The Injustice of the Widow's Faith

As he taught, he said, "Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation." He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." - Mark 12:38-44

Oear Beloved in Christ,

In Mark 12:41-44, we meet a widow who gives everything she has to the temple treasury. Jesus draws attention to her sacrifice, saying she put in "everything—all she had to live on." Many sermons interpret this story as a call to greater faith and sacrificial giving. It's a powerful image of trust in God, and the widow's faith is admirable. But what if Jesus is pointing us to more than just her faith? What if he's also asking us to see the injustice in her situation?

The widow in this story embodies the heart of trust, giving her all despite her own poverty. She believes in God's provision with a faith that inspires us. However, as we read this passage, it's also essential to consider its context. Just before Jesus commends her faith, he condemns the hypocrisy of the religious leaders who "devour widows' houses" (Mark 12:40). The contrast couldn't be sharper. Jesus is calling out a system that not only fails to support the widow but even leads her to sacrifice what little she has left.

Yes, we should have a faith like the widow's, trusting God fully with our lives and resources. But Jesus' words challenge us to look more deeply. This widow doesn't just need praise; she needs support. She needs the very community that she's giving her last coins to be a source of sustenance, compassion, and justice in her life. In our world today, are we lifting up the widows—the vulnerable, the marginalized, the poor? It's easy to admire the faith of those who give sacrificially, but Jesus calls us to more than admiration. He calls us to action. True faith responds to God's love by working to dismantle systems that exploit those who already have so little.

Following Jesus doesn't mean we're called to sacrifice indiscriminately; instead, it means we're called to respond to the ultimate sacrifice Jesus made for us by living out God's love in tangible ways. That includes lifting up those who, like the widow, are left with nothing.

So yes, let's have faith like the widow. But let's also be God's hands and feet that supports the widow. God invites us to challenge and change systems that perpetuate poverty and injustice. This is how we can be true followers of Christ, building a world that reflects God's justice, mercy, and love for all people. May we be faithful, not just in our giving but in our calling to love one another as God loves us.

(using pre-consecrated bread and wine) in the homes or the health care centers where the members reside. This extraordinary and essential ministry has been ongoing for many years.

Our members who are served by our Holy Communion Visitors are very appreciative of these visits because

> they are often lonely. Many of them were formerly able to be active in the congregation's ministries, and it is so comforting for them to see a familiar face! We want to grow this team. So, if this sounds like something God might be inviting you to do, you would be welcome. Visitors receive training from a pastor so that they feel comfortable bringing the Sacrament to those they visit.

I'm so glad that our congregation, with each of us playing a vital role, engages in many caring ministries, including our food pantry, clothing closet, and saving suds laundromat ministry. These important ministries are not just tasks, but a responsibility and a commitment. They serve many members of our community. They give us a way to work together to do those things that Jesus praised – feeding the hungry, providing clothing to those who need it, and helping our neighbors with their material needs.

As a congregation, we also seek to respond to other needs to feel included, valued, and loved. Not the least of these needs is connecting with our Lord through prayer and the Lord's Supper. Did you know that we have a team of laypeople who are committed to helping with these spiritual needs? Sharing God's Bounty

If you were to stop by the Bethesda Community Food pantry any Tuesday or Wednesday in August and September, you would be surprised by the tables of colorful produce. Red and orange tomatoes, green cucumbers, bell peppers in all



colors, curly kale, whatever happens to be garden-ready.

Amazingly, it would all be gone in a couple of days.

Now imagine your grocery cart – also empty – as you pass the produce aisle because your budget doesn't stretch to buy cucumbers, apples, and peppers that cost more than \$1 apiece. Given the high cost of fresh produce, it's no wonder that food pantry patrons eagerly pick up whatever fresh foods are available at the pantry.

Bethesda is among nine Story County food pantries receiving locally grown fruit and vegetables weekly from the Grow & Give program (formerly Plant a Row for the Hungry). Grow & Give is coordinated by horticulture staff at Reiman Gardens. But the heart of the program lies in the hands



of our dedicated volunteers-they run the program, grow and donate produce from their home gardens, pick up produce from vendors at the end of the Saturday farmers market in Ames, weigh, sort, box, and distribute produce to area food pantries. Their commitment is what makes this program a success.

