledge Season Update

As of Sunday, November 3, 98 pledges have been made toward our 2025 Ministry Fund totaling \$553,438. This is an increase of 24 pledges and more than \$110,000 over the past two weeks. Additional pledges to the Sacred Space campaign remain at just over \$97,000 compared with the numbers reported two weeks ago. We are a bit below where we were with pledging last year at this time when we had received 122 pledges for the 2024 Ministry Fund totaling \$610,962. Your pledges make a crucial difference in Highland's numerous ministries and are especially important in helping us as we are adding \$120,000 in loan payments for our recent facilities renovations into

the 2025 Budget. Thank you for assisting with the budgeting process with your pledge, but most of all thank you for your generosity!

No commitment is too small, so keep those pledges coming! Our goal is to have 100% participation. If you haven't already done so, you are invited to make your pledge by any of the following methods:

Associate Pastor Search Update

On behalf of the Personnel Ministry Group and the Search Committee for the Associate Pastor position, we are writing to let you know that we have paused the search process until next year. We have notified all applicants about this decision.

Because the church is still in process of finalizing a budget for 2025, we believe the search

process is best paused now and restarted in alignment with our work with the Center for Congregational Health regarding implementation of mission and vision of our church. Current applicants as well as future applicants will be considered. We strongly believe that this role is necessary for the health of church; we hope to re-consider the salary for the position after the 2025 budget is finalized. We want to ensure we can move forward to attract the best candidates for this position while being fiscally responsible. Church operations and management as well as faith formation continue to be essential functions the Personnel Ministry Group sees as priorities for next year.

An Important Apology

On October 25 President Joe Biden made a long-awaited apology to survivors and Indigenous communities on behalf of the U.S. government for forcibly removing Native children from their families and placing them in boarding schools. This practice, which lasted from 1819 through 1969,

was part of a strategy to deal with "the Indian problem" by destroying Indigenous cultures and family ties and assimilating the children into the dominant American culture. Many of the children endured abuse of every kind—physical, emotional, and sexual. They were forced into hard labor, were malnourished, and punished for speaking their own language. Many never returned home. Nearly a thousand children died. Many of the government boarding schools were actually run by Christian denominations and churches.



At the heart of the Christian faith is living by these words of Jesus: "love God with all your heart, soul, and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself." Admitting wrongdoing, repenting, and making amends to do what we can to right a wrong done to a fellow human is so important Jesus said to do that before you give your offering to God (Matt. 5:23–24). Though it is unlikely any of us at Highland Baptist had anything directly to do with the boarding schools, as with slavery we have inherited what our ancestors have done and the consequences, and we can be part of the movement to make amends.

The Indigenous nations have mostly welcomed President Biden's apology—and they point out that it is a good *first* step. They look for action to make the apology meaningful.

One important action would be for the U.S. government to pay for language revitalization for all the tribes, since the government's actions caused a generation to lose the ability to speak their own language and. Currently, tribes have to compete against each other for grant dollars for language programs, according to Joseph Rupnick, Illinois's Prairie Band Potawatomi chairperson, whose mother was three years old when federal agents took her from her parents and sent her to a Catholic boarding school in another state. She never spoke her first language again.

Another important action is to bring home the bodies of children who died and are buried at the boarding schools and have them buried in their own communities.

A third action would be to establish a Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies as has been used in other countries like Canada and South Africa. A bill being considered in the House of Representatives—HR 7227—would form such a commission.

November is National Native American Month. We Highland people can honor Indigenous people and support Indigenous communities by urging our elected officials to engage in these and other acts of reparation. More information about how you can respond will follow on Sunday and in next week's newsletter.




