
Business topics discussed: Homeless Shelter dinner, Christmas Shoebox mission project, December fundraising projects.

# **SOCIAL ACTION - Learning and History**

I have been working on decluttering my house and attic ever since I moved back to Williamsburg. Parting with books seems to be one of the hardest tasks. Over the years I finally purged most of my college textbooks. The one book I kept was from Art History titled, *History of Art,* by H.W. Janson, 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition, 1977. This is a beautiful book with lovely pictures and a lot of information. It is very heavy and yet a prized possession. What does this have to do with Social Action you may ask? Or the current educational debates about textbooks, teaching history and curriculum?

Well, the big missing part of the history of art is that there are no women artists mentioned in this 761-page book from 1977! I never questioned that decades ago nor was this ever a topic in class. It was years later that I learned that the first time a woman was mentioned in this book was in the 1987 edition. I'm encouraged to know that some women artists are now included. This does not take away from the magnificent artistry of Rembrandt or DaVinci who will continue to be recognized. Including women artists finally just provides a more balanced history....of art.
