FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK- SAINT AND SINNER

As we prepare to celebrate Reformation Sunday, we are reminded of one of Martin Luther's most enduring insights: we are at the same time both saint and sinner (simul iustus et peccator). This truth is not simply a piece of church history; it continues to shape how we understand ourselves and God's grace today.

Luther taught that, because of Christ, we are fully forgiven and made righteous before God. That is the "saint" part. At the same time, we remain human, broken, flawed, and caught up in the selfishness and sin of this world. That is the "sinner" part. We carry both realities at once.

This may sound like a contradiction, but Luther saw it as a deep comfort. If we were only sinners, we would have no hope. If we imagined ourselves only saints, we would deceive ourselves. But in Christ, both are true: we are loved and claimed by God even while imperfect. Grace is not a reward for the righteous, but a gift to sinners who are made righteous in Christ.

This is why Reformation matters today. It is not only about remembering Luther's hammer and the Wittenberg door, it is about celebrating the ongoing good news that we are freed by God's grace to live boldly in faith. We don't have to pretend we have it all together, and we don't have to despair when we fall short. Instead, we live in the tension of being saint and sinner, confident that God's mercy holds us in both.

As we celebrate this Reformation, may we remember: God's church is always being renewed, and God's people are always being re-formed by grace.

BOOK RECOMMENDATION

The Correspondent by Virginia Evans (FIC EVA)

The lost art of letter writing informs the life, losses, and loves of Sybil Van Antwerp, a 73-year-old retired judicial chief clerk, who believes correspondence "is her manner of living." Over the next 10 years, Sybil reveals her life as a "strange balance of the miraculous and the mundane" as she sits down at half past ten at least three days a week to write letters (or sometimes emails) to family members, friends, famous authors, a young boy struggling to grow up, a help desk employee, the neighbor gentleman just down the street, plus an ongoing narrative that is never sent.

Through all of these letters, we learn about Sybil's adoption, loss of a child, divorce, and her struggle to retain mailed letter to someone special.

Remembering that words are immortal and believing that "it takes patience to say exactly what one means," Sybil shares, "one ought to be precise with communication." In our era of quick, often thoughtless, and irresponsible communication methods, I value this novel's dedication to the written word and recommend it to those who remember writing personal letters and to those who may consider writing their first letter to someone special.

TRINITY BOOK CLUB

Please join the Trinity Book Club on Monday, October 20 at 6:30 p.m. in Room 208 to discuss Shelterwood by Lisa Wingate. This work of historical fiction includes elements of mystery and features dual timelines set in Southeastern Oklahoma and the displacement of Choctaw children during the early 1900s.

The protagonist of the 1909 timeline is Olive Augusta Radley, an 11-year-old girl who runs away from home to save herself and her adopted sister Nessa from abuse and exploitation. Olive takes Nessa into the Winding Stair Mountains, where Olive and her original family had lived.

The protagonist of the 1990 timeline is Valerie Boren Odell, a ranger at a newly opened national park. As a park ranger, Valerie investigates several events that appear unconnected at first but are part of the same mystery, which includes Olive, now an elderly woman.

VACCINE UPDATE:

Covid-19 Vaccine

- The CDC recommends a 2024–2025 COVID-19 vaccine for most adults ages 18 and older. Parents of children ages 6 months to 17 years should discuss the benefits of vaccination with their healthcare provider.
- The COVID-19 vaccine helps protect you from severe illness, hospitalization, and death. You may still get COVID, but the illness will be milder.
- It is especially important to get your 2024–2025 COVID-19 vaccine if you are ages 65 and older, are immunocompromised, are at high risk for severe COVID-19, or have never received a COVID-19 vaccine.
- Vaccine protection decreases over time, so it is important to get your 2024–2025 COVID-19 vaccine, which has been formulated to be most effective for the current strains.

Remember: Getting a COVID-19 vaccine is a safer, more reliable way to build protection than getting sick with COVID-19.

Measles Vaccine

- As of September 9, 2025, there have been a total of 1,454 confirmed measles cases reported in the United States, in 42 states, including Wisconsin.
- Measles is very contagious and can be serious. Serious complications, especially in children 5 and under, include ear infections, diarrhea, pneumonia, and encephalitis.
- Anyone who is not protected against measles is at risk. If one person
 has it, up to 9 out of 10 people nearby will become infected if they
 are not protected.
- Two doses of MMR vaccine provide the best protection against measles, with 97% effectiveness.
- Check with your healthcare professional if you are not sure of your immunity

Influenza Vaccine

- Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and sometimes the lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.
- Anyone can get the flu and experience serious problems related to the flu at any age. Those at a higher risk of developing serious flurelated complications include people 65 years and older, people with chronic medical conditions such as asthma and diabetes, and children younger than five years.
- The most important step in preventing flu is to get a flu vaccine each year. Flu vaccine has been shown to reduce flu-related illnesses and the risk of serious flu complications that can result in hospitalization or even death. Approximately 28,000 people died from influenza in the 2023–2024 flu season.
- Help reduce the spread by staying away from people who are sick, covering coughs and sneezes, masking, and frequent handwashing.

Mental Illness Awareness Week - October 6-12

Everyone is impacted by mental health conditions- including the friends, family, and coworkers who don't live with a mental health condition themselves. One in five adults in the U.S. experiences a mental health condition each year, which impacts those who know and love them. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) asked Congress to create this critical awareness event. Visit the NAMI website for important information.

An annual day of remembrance observed on October 15 for pregnancy loss and infant death, which includes miscarriage, stillbirth, SIDS, ectopic pregnancy, termination for medical reasons, and the death of a newborn. 5 LITTLE-KNOWN BREAST CANCER FACTS:

Mental Illness Awareness Week -

- 1. Breast cancer doesn't always appear as a lump. In its earliest stages, it often has no symptoms. That's why annual mammograms starting at age 40 are recommended. When symptoms do appear, a lump is the most common, but you should also watch for:
 - Swelling in or around your breast, collarbone, or armpit
 - Redness, thickening of the skin, or a change in texture (peau d'orange)
 - Warmth or itching in the breast
 - Nipple changes such as dimpling, retraction, scaling, or discharge
- 2. Your chances of having breast cancer are higher if you have a male relative who has had it. This is especially true if it's a close blood relative such as a father, brother, or son, because it may be due to a mutation such as BRCA1 or BRCA2.
- 3. Maintaining a healthy weight can reduce your breast cancer risk. Being overweight increases your risk of more than 10 different cancers, including breast cancer.
- 4. Breast awareness is more important than self-breast exams. Pay attention to how your breasts look and feel, especially at different times of the month. If you notice any changes while dressing, showering, or scratching, report them to your doctor.
- 5. Drinking alcohol can increase your breast cancer risk.

FRIENDS OF FLYNN

School Supplies: Thank you to those who donated school supplies requested by the teaching staff this year. Following a recent meeting, Jessica, Flynn's Partnership Coordinator, was able to take many bags and boxes of supplies back to school.

Healthy Snacks to Kick Off the New School Year: Volunteers purchased, packed, and delivered cheese sticks and apples for students on days (Monday and Friday) that were not covered by a fruit and vegetable grant. They also purchased additional nonperishable snacks for children who have a difficult time bringing snacks from home.

Flynn Family Food Pantry: It was decided that we would help support the school's food pantry with nonperishable food items. If you are out shopping and would like to contribute to this program, they can use mac & cheese, canned fruit, vegetables, tuna, soups, and baked beans. These items can be brought to Trinity's office or to the display in the lobby. Thank you.

Committee Meetings: We continue to meet regularly with Jessica to learn how we can best support the children and their families and the Flynn staff. 
