#### THIS WEEKEND'S GOSPEL MEDITATION PALM SUNDAY

"As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road." (Luke 19:36)

Consider how useless it is to spread your clothes on the ground for a donkey to walk on. The clothes get smeared with hooves, and who knows the grimy places where they've been? The animal may leave some unsavory presents on them. They may get stolen by a thief looking to make a buck. The thorns, thistles, rocks and muck of the road will leave stains. The clothes may never be useful again, and you'll probably walk home shivering without your normal covering. Yet this is precisely the gesture the people employ to welcome Jesus and his donkey. Why does this detail matter?

Wastefulness is an essential part of celebration. Consider the unnecessary extravagance of Christmas decorations, confetti and ticker tape parades, baseball players spraying each other with bottles of champagne after a victory, birthday gifts for kids and so on. This wastefulness signals celebration and therefore participation in higher identities (as believers, winners, and parents, to mention the above examples). That's what the wasted cloaks are all about. Those who donate their cloaks participate in Christ's kingship in Jerusalem — and we savor it two thousand years later.

The lesson? Learn how to "waste" money, time, clothes, and food on Christ. We do this at Mass but in so many other ways, too, like serving the poor, going on retreats, and doing prayerful study. When we practice this holy wastefulness, Jesus will ride into our lives, and we'll be more deeply members of his kingdom.

#### CELEBRATING HOLY WEEK AT ST. CHARLES


We begin the observance of Holy Week on Palm Sunday, and it leads us into the celebration of the Paschal Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. This most sacred week of the church year is one in which we are drawn ever-deeper into the mission of Christ on earth and eventually His passion, death, and resurrection. The days between Palm Sunday and Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday) are known as Holy Monday, Holy Tuesday, and Holy Wednesday (Spy Wednesday). Spy Wednesday is called this because of the Gospel reading (Matthew 26:14-25) where we learn that Judas, one of Jesus' disciples, had become a spy and betrayed Him. After this comes the Triduum, which is seen as one continuous liturgy running from Thursday through Saturday.

Part of St. Charles' rich tradition of worship is Daily Mass and Morning Prayer. During the Triduum, however, there can only be two Masses: one on Holy Thursday and one on Holy Saturday. So instead of Daily Mass on these days, we observe Morning Prayer. During Morning Prayer, we sing multiple Canticles and Psalms and hear Sacred Scripture, then a brief reflection given by a member of the St. Charles community. It is a beautiful opportunity for our priests to pray as part of the assembly and to be fed by the preaching of a lay person, seminarian, or deacon.

There are many beautiful and rich traditions of Holy Week, including the Palm Sunday Procession, the reception of the Holy Oils, the footwashing, the collection for the Holy Land, Stations of the Cross, Adoration of the Cross, Adoration of the Eucharist, the Easter Fire, and the blessing of food for our Easter tables. Through the Scripture readings we hear during Holy Week, we once again experience the history of our salvation as the People of God, from the creation of the world by God through his Son's passion, death and resurrection. And music! So much beautiful music that helps us experience the jubilation, pain, suffering, grief, and then eventually a return to joy! We as Christians believe that Holy Week is truly the holiest week of the liturgical year, and the days of the Triduum are the holiest three days, each one greater than the day before. If you have never experienced the Triduum, we invite you to come to all three services. Catholics have been doing this for hundreds of years and coming away renewed and affirmed in their faith in Christ as well as in the beauty of the Church's traditions, prayers and symbolism.

## CELEBRATING THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM



## THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM AT ST. CHARLES

Many Catholics have never experienced the Paschal Triduum in its entirety. The Triduum is one continuous Rite, consisting of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday when we celebrate the Easter Vigil. Each of the three days of the Triduum is rich with Sacred Scripture, powerful rituals, and beautiful music.

## HOLY THURSDAY AT ST. CHARLES

The Triduum begins on Holy Thursday, April 17 at 7:00 pm. After the Gathering Song, we experience the Reception of Holy Oils, which were consecrated on Holy Tuesday by Archbishop Grob at the Chrism Mass. First is the Oil of the Sick for healing in body, mind, and soul. Next is the Oil of Catechumens for anointing those preparing for Baptism. Lastly, the Oil of Chrism, which is used to anoint babies after Baptism, those who are being confirmed, Bishops and Priests at Ordination, and altars and churches when they are dedicated. In the Gospel, we hear the story of Jesus sharing a Passover meal with his disciples but first tenderly washing their feet. During our Mass of the Lord's Supper, twelve members of the St. Charles community will have their feet washed by our priests. Music selections include "Lift High the Cross," "Ubi Caritas," and "Panis Angelicus." At the end of Mass, there is a procession to take the Blessed Sacrament to the Adoration chapel. We will sing Pange Lingua, and all are invited to adore the Blessed Sacrament in the chapel until midnight. Lastly, the entire sanctuary is stripped.

St. Charles Holy Week and The Paschal Triduum material was written by members of our Worship Team.



On Good Friday, we gather at 1:00 pm in silence. Baskets will be available in the narthex for the collection for the Holy Land. Good Friday is not a Mass, and it is not a Holy Day of Obligation. The observance begins with a silent procession, and the ministers prostrate themselves in front of the altar. Then, in the Liturgy of the Word, we hear the psalmist lead Psalm 31: "Father into your hands, I commend my spirit." We proclaim the Passion reading. We sing the Solemn Intercessions, and then the cross, which has been covered, is unveiled. We then have the opportunity to adore and reverence the cross. This year we will do so by genuflecting or bowing. During the adoration of the cross, we sing "O Sacred Head," "Were You There," "Behold the Wood," and "Jesus Remember Me." Holy Communion, which was reserved from the previous night's Mass of the Lord's Supper, is distributed. All are invited to participate in Stations of the Cross that evening at 7:00 pm.



On Holy Saturday, there is a blessing of the Easter foods at 4:00 pm in church. At 8:00 pm, we gather outside in the parking lot for the Easter Fire. The Easter Vigil is the high point and holiest day of the entire church year. The church begins in darkness, and the Exsultet will be chanted by Fr. Ariel Orozco. The Paschal Candle is lit, and from that one light of Christ, we too light our taper candles until the entire church shines with the light of Christ. In the Liturgy of the Word, we hear the story of our faith from Genesis to the Resurrection: nine scripture readings and eight psalms. Music will be led by the Adult Choir accompanied by a brass quartet. There will be a Sprinkling Rite to remind us all of our own Baptism and our call to live that out in our daily lives. Our joyous music tells the story of resurrection as we are finally able to proclaim "Alleluia! Christ is risen!"




