

#### Offering for Global Mission

October is the month in which we collect our Offering for Global Mission. This year's theme is **Embracing Neighbors**, **Nurturing Hope**.



Theme verse: Colossians 3:12-14

As a Baptist church, Highland has chosen to connect with other like-minded Baptists in the United States and around the world by being a part of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, which you'll hear more about next Sunday. The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship works in the US and globally in a variety of ways, and the offering we collect this month helps support that effort by funding the dozens of field personnel who work with CBF.

The word (and maybe even the concept of) "missions" can bring up many images for us - some positive, some negative. I am pleased that old-style paternalistic missions, with assumptions of cultural and theological superiority are not a part of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. CBF fosters true partnerships between themselves and local, national, and international bodies of like-minded believers. Highland supports local and regional CBF field personnel such as Scarlett Jasper. The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship is Highland's primary denominational affiliation, and this offering is the most significant way we show our support. This year's goal is \$7500.


