## Church Kitchen Renovation Overview

The renovation of the church kitchen is an exciting and necessary project aimed at improving the functionality, safety, and aesthetics of this crucial space. The church kitchen serves as a hub for a variety of community activities, from fellowship meals to special events and gatherings. This renovation provides a modern, efficient, and inviting environment for those who use it. The updates focus on both industrial-grade equipment and the structural and aesthetic components that elevate the overall experience for the church community.



# Key Renovation Areas:

## Industrial Kitchen Appliances with Countertops & Sinks

Stove: A commercial-grade stove replaced the old model, offering higher output and greater efficiency. This stove allows for faster cooking times, better heat distribution, and ease of use for large meal preparations, catering to both small and large groups.

Refrigerator: An upgraded, energy-efficient commercial refrigerator has been installed. This unit provides ample space for food storage, keeping ingredients fresh and accessible, and will be able to handle the volume of food prepared during church events.

Dishwasher: A new industrial dishwasher will ensure quick and thorough cleaning of large volumes of dishes, reducing manual labor and improving hygiene in the kitchen.

This upgrade will save time and energy while maintaining cleanliness and safety standards.

Countertops: The installation of durable, commercial-grade countertops will provide ample workspace for food preparation and organization. Materials such as stainless steel have been used, ensuring long-lasting performance, ease of cleaning, and a professional look.

Sinks: A series of deep, industrial sinks have been installed to accommodate large pots, pans, and dishwashing needs. These sinks are designed for easy cleaning and will allow for improved food prep and sanitation, crucial for a busy kitchen environment.

## Flooring

Epoxy Flooring: The new epoxy flooring will be both practical and visually appealing. This type of flooring is slip-resistant, durable, and easy to clean—ideal for a high-traffic kitchen. The non-porous surface helps prevent the buildup of germs and food particles, contributing to a healthier environment.

## Ceiling Tiles

Ceiling Tile Upgrade: The ceiling tiles have been replaced with new tiles and the tile grids have been cleaned and painted.

## Lighting

New Lighting Fixtures: Modern, energy-efficient lighting fixtures have been installed throughout the Social Hall. These will provide bright, uniform lighting. LED lights are being used for their energy efficiency, ensuring that the space is well-lit without driving up electricity costs.

## Painting

Fresh Coat of Paint: A fresh coat of non-toxic, washable paint has been applied to the walls, contributing to a brighter, more inviting atmosphere. The color palette will be chosen to enhance the kitchen's professional appearance while maintaining a warm and welcoming feel. The paint will also be durable and resistant to stains, making maintenance easy.

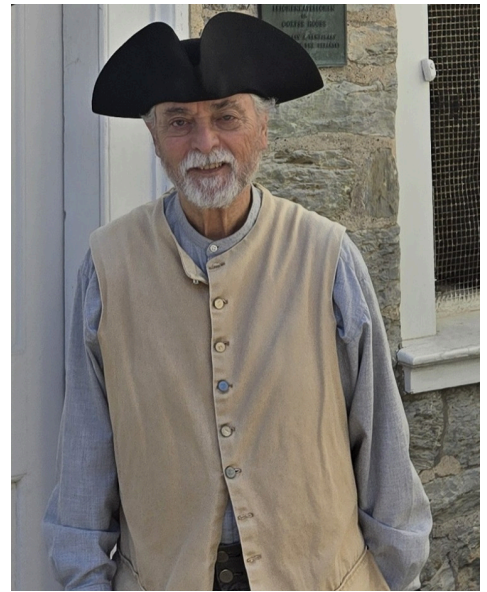

# MEET THE LMC STAFF

## Bob Turgyan Volunteer & Tour Guide



**This month's staff spotlight is Bob Turgyan. Bob, originally from Roebling, New Jersey, has lived here in Lititz for the past 22 years, 16 of which were shared with his wife, Laura. (Or fondly known as Mrs. Bob by some of our office staff) During this time Bob has been deeply involved with our LMC family as well as committing his time to the Lititz Historical Society as a tour guide for the past 12 years.**

