



THE SUMMARY OF THE LAW



THE FIRST LESSON JEREMIAH 29:1, 4-7

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.



THE SECOND LESSON 2 TIMOTHY 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself. Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

THE SERMON The Rev. F. Stuart Shelby

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.



The people kneel. The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

THE INVITATION

All baptized Christians are welcome to receive Communion at the Lord's Table. Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited forward to receive a blessing; cross your arms over your chest so the minister will know to pray for you.

To receive Holy Communion:

- Come forward by rows and kneel at the altar rail.
- You may eat the bread and then drink from the cup, or intinct (dip) the bread into the wine when the cup is presented, or the Chalice Minister will intinct for you.
- If you are unable to approach the altar, signal an usher and the Sacrament will be brought to you.
- Gluten-free wafers are available. Just say "gluten-free" to the minister.

ANTHEM STORY

Let All Who Seek was composed by our very own Dr. Minear as part of the Arts Fellowship Orlando in the spring of 2025. Inspired by Psalm 13, the (apocryphal) Gospel of Thomas, and Revelation, it contemplates the struggle of faith through doubt and suffering. Note how the voices cross above and below each other ("cross the threshold of this life") with modulatory, uncertain harmonies until they reach a glorious ascending major chord ("live in the Lord"). The pitch D, which served as the tonal home base in the earlier D-minor sections, transforms into the center of the climactic B-flat major chord; just as we are all transformed by our experiences and our faith. The piece moves from lamentation to acceptance, and finally to a single voice praying for us all to persevere through difficulty.

The communion anthem, *Like as the Hart* by the great 20th-century English composer Herbert Howells, reflects a similar yearning of the soul for God's presence. Setting the words of Psalm 42, "Like as the hart desireth the waterbrooks," Howells conveys deep spiritual longing through his hallmark lush harmonies and arching melodic lines. Composed in 1941 amid the turmoil of World War II, the work embodies both human vulnerability and steadfast faith. Those going on our pilgrimage next summer will be touring Gloucester Cathedral, where Herbert Howells was once a student!
