### The Moravian Lovefeast

The Lovefeast became a cherished part of Moravian worship after the spiritual renewal of August 13, 1727. On that day, in the context of shared worship and meals, Moravians rediscovered a sense of Christian unity and fellowship which had been threatened by personal hostilities and doctrinal disputes. Though the meal has been simplified, Moravians and their guests still experience the blessings of Christian fellowship as they share hymns of praise over coffee and sweetened buns. Because the Lovefeast has no sacramental significance, it provides an ideal forum for celebrating Christian unity in a world where doctrinal disputes still fracture Christ's church.


### The Serving of the Lovefeast

The female dieners (servers) will bring a basket of sweet buns to each pew. The person on the aisle receives the basket and passes it to (but not over) the divider. If you are in the balcony, pass the basket to the end of the row. Each person is invited to take a napkin and one bun as the basket returns. The male dieners (servers) will then bring trays of beverages to each pew. There is a choice of decaffeinated coffee (unsweetened, with half and half) or chocolate milk. As best as you can in each pew, please take a count of your beverage preferences and pass it on to the person seated along the aisle. For example, "Our pew would like two chocolate milks, and three coffees." Worshippers wait until all have been served, and we have shared in the blessing. Thereafter, worshippers partake of the Lovefeast while the choir provides the ministry of music. Later, servers will return to collect the mugs while the worship continues.

### **About Today's Music**

Most appropriate for the celebration of our historic sanctuary's dedication, we are pleased to present selections by pastor-composers with direct connections to our church. The piano solo played for the Prelude, Menuetto and Trio, was discovered recently in a manuscript book owned by Eliza Kampman, who joined the Lititz Single Sisters' House in May 1807. "J. F. F." is notated in the score, likely the initials of Johann Friedrich Früauff, pastor and principal of boarding school at Lititz now Linden Hall, from 1805-1815. For the Offertory anthem, three hymns by Herbst, pastor from 1791-1811 and principal of the school from 1794-1802, will be performed in newly edited versions with verses in German and English. The German text was added to Herbst's original music and transcribed in a separate handwritten volume by Jacob Van Vleck, who succeeded Herbst as pastor in Lititz and served from 1811-12. This volume was recently re-discovered in the Bethlehem Archives during cataloging of the "Van Vleck" box. The English verses are from Herbst's original source, Hymns to be Sung at the Pianoforte, the majority of which were probably written in Lititz. The first anthem in the Lovefeast was also composed by Herbst for the dedication of our church in 1787, for which he had traveled from Lancaster to play the organ and conduct the anthem. In 1791, Herbst returned to Lititz and served first as assistant pastor and headmaster of the boarding school. He eventually became head pastor and, just before leaving for Salem, NC in 1811, was ordained a bishop. He died there on January 15, 1812.


## Blessing of The Backpacks

### God's Fire

Today is the anniversary of the children's revival in Herrnhut in 1727, just four days after the experience of August 13. It started when eleven-year-old Susanna Kuhnel, who had lost her mother, experienced the loving presence of Christ in her life. She was so overcome with joy that she led other children into similar experiences of inner joy. Her story reminds us that children have religious experiences and can play a role in the life of the church.

The joyfulness of our children's festival day doesn't seem to fit with lectionary lessons for today, but it does. In Luke 12 Jesus sounds more like John the Baptist than the Prince of Peace, with his pronouncements about bringing fire to the earth and causing division. Even families will be divided by his message. How could this be good news? Jesus uses the metaphor of fire to describe the change that the gospel brings. Fire consumes, but fire also brings new life. The wildfires in the western states are devastating, but from the ashes new plants grow.

Moravians have often used fire as a metaphor for the change people experience when they give themselves to Christ. Some things in their old life, like hatred and greed, are burned away so they can pursue a new life lived in love. They see the world differently. Sadly, sometimes friends, neighbors, and even family members do not understand such a spiritual transformation. In the song "The Times They Are A-changing," Bob Dylan urged parents not to criticize what they did not understand. Their sons and daughters were beyond their command, because the times were rapidly changing. Like fire, spiritual transformation and personal change can be frightening as we turn away from old habits, but like a wildfire they can bring new life.