**Bob has been a member of LMC for the past 16 years and filled many roles. Bob serves as an usher, diener, VBS volunteer, coordinator for Book of Remembrance, as well as coordinator for Archives tours, in addition to also volunteering his time in our main office each week.**

**When asked about a fond memory of Lititz, Bob chuckled and began his story of his first Easter in Lititz. Bob was living in his first apartment, here in Lititz, and he was told about the Trombone Choir playing for Easter morning in the square. Bob, at the time, lived near the square and was anxious to be awoken to hear the music. When Easter morning arrived, Bob awoke with the realization that he had not heard the Trombone Choir play that morning. Later that morning, Bob found Laura, (who was only just a friend at this time in his life) and told her that he had not heard the music. Laura, knowing members of the Trombone Choir, made sure to pass along Bob's disappointment and requested that they play right outside his door the following Easter morning. To this day, the Trombone Choir plays outside of Bob's door every Easter morning.**

**If given one wish, Bob became somber and said, "I would like to spend more time with my dad." Bob's father passed away from Pancreatic cancer in 1968, when Bob was only 17 years old. Bob smiled and reminisced about the summer they went to Wildwood, New Jersey, the summer before his father's passing.**

**Bob enjoys many parts of Lititz, aside from the vast history. Whether going out to have a Chicken Pesto Panini from Tomato Pie Cafe or having pizza from Nino's, Bob also enjoys spending his time sketching or reading a fiction/nonfiction historical book.**

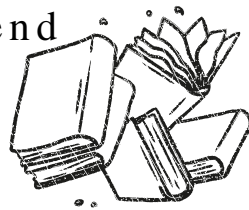

# Remembering and Celebrating the Adult Retreat

In 2007 the Christian Education Committee (CEC) had conversations to renew the successful family retreat held at Black Rock in Quarryville. Although funding and programming a multi-generational weekend program was a challenge, the retreat was a wonderful experience for the congregation. The memories of Black Rock gave birth to a “new” retreat focused on young and older adults. CEC met on the first Monday of the month and the committee renamed itself the Retreat Committee and scheduled meetings for the fourth Monday of the month.

The newly formed Adult Retreat moved to Kenbrook Bible Camp and Retreat Center in Lebanon, PA. We promoted the retreat as a weekend of relaxation, spiritual renewal, and fellowship. I remember weekends of eating tasty food, thoughtful table conversations, crazy games before going to bed, morning wake up from the retreat trombone players, and excellent program leaders that applied the theme to scriptures, Moravian history, and contemporary events. What I cherish the most is the blessing of getting to know the members and friends of the congregation.

November 2024 was the final Adult Retreat. Over the years the participants range from their twenties to eighties with members and friends of the Lancaster and Lititz Moravian Congregations. I praise God for the 17 years of the annual retreat. Due to Covid19 the Retreat Committee canceled the 2020 retreat. I am grateful to the former committee members for their efforts and made the retreat our reality. In addition to programming, the committee had fundraisers that reduced the retreat cost for everyone. It was a blessing to use the Minibus to provide transportation to and from the retreat.

The committee decided to end the present format of the retreat. It is time for change, and I look forward to the next version of the congregational retreat. Please hold the Christian Education Committee (CEC) in your prayer as they seek the Lord’s discernment.

