Opener

How would you describe your Thanksgiving traditions? Do you look forward to it or do you dread it?

Read

Mark 12:13-17; 1 Timothy 2:1-2a; John 11:45-48; 2 Corinthians 5:20; 1 Corinthians 9:19-22;

Main Points

- 1. 5 points for our engagement in the political and social culture today: (a) prayerful, (b) peaceful, (c) powerful, (d) prophetic, and (e) purposeful.
- 2. Prayer transforms our political angst into peaceful engagement.
- 3. Inner peace during a politically tumultuous season is both an act of worship and evangelism.
 - a. If politics is continually robbing you of your peace, that might be an indication that you have misplaced your trust.
- 4. Through the Church, God makes his appeal to the world and, therefore, a prophetic church shapes the conscious of the world.

Engage with God in a Group

- Reflecting on the 5 points of engagement, which do you see most often in your life when you're thinking about politics?
- How might your engagement with others around divisive topics differ if you started with the 5 points of engagement before you have a conversation?
- When was the last time you genuinely prayed for someone with whom you had/have significant disagreements?
- How can we engage in a politically charged environment without compromising our faith or decreasing gospel influence with our friends and family?
