An Update from our Interim Pastor

I have three guick items to share with you.

First, the Personnel Ministry Group, which has the responsibility of hiring interim staff members, has selected Rev. John Kupar as the Interim Associate Pastor to Youth. John is an ordained PCUSA minister who most recently served as an Associate Pastor and led the youth ministry at Anchorage Presbyterian Church. In his interview, John displayed a passion for working with youth, and we feel he is an ideal person to step into this role at this time. This is a part-time position at 25-28 hours per week. John will begin his time with us on September 15, and we will be sharing more about him and his family in next week's newsletter.

Second, please be sure to watch for the 2026 Ministry Plan which will be emailed soon. It explains our ministries in ways that might give you a new appreciation for Highland. For example, did you know we

make a \$90,000 in-kind contribution to our community every year? Please read the Ministry Plan to learn more, and please be considering your level of ministry support through giving in 2026.

Third, I'll be leading a four-week Sunday afternoon small group beginning October 12. Members from Broadway Baptist Church will also be in the group, which will meet both here and at Broadway. Pleasant words are a honeycomb, sweet to the soul and healing to the bones. Tell me a honeycomb!