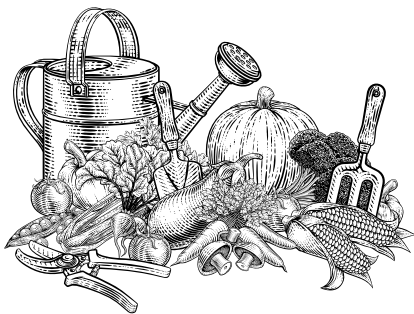


## The 2025 Lititz Moravian Community Garden

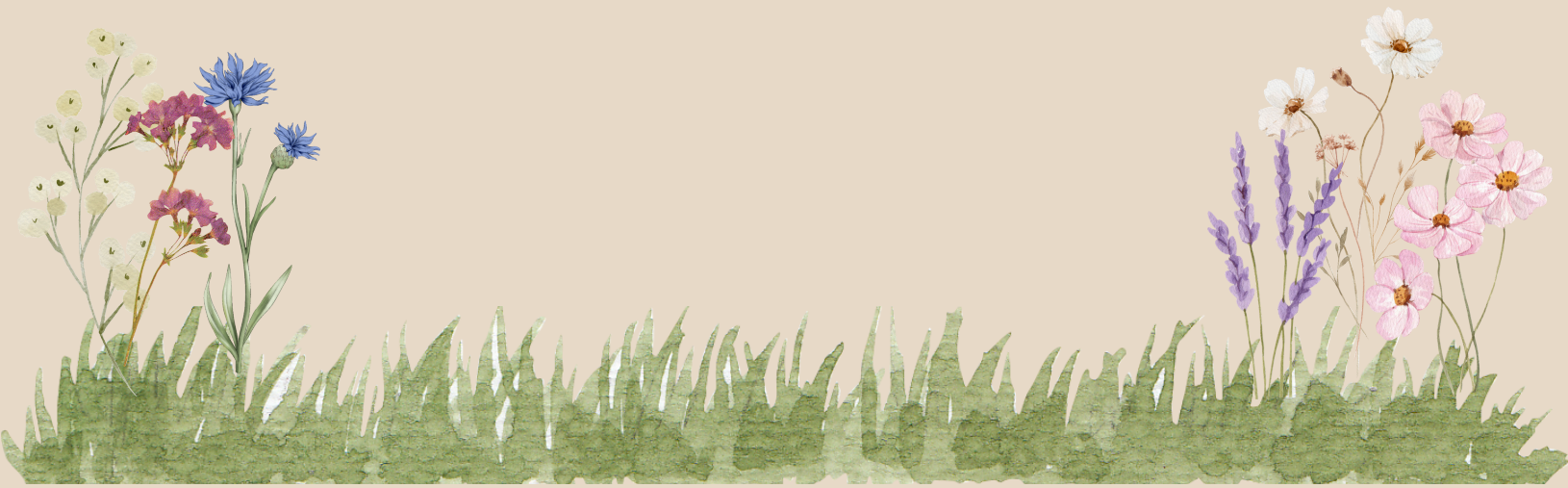

## **Highlights from the Board of Trustees Meeting March 18, 2025**

- It was moved and seconded to approve the Minutes from the Trustee Meeting of February 18, 2025. Motion Carried Unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded to approve the February financial report. Motion Carried Unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded to request a proposal from CEC for plans to redecorate the CEB lobby on the south side of the building to be approved by the property and maintenance committee. Motion Carried Unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded that the spare room off the RAO room that is not being currently used can be made a makeshift audio/visual studio as long as there are no issues raised when Pastor Sayward addresses the current use of the space. Motion carried unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded that we accept the donation of an iPad and kiosk as proposed to be used and managed by the office staff for events and to support gathering information for congregation initiatives. Motion carried unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded that the budgeted expense for camera upgrades would come from Property and Maintenance and anything that exceeds the budgeted expenses will come from the Technology Advancement Fund (RGA122). Motion carried unanimously.
- It was moved and seconded that anticipating there will be additional funds required to cover the balance of kitchen expenses, the remaining expenses, up to \$10,000, will come from the Property and Maintenance checking account. Motion carried unanimously.
- A motion was made and seconded to purchase a new garage door for Rosemont Parsonage. Motion carried unanimously.
- A motion was made and seconded to make necessary bathroom repairs to the Rosemont Parsonage as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- A motion was made and seconded to end the Trustee meeting at 8:15pm. Motion Carried Unanimously.

## **Highlights from Archive Committee Mtg. April 18, 2025**

- TREASURER'S REPORT: A motion was made and passed to move some of the archives funds into a six-month CD with a higher interest rate. 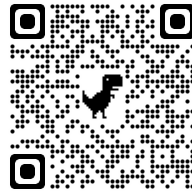