The beauty of this program is that no food goes to waste. Every gardener knows the scenario – it's always feast or famine with home gardens. What to do with all the extra summer squash? Sweet corn that's ready at the same time? Tomatoes that keep on producing?

Take it to Grow & Give! During the growing season (roughly mid-June until hard frost in October), gardeners can drop off extra produce every Monday morning between 7:30 and 9 a.m. at the Reiman Gardens parking lot.

This drop-off is for anyone who has extra produce – from backyard growers who may have a sack of cucumbers to growers with huge gardens and a truckload of product. The donated produce is combined with what's harvested at Reiman's food gardens each week, plus what was collected at the Ames farmers market. Then, all is weighed, sorted, boxed, and delivered to four food pantries in Ames, plus Huxley, Boone, Nevada, and Cambridge. Even out-ofcondition vegetables feed animals at Blank Park Zoo, tortoises at an Ames rehab center, and Reiman Gardens butterflies.

The numbers are great, but the need is greater. It's the collective effort of our community that can truly make

a difference. Your involvement, no matter how small, can have a significant impact on those in need.

During the 2024 growing season, Grow & Give distributed 18,245 pounds – more than 9 tons – of



fresh produce to food pantries. This was enough to provide nutritious meals for hundreds of families in our community. No matter how much was donated each week, food pantries said the fresh food quickly disappeared from their shelves, a testament to the high demand for fresh produce. Your contribution can help us meet this demand. In one week, Grow & Give received 30 crates of beautiful green, red, yellow, and orange peppers from research trials at the ISU Horticulture Station east of Gilbert. During peak tomato season, each pantry might receive several boxes of tomatoes.

As you plan your garden for 2025, consider adding a row for Grow & Give. Out of God's abundance – rainfall, sunshine and good soil – comes a bounty meant to be shared. Join us in this community effort to fight food insecurity. Your contribution, no matter how small, can make a big difference.




Bethesda Restructures Youth Programming

She works closely with the Christian Education and Youth Ministries Board to develop new ways to share Jesus' Word with our SPLASH children.

An adult forum based on the Interfaith Alliance of Iowa pamphlet "Becoming an LGBTQ Ally in Your Faith Community" took place on October 13, 2024. The forum opened with a video from the 2018 ELCA Youth Gathering featuring Rebekah Bruesehoff, who is transgender. Topics included misgendering, best practices in LGBTQ terminology, including pronouns, and a focus on Iowa law regarding bathroom equality and nondiscrimination for LGBTQ people.

B ethesda saw a surge in adult forums on various topics this past fall. For those unfamiliar, Bethesda Lutheran Church's VOYAGERS Adult Forums are small to medium, hour-long group discussions held in Centennial Hall on Sundays after worship. The adult forums cover topics like educating interested congregation members on the conflict in Israel and Palestine and the Court of Justice Rulings, Christian Zionism, and how to be an LGBTQIA+ ally in your faith community, with the latter including educating attendees on pronouns and more. Each Adult Forum presents different topics, and attendees get the opportunity to learn about communities and experiences different from their own.

On November 10th, an Adult Forum on what is happening at the Southern border was discussed by a few ASIP members who went there last May. Individuals came with questions about the unique travel experience that impacted those who made the journey there and back. Members of ASIP were also joined by the Valero family, who were able to recount their firsthand experience of life in a migrant shelter while waiting for permission to cross the Southern border into the United States of America.

If I could dream...I dream of curtains for bare windows and cloth to cover worn tables. I dream of the magic of small pieces of fabric fitting into beautiful patterns in quilts to brighten homes and become treasured wraps providing comfort and warmth. These dreams are becoming a reality thanks to the generosity of an LSI donor.

Connie Hansen from Audubon, Iowa, is no stranger to fabric and sewing. Connie has enjoyed sewing for much of her lifetime. In her younger years, she shared her passion for sewing, serving as a 4-H leader in Melville Township, sewing clothes for herself and daughter.
