Life on Mission: God designed you for a purpose, and we want to help you find the mission He made you for.


No matter your story or your stage of life, you can be fully alive: **with Jesus, in community, on mission.**

Finding Faith Through Friendship

Josh's Journey

Josh Taylor's journey to faith is a testament to friendship and to God's unyielding desire to be present in our lives. Josh shared his miraculous transformation from a person searching in every other place for something to believe in, to a person heard, seen, and pursued by God.

"I did not grow up in the church," Josh begins, referencing his early exposure to different religious traditions within his family that weren't really talked about or practiced. The ambiguity of the faiths around him left him exploring other faith traditions. Josh didn't really understand Christianity, but from the conversations around him he thought it felt combative. He remembers thinking, "Let me live my own life!" But then his spiritual life took a turn. "All the stuff started to fall away, and I became a lot more agnostic," he recalls. This shift moved him into a period of deep despair, hopelessness and struggles with mental health.

During this time, his friend Aaron invited him to go on a mission trip and then to CIY. The purpose of the mission trip was to serve at a camp for individuals with disabilities. It was at camp that Josh witnessed selfless Christian service–not the combativeness he had witnessed before. He watched Christians serve side by side with joy as they did the hard work of digging a ditch. They were doing tough, meaningful work while loving those around them well. Witnessing this left Josh thinking that Christianity wasn't what he thought it was. "God used that first week to break down the barrier of my anger," Josh reflects, and as a result he became open to finding out who God really was.

The next turning point came during the second week of the trip as Josh attended CIY. During CIY Josh felt the presence of God fill the room and he prayed, "If this is you, let me know." Looking back at that moment Josh said, "I understood but wasn't ready to commit." He knew there was a path that led to baptism, but he needed to know and understand more.



When he returned from the trip, he attended Bible study groups and learned about who this Jesus really is. He committed to his walk with the Lord that October. It was a "profound act of friendship" that brought Josh to his encounter with God. "People think they have to argue you into faith," Josh shared, yet his friend simply invited him to share an experience.

In the years that have followed, Josh's journey has been marked with growth, reflection, doubts, and questions. He candidly talked about the struggles of facing a global pandemic. Through it all, Josh trusts the ways in which God works in each of our lives. He shares some advice based on what he's learned: "Pour yourself into someone else. Stop focusing so attentively on yourself and instead find ways to focus on others. Take someone out for a meal or coffee and ask about their problems and listen well."

Josh has found comfort in different seasons from passages in Ecclesiastes and Job. He finds peace in the acknowledgement of life's mysteries and the assurance that God's wisdom surpasses our understanding.

As Josh looks back on his journey, he recognizes the profound impact of friendship and the simple act of an invitation that brought him to Jesus. He credits Aaron for being a faithful friend. "Sometimes just being a friend is enough," Josh says.

Josh's story of his journey to faith is a compelling testimony to the power of friendship and the relentless pursuit of truth. His life serves as a reminder of the power of invitation and the reality that God can use the invitation you extend to allow someone to encounter Him in a life-changing way.

Perfect Fit is one of the ways that PCC strives to walk out this mission alongside families.

With Jesus

Every individual was created to have a personal relationship with the Lord, and we are excited to be able to see those relationships grow and blossom on Sunday mornings. These beautiful relationships develop both in the Perfect Fit room and out in classrooms and the Treehouse. Our goal is for our kids to see familiar faces every Sunday when they walk through the door. This fosters an environment where bonds can develop more easily as kids know who and what to expect each Sunday morning.

A Tale of Compassion How a Bible Study Transforms Lives

In the busy building of Plainfield Christian Church, a remarkable journey of faith and compassion is unfolding, touching the lives of many. At the heart of this narrative is a group of dedicated women whose vision and empathy has sparked profound transformation within the community.

The Tuesday Morning Bible Study has emerged as a beacon of hope for ladies seeking spiritual growth and has been especially successful in reaching out beyond the church walls. Through a blend of video-driven sessions and intimate discussions, the latest study dove deep into Jesus' profound compassion for those who are marginalized, resonating with participants on a refreshing level.

Central to the function of this Tuesday gathering are the group leaders, tasked with nurturing connections and providing support to their table of participants. Early in January, before the study began, Becky Weaver, one of the co-leaders, received a text from her other co-leader which read "Praying for new girls and new baptisms." Humbly, Becky acknowledges that she brushed it off, thinking "That's nice" and "Good for her." Little did any of the team realize how God would work in the weeks ahead.

It began with a chance encounter at a local Goodwill store. Preparing for a "Galentine's Day" party, one of the table leaders struck up a conversation with the cashier. As they talked, the cashier was extended an invitation to the Tuesday Bible study. With tears, she responded that no one had shown her such kindness before and was deeply moved by this leader's invitation.

The cashier responded to the invitation and arrangements were made to pick her up for the next session. Through further discussion it was discovered that the woman was living in the woods behind a well-known shopping center with others in our community. All the group leaders prayed fervently that she would show up. Sure enough, she did! When the leader picked her up, the cashier had a brand-new woman's study Bible! Surprised, the leader asked and was told that her boyfriend had found it the night before while dumpster diving. During the study, the woman was greatly moved by the warmth and acceptance she experienced. Her tears flowed freely as she listened to the video, clutching her newly acquired Bible found amidst discarded treasures.

This new friend was also invited to the "Galentine's Day" party where she continued to experience an outpouring of love that helped spark a newfound faith. Just a few weeks later her faith culminated in a decision to be baptized. This moment served as a powerful reminder of the boundless potential for grace and transformation within the community. In 25 years of coordinating the Tuesday Bible Study, Becky believes they had only witnessed four baptisms. None of the team of leaders realized in January that in the coming months they would witness a spike of attendance and experience three baptisms by March. God is clearly moving in and through the prayers of these leaders and using their study to reach new women.

As the story continues to unfold, it becomes clear that this is more than just a tale of compassion; it is a testament to the power of community, empathy, and a faith that is fully alive.

Finding a Faith Community Maddox's Journey from Disconnect to Deep Connection

Growing up as a pastor's kid in an area church, Maddox Law was familiar with the rhythms of faith from an early age. Yet somehow amid the familiarity of church retreats and weekly services, he grappled with a sense of detachment. He attended these events faithfully but looking back, Maddox realized his youthful perspective limited his understanding of a real relationship with God.

A move to Plainfield schools in fourth grade marked a pivotal moment for Maddox as it distanced him from the close-knit community he had known. A few years later, at the start of Maddox's high school career, the COVID pandemic further disrupted any sense of community he had built. Confined to Sunday mornings in his living room, staring at a screen with his family, Maddox felt confused, longing for a tangible connection with others.

In the aftermath of COVID's chaos, Maddox hoped for new friendships upon his return to school. However, the friends he found didn't share his interest in Jesus which led him down a difficult path, farther from faith in the Lord.

In 2022 Maddox found himself navigating the terrible trap of self-comparison and self-criticism, a journey familiar to many. During this time, he was thankfully able to find renewed hope and joy by returning to church with his parents. He rediscovered the transformative power of community, but there was one thing still lacking: he yearned for connection with students his own age. An unexpected invitation to join PCC for their CIY MOVE high school trip served as a catalyst for community in Maddox's life. It provided an opportunity to reconnect with some childhood friends and encounter a lively group of students who also loved the Lord. Here at PCC, he finally felt like he had found his place as he developed genuine friendships and was challenged to use his gifts to serve the kingdom.

Fueled by this newfound sense of purpose, Maddox eagerly dove into volunteering with the Middle School Ministry and quickly established himself as a pillar of support for younger students. Others have commended his dedication and selflessness, citing his tireless efforts in various capacities like assisting with projects or stepping in as a Sunday morning volunteer.

Currently Maddox is planning to attend Taylor University where he intends to study Worship Ministry. As his journey continues, he carries with him the lessons learned and the bonds built through his CIY Move experience. His heart is filled with a passion for service and a steadfast commitment to cultivating authentic connections. It will be exciting to see how the Lord continues to lead Maddox through his preparation and in his readiness to serve the kingdom.

Unveiling the Power of Paint A Journey of Church Planting in Gurabo


Lisa, the Trip Coordinator at GO Ministries, once said to me, "Mission trips are church planting." At first, her words puzzled me. How could painting houses lead to planting churches? But as I embarked on this trip to Gurabo, Dominican Republic, on behalf of Plainfield Christian Church to GO Ministries, I discovered the profound connection between painting and planting.

Arriving in Gurabo, we encountered a community divided by a stream, with houses on either side. Our mission became clear as we learned that new churches were sprouting up amidst these homes. Painting houses took on a deeper significance as we realized it was not just about aesthetics but about fostering the growth of these budding congregations.

During our trip, we became proficient painters, adding a fresh coat of paint to many homes. But beyond the physical transformation, our actions sparked curiosity among the local people. They approached Pastor Elvis, the Network Leader in Gurabo, asking about the presence of Americans and seeking assistance with their own homes. This opened doors for Pastor Elvis to extend invitations to church gatherings and share the message of Jesus. While we enjoyed the sunny weather, tried authentic food, and discussed discipleship strategies, it was witnessing the impact of our painting endeavors on church planting that left a lasting impression. Gurabo, a community in Santiago, Dominican Republic, is the canvas for our partnership with GO Ministries to establish ten churches in the next five years.

As we prepare for our upcoming mission trip in October, we extend an invitation to you to join us in this transformative journey. Together, let's uncover the power of paint and plant seeds of faith in Gurabo.

Beyond the Call of Care

Faith and Compassion in Therapy

How many times have you had the "feeling" that something wasn't right and that you needed to act? Kayla Weaver, a Physical Therapist at Hendrick's Regional Health, knows that feeling. God used that feeling to prompt Kayla that something was seriously wrong when one of her long-time patients uncharacteristically missed two appointments.

Kim is one of Kayla and her colleague Laura Mason's long-time patients. Kim started to see Kayla after she had a brain event. She'd been coming for therapy for over a year when she missed an appointment for the first time.

