Offering for Global Mission

October is the month in which we collect our Offering for Global Mission. This year's theme is **Embracing** Neighbors, Nurturing Hope.



The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF) has field personnel right here in Louisville. Annette Ellard along with her husband Steve Clark were commissioned by CBF in 2006. Annette and Steve first felt God's call to full-time missions after joining their church in a short-term mission project in Thailand. Over the next few years, they made several trips back to Thailand, visiting Karen villages and learning about Karen people fleeing war in Burma and living in refugee camps.

Just three months after they were commissioned, the US Department of State began a massive resettlement of the Karen and other refugees from Burma to cities across the U.S., including Louisville. Within months, their ministry shifted and they began working to encourage local CBF churches to welcome refugees into their homes, into their churches, and into their lives, just as the Karen in Thailand had welcomed them.

Early on, they realized the ministry must be about building strong relationships, even as they worked to meet basic physical and spiritual needs. Though an ever evolving and expanding ministry of availability and accompaniment, Annette and Steve connect newly arrived refugees to a church home and friendships while providing pastoral care, social work, crisis management and advocacy.

Now having spent years building strong relationships with these Karen, Chin, and Karenni refugees from Burma, Annette and Steve strive to be relentless advocates for them. Annette strives to be the presence of Christ by offering encouragement and comfort in the greatest celebrations and most trying struggles of these refugees' lives.

Given the current crisis here in the US with the refugee and immigrant population, we need more people like Annette who are willing to advocate for them. By contributing to the Global Missions Offering, you are helping Annette and many more CBF Field Personnel be the hands and feet of Christ during this hostile time in our society. I pray that you will be led to support Annette in her ministry here in Louisville and others around the world.

For our upcoming Wednesday night study series, I am going full professor by providing you the course description I use at Simmons for the topic we will be looking at. Here it is:




