FRIENDS OF FLYNN

First, The Friends of Flynn committee would like to thank everyone who donated so generously during our March fund drive. Your donations go toward fundamental needs of the children and families, including food for their onsite food pantry, classroom snacks, winter clothing, shoes, and books for each student 3 times each year. If you missed the March fund drive, you can donate any time throughout the year.

The biggest activity the FOF committee has taken on this year is helping distribute food to the students through Flynn's onsite family food pantry. Families complete a form selecting foods from a "grocery" list and indicate how many weeks/month they would like food assistance. Some request once per month, others every other week, or weekly. The FOF committee members along with a few other volunteers bag and label food and stock the pantry shelves weekly. The school receives \$250 each month through Feed My People. That does not go very far. The FOF committee has used some of our funds to supplement the Feed My People food.

As we do each year, FOF will do a book giveaway in May to each student before summer vacation. The students are always so excited to receive their very own new book!

Our disappointing news for this school year is that Flynn lost their Partnership Coordinator, Jessica, due to budget cuts. Jessica has worked closely with the FOF committee for several years; keeping us informed of the needs of the school, families, and students so we could use our funds wisely while making the most impact. She was a delight to work with and we will miss her. We want to thank her for all her assistance and wish her well.

- Offer to help with errands, chores, or other tasks.
- Provide emotional and social support.
- Work with others to make sure check-ins are made.
- Encourage caregivers to protect their own health.

BIBLE STUDY- GROUNDED IN CONNECTION

Through a series of well-known Bible stories, we'll explore the joys and challenges of human relationship, community, and living with one another. In the midst of complex human relationships, we will be reminded yet again that God is here, showing us the way of connection, mercy, and grace.

SPIRITUAL PRACTICE CHALLENGE

People are invited to explore 1-2 practices per week (not all at once!). These serve as invitations to notice how God is already at work in the world and we are welcomed to slow down and bear witness to them.

1. **Breath Prayer**

Silently repeat a short phrase (e.g., "Lord Jesus Christ"/ "have mercy") while breathing slowly to center yourself in God's presence.

2. **Gratitude Practice**

Name 3 specific things each day you're thankful for—training your heart to notice grace.

3. **Scripture Reflection (Lectio Style)**

Read a short Bible passage slowly, noticing a word or phrase that stands out and sitting with it.

4. **Morning Offering**

Begin the day by simply saying, "God, this day is yours—use me in it."

5. **Evening Examen**

Reflect on the day: Where did I notice God? Where did I struggle? What grace did I receive?

6. **Journaling**

Write honestly about your thoughts, prayers, or questions—no filter needed.

7. **Silence (5–10 minutes)**

Sit quietly without agenda, allowing yourself to simply be with God.

8. **Intercessory Prayer**

Pray intentionally for specific people, needs, or situations in your community.

9. **Walking Prayer**

Take a walk and pray for the homes, schools, and people you pass.

10. **The Lord's Prayer (Slowly)**

Pray it phrase by phrase, pausing to reflect on each line.

11. **Listening Prayer**

Ask a simple question ("God, what do you want me to notice?") and sit in openness.

12. **Regular Worship Attendance**

Show up consistently—not out of obligation, but to receive Word, sacrament, and community.

13. **Singing or Listening to Hymns**

Let music carry prayer when words are hard to find.

14. **Hospitality**

Invite someone into your home or share a meal—faith lived through welcome.

15. **Encouragement**

Write a note, text, or call someone to build them up.

16. **Sabbath Time (2–4 hours or more)**

Set aside intentional time to rest, delight, and trust that the world doesn't depend on you.

17. **Letting Go**

Identify one worry or burden and consciously release it to God each day.

18. **Simplicity**

Choose one area (schedule, spending, possessions) to simplify and create space.

19. **Fasting (Adapted)**

Skip something (food, social media, noise) to become more aware of your dependence on God.

20. **Learning**

Read a book or scripture passage that stretches your understanding of faith.

21. **Acts of Service**

Do one intentional act of kindness each week—quietly and without recognition.

22. **Generosity**

Give time, attention, or resources freely as a response to God's generosity.

23. **Advocacy / Awareness**

Learn about a justice issue and pray or act in response.

24. **Forgiveness**

Name someone you need to forgive (including yourself) and begin that process in prayer.

25. **Seeing Your Calling**

Ask daily: "Who is my neighbor today?" and look for small ways to serve in your normal routines (work, family, community).

NEW BOOKS

Daughter of Egypt by Marie Benedict. *Daughter of Egypt* tells the dual story of Lady Evelyn Herbert in the 1920s and the ancient Egyptian pharaoh Hatshepsut. Propelled by high adventure this story of two ambitious women, both forced to hide who they were during their lifetimes, yet they changed history forever. (FIC BEN)

None of This Is True by Lisa Jewell. This mystery thriller is a work of “she said/she said” where two women collide on their birthday night, forcing an unforgettable reckoning between them with huge, but very different, ambitions for their lives. (FIC JEW)

Mailman by Stephen Starring Grant. This memoir by a mailman in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia, who found that working for the post office saved his life, taught him who he was, gave him purpose, and educated him deeply about a country he loves but had lost touch with. (B GRA)

Everyone Who Is Gone Is Here by Jonathan Blitzer. *Everyone Who Is Gone Is Here* tells the epic story of the people whose lives ebb and flow across the border delving into the heart of American life itself. This vital and remarkable story has shaped the nation's turbulent politics and culture in countless ways and will almost certainly determine its future. (304.8 FLI)

Nonviolent by Reverend James Lawson Jr. and Emily Yellin. *Nonviolent* is the posthumous memoir of Rev. James Lawson Jr., peer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., mentor to Congressman John Lewis and the Freedom Riders, and a principal architect of a nonviolent resistance movement that changed the world. This riveting historical narrative from a central figure in global liberation and a testament to compelling a nation to live up to its founding ideals of liberty and justice for all. (B LAW)

Series is the perfect solution. CARE & CONCERN

MAY- MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

First recognized in 1949, Mental Health Awareness Month highlights the vital role mental health plays in our overall well-being. It also serves as a reminder to reduce stigma, foster understanding, and encourage those who are struggling to seek support. In a rapidly changing world, prioritizing mental health has never been more important.

Recognizing when someone may need help is not always easy, but early awareness can make a meaningful difference. Mental health screenings and professional evaluations can help determine when support or treatment is needed.

Each condition has its own symptoms, but common warning signs of mental illness in adults and adolescents may include excessive worry or fear, persistent sadness, difficulty concentrating, extreme mood changes, irritability, withdrawal from social activities, changes in sleep or appetite, low energy, substance misuse, unexplained physical ailments, difficulty managing daily stress, or thoughts of self-harm.

Mental health conditions can also affect children because they are still learning how to identify and express their emotions. Symptoms are often behavioral and warning signs may include changes in school performance, excessive anxiety, hyperactivity, frequent nightmares, aggression, disobedience, or frequent temper tantrums.

Where to Get Help:

Learning about mental health is an important first step. Contact your primary care doctor for more resources and support. You can also contact the NAMI HelpLine to learn about services and support available in your community. If you or someone you know is struggling or in crisis, help is available. Call or text 988, or visit [988lifeline.org](https://www.988lifeline.org) to reach the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline.

WELLNESS TIPS FOR MIND, BODY, AND SPIRIT

Take time this May to care for your whole self—mind, body, and spirit—through simple, meaningful practices each week. Do something special for yourself, try a new fruit or vegetable, and connect with someone new at church. Explore a book by a new author, prepare a healthy meal, and reach out to a friend or relative you haven't spoken with in a while. Get creative with a new project, enjoy a dish from another culture, and engage with Trinity's worship by watching, sharing, or commenting. As the month continues, begin each day with a short prayer of gratitude, take time for a walk (even a short one), and listen to uplifting Christian music.
