Scripture: Colossians 1:18-20 (The Message)

We look at this Son and see the God who cannot be seen. We look at this Son and see God's original purpose in everything created. For everything, absolutely everything, above and below, visible and invisible, rank after rank after rank of angels—everything got started in him and finds its purpose in him. [Jesus] was there before any of it came into existence and holds it all together right up to this moment. And when it comes to the church, he organizes and holds it together, like a head does a body. [Jesus] was supreme in the beginning and—leading the resurrection parade—he is supreme in the end. From beginning to end he's there, towering far above everything, everyone. So spacious is he, so expansive, that everything of God finds its proper place in him without crowding. Not only that, but all the broken and dislocated pieces of the universe—people and things, animals and atoms—get properly fixed and fit together in vibrant harmonies, all because of [Jesus'] death, his blood that poured down from the cross.

Matthew 23:1-10 (The Message)

Now Jesus turned to address his disciples, along with the crowd that had gathered with them. "The religion scholars and Pharisees are competent teachers in God's Law. You won't go wrong in following their teachings on Moses. But be careful about following them. They talk a good line, but they don't live it. They don't take it into their hearts and live it out in their behavior. It's all spit-and-polish veneer. "Instead of giving you God's Law as food and drink by which you can banquet on God, they package it in bundles of rules, loading you down like pack animals. They seem to take pleasure in watching you stagger under these loads, and wouldn't think of lifting a finger to help. Their lives are perpetual fashion shows, embroidered prayer shawls one day and flowery prayers the next. They love to sit at the head table at church dinners, basking in the most prominent positions, preening in the radiance of public flattery, receiving honorary degrees, and getting called 'Doctor' and 'Reverend.' "Don't let people do that to you, put you on a pedestal like that. You all have a single Teacher, and you are all classmates. Don't set people up as experts over your life, letting them tell you what to do. Save that authority for God; let him tell you what to do. No one else should carry the title of 'Father'; you have only one Father,

and he's in heaven. And don't let people maneuver you into taking charge of them. There is only one Life-Leader for you and them—[and that is] Christ.

A Note from Pastor Mark

All praise to God for the honor and privilege of serving as an ordained pastor in the Moravian Church, Northern Province for 35 years, and 18 years at Lititz Moravian my home congregation. My Siblings in Christ, thank you for your love and support. We have labored in God's vineyard experiencing the joys of successful ministries and the disappointments when despite our efforts we miss the mark. I had no idea when I arrived in February 2007 that I would serve you until 2025. It was an act of courage of the Joint Board at that time to call and welcome an African American pastor and family into this community of faith.

I confess that this past year I have been mindful of Saints Triumphant. Particularly when I look upon those seated in the sanctuary during worship, I remember my siblings now living with the Lord. I think of the Saints who served with me in the church office, boards, committees, and fellowship groups. Children and youth are the Church today and our hope for the future. I enjoyed having a role in their faith formation. They mentored me to see Jesus with an open heart, to laugh, be silly, and learn to share the gospel for each new generation. It was a privilege to share in team ministry with pastors Burt, Dean, and Sayward. Parish ministry is a challenge, and it was a blessing to learn from them, lean on them, and to love them as my brothers and sister.

Sunday, October 19, 2025, was a blessing. I was present for celebration for former pastors and staff, but I was not prepared for the expressions of love. I am so grateful to God for the years of ministry here at Lititz Moravian and I am humbled! All I wanted to do was to use my talents to "love" all people in Jesus' name. Thank you, Pastor Sayward, the office staff, our music ministry teams, and my wife Dee. I know she had a hand in the celebration. I entered the sanctuary, and it looked like an Easter morning celebration. I was confused seeing the pans in the sanctuary. I thought, "Why are the pans here and who will play them?" Looking at the Amen Pews I saw members of the Grace Steel Ensemble and I almost cried. They came from New York City to play for this service. The Moravian Church is a small denomination and some of my oldest ongoing relationships are in the clergy. It was a joy to see and hear from the Rev. Dr. Betsy Miller, the Rev. David Bennett, the Rt. Rev. Blair Couch, the Rev. Melissa Johnson, and the Rev. Dr. Mandy Mastros.

Thank you for the cards and retirement gifts. Thank you for the "Love Gift." Barbara McKenney told me we need to meet because she had a gift for Dee and me from the congregation. I opened the envelope, and I could not believe what I saw. Wow! I gave Barbara a big hug. I called Dee and I told her about the gift and Dee cried. We appreciate all of you and thank you!

You have always taken excellent care of me and my family.

The fellowship meal was delicious! Thanks to all who made the desserts and the meal. Ham and turkey sandwiches are good, but you cannot beat fried chicken and macaroni and cheese. My heart is full, and I love all of you! Thank you, again, for the privilege of serving as your pastor!

Jesus Reigns

We Moravians delight in singing these hymns of our faith: "Crown Him with Many Crowns," "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun," "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." These beautiful words affirm that we stand confident and hold fast in believing that Our Lord Jesus is indeed the Chief Elder of our denomination. Today our thoughts turn to the church leaders who in 1741 voted by lot to confirm Jesus Christ as Chief Elder and the Great Shepherd of our worldwide Moravian Church.

In the Old Testament, Isaiah prophesies the birth of a child who will become our King, who will reign and bring peace, justice, and righteousness. In the Gospel of John, we read Jesus' words: "I am the gate, whoever enters through me will be saved"; "I am the Good Shepherd, the Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep"; and "I know my sheep and my sheep know me" (John 10:9, 11, 14 NIV). What comfort we find in these words!

In this world of turmoil and constant disagreements, we can turn to Jesus, our constant and sustaining leader. We feel his presence in our worship services, Bible studies, prayer meetings, our times spent in nature, and our moments of meditation. We feel his leading as we volunteer for missions, teach Sunday school, donate food and resources for the hungry and underprivileged, provide activities for group home residents, visit the sick and lonely, and feed bereaved families.

As we continue our Christian journey. we fall back on words of St. Patrick:

"Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, . . . Christ to comfort and restore me."
