INTRODUCTION

We hope you enjoy these Lent family devotionals! Read one devotional per week, and use the corresponding object from the Lent bag for the extension activities.

INCARNATION: GOD AT THE TABLE

Caleb loved dinner at his grandma's house. Every Sunday, his whole family squeezed around her long wooden table, where she served warm bread, steaming soup, and sweet fruit. Grandma always smiled as she passed the food around. "A table is a place to remember we belong to each other," she would say.

One Sunday, after dinner, Caleb's dad opened the Bible. "Tonight, let's read about another meal—one that Jesus shared with His disciples."

Caleb listened as his dad turned to **Luke 22** and began reading about **the night before Jesus died.**

"Jesus and His disciples were in a small upstairs room, gathered around a table. They had celebrated this meal before—it was the **Passover**, a special meal God's people ate to remember how He had rescued them. But this time, Jesus did something different."

Caleb leaned closer.

"Jesus picked up a loaf of bread, broke it into pieces, and passed it around. 'This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.'

Then, He lifted a cup of wine. **'This cup is the new promise, made with my blood. It is poured out for you.''**

Caleb's eyes widened. "Jesus was talking about Himself?"

His dad nodded. "Yes. "One day, Jesus was praying, and His disciples were watching Him. When He finished, one of them asked, 'Lord, teach us to pray.' So Jesus said, 'When you pray, say this..."

Then, she read the words of the **Lord's Prayer**:

"Our Father in heaven, holy is Your name. Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread, and forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil."

Greta listened carefully. "Jesus taught them how to pray?"

"Yes," her grandmother said. "Prayer isn't about saying perfect words—it's about talking to God, just like you talk to me."

"But sometimes, I don't know what to say," Greta admitted.

Her grandmother nodded. "That's why Jesus gave us this prayer—to show us how. Look at the words. First, we call God our Father. That means He loves us like a parent. Then, we ask for His help, His guidance, and His forgiveness."

Extension Activity:

That night, Ben's family read a Bible story together. His mom turned to **Matthew 5** and began to read about **Jesus' Sermon on the Mount.**

"Jesus was teaching a big crowd on a hillside," she explained. "He was telling them what it means to follow Him—to be on **Jesus' team!**"

Ben sat up straight. "Jesus has a team?"

"Yes!" his mom smiled. "And His team has special rules, just like your soccer team. But instead of scoring goals, Jesus' team is about living God's way."

Ben listened as she read:

- "Be kind, even when others aren't kind to you."
- "Forgive people, even when they hurt your feelings."
- "Help others, not so people will think you're awesome, but because it's the right thing to do."
- "Trust God to take care of you."

Extension Activity:

EVANGELISM: GO AND TELL