There's a routine to how the front office manages patient appointments. Kayla shared that when a patient misses an appointment, the front office calls. When Kim missed her appointment, Kayla and Laura thought it was strange but they let it go. The front office called Kim and left a message. When Kim missed a second appointment Kayla and Laura acted. The front office called Kim again, but it went to voicemail again. Obtaining emergency contacts is also part of the routine so Kayla called but she only got voicemail then as well. Kayla and Laura began to get concerned. Kayla remembers asking her boss if she could call the police!



When you pray for people, you remember your conversations more. Kayla shared that, "we had been together for so long that I remembered her talking about her cousin Kendra." Kayla called the emergency contact to see if she had Kendra's number. "Thank God, she did!" she recalls. Kayla was disappointed when, again, she got a voicemail, but she left a message in hopes that someone would call her back. Kendra's husband did. He went to the apartment and found Kim on the floor unable to get up. Kayla shared that "she'd been there since Monday afternoon." The ambulance came and Kim was admitted to the hospital where she was diagnosed with Rhabdomyolysis, a serious muscular condition.

How had Kim survived that long alone in her apartment? Kayla knows that "God is in the details." Not only had God made sure they had all the phone numbers they needed, but he had also planned for there to be liquid on the floor near where Kim fell. She had been able to reach cans of soda from Monday to Thursday! Those kept her alive until help came. When help did come Kim simply asked, "Where have you been?" Kim knew help would come.

"I think I have always known that God is with us, but this story proves it. We don't know what will come in our days, but God already does." Kayla prays for her patients and her work with them. Her work "requires a lot of patience and compassion as people are usually in pain or, as in Kim's case...and many others who suffer neurological conditions or events such as a stroke...feel very hopeless and depressed." It's challenging to have just the right words at the right time so Kayla continually prays that God would give her the right words. "I think I have always known that God is with us, but this story proves it. We don't know what will come in our days, but God already does." Kayla knows "there's not a day that goes by where God is not involved in my work. Sometimes I get to share my faith verbally, but I know without a shadow of a doubt that it is always shared, even without words. And obviously that's the Holy Spirit through me."

Inspiration from a Friend

When I heard about our church focus of 'fully alive with Jesus, in community and on mission,' I couldn't help but think of a long-time friend and a conversation I had with him just a few years ago. At that time our conversation had centered on some grave news: he had received a diagnosis of pulmonary fibrosis and the doctor had given him only a year or two to live. The purpose of our visit was to discuss some ideas he had for his funeral, and he wanted my help to execute them. It turned out to be one of the most interesting conversations I have ever experienced.

Ron Padgett became a friend of mine back in 1979 when I arrived to serve on staff at Plainfield Christian Church. Part of my role was as Children's Minister and Ron and his wife, Connie, were serving in the Preschool Department leading our Extended Sessions—the time between Sunday School and the worship services. This was their ministry for several years and later they went on to other areas. After his retirement from his job, Ron continued to help anywhere he could. I got to know him even better when he volunteered to assist our previous treasurer. More recently he had been participating in the Sunday afternoon services at Cumberland Trace. Health issues have altered some of these activities, but Ron hasn't backed off from everything!



What impressed me most in my conversation with Ron was his attitude about facing eternity and life with Jesus-his joy and hope were evident, and they still are. And even more, I was moved by his intent to use his funeral as a testimony for Jesus to friends who weren't followers of Christ at that time. I thought then, "That's how I want to be when facing my last days!"

So now, seven years later-still anticipating heaven-how has Ron been living out his faith and how has he remained "on mission"? As many others have done, after retirement he gathered former co-workers from his workplaces to meet regularly for breakfast and stay in touch. Those gatherings became moments for reminiscing or reveling in their experiences.

When Ron received his diagnosis, he decided to ask these buddies if they would mind if he offered a prayer before their meal. They agreed and within a few weeks he took another step. "Would you be willing for us to study the Bible while we're together?" Most were okay with that idea.

I caught up with Ron recently over lunch to see how he was doing and to ask about his group of men. His illness has progressed, his activities are measured, but his joy is shining as bright as before and he's thankful for what he's experienced through their meetings. All of these men are deepening their faith and testimonies. Ron is not the only leader of the group, but when he is able, he prepares extensive Bible lessons on various topics and deals with their real-life issues. His co-leader fills in when Ron is not feeling well. His friends decided to move their meetings to lunchtime because he struggles in the mornings. Ron's best friend and co-founder of the group decided to fix up his garage for their gatherings, furnishing it with couches and recliners. The men either bring their own lunch or their host prepares food for them.

One of this group of former electricians, engineers, foremen, and apprentices has gone on to be with the Lord, but those who remain continue to grow in their faith and share with others on a deeper level. Ron is grateful that their initial mealtimes—which were filled with old stories, tall tales, politics and discussion of news items are now centered on studying the Bible.

Ron's anticipation of life in heaven served as a model of hope for me during my own health crisis and diagnosis of liver cancer. I remembered Ron's joy in the midst of a storm and wanted to have the same peace throughout my own journey. Thankfully, I experienced that peace and now we both confidently rest in Paul's familiar words, "to live is Christ, to die is gain."







