“Let love be genuine; hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal; be ardent in spirit; serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope; be patient in affliction; persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; pursue hospitality to strangers.

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be arrogant, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God, for it is written, “Vengeance is mine; I will repay, says the Lord.” Instead, “if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink, for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads.” Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.”

Dear Beloved in Christ,

If you're like me, you see the quotation at the top of the page and tend to skip it to read the “real” article. Well, this time, I encourage you to go back up and read it. Really read it, because what Paul has to say in Romans 12 is so crucial to the Christian way of life. You know it's true because it is virtually impossible to put into practice.

Like most things in the Christian life, how to be Christ to others flies in the face of the way this world operates. We want to build that multi-corded whip and gleefully chase the evil moneychangers around the temple square, beating them silly for all the pain and oppression they wreak on this fallen world. We tend not, however, to look inward at the moneychanger in ourselves, and we certainly don't want to go to that cross and die on their behalf.

Paul spells it out fairly plainly. Let love be genuine and hate evil. That part, at least, seems easy enough. The tricky thing is how we go about hating evil. Unfortunately for the Christian, we can't go around beating evil senseless until there is only good. It has this funny way of creating more evil, particularly within ourselves. But the lure of good triumphing over evil with

decisive victory, by scoring victory through evil's defeat, is so alluring. How can we not take up our arms and wage war against it for the sake of good?

In America, this is a presidential election year. Our country is at its most divisive, if not ever, at least in recent history. Over 84% of Americans polled feel that political discourse is more disrespectful now and over 61% say that political conversations with people they disagree with are “stressful and frustrating.”¹ We all know it. We are entering a season of vitriol. What is the Christian to do?

Feed your enemies. Give them something to drink. Live peaceably with all. Overcome evil with good. This cannot be outsourced to a political power. It starts with you, and me, and all who confess Jesus as Lord, to love as Jesus loves. The whip is temporal. The Cross is forever.

Bethesda Council Update

Dear Friends,

It has been a privilege to serve as your council president this past year. As we close out the year, it is worth noting some of the milestones of 2023.

We continue to sponsor two young families with children to resettle here in Ames as they fled war and political persecution with little more than the clothes on their backs.

We welcomed Prairie Flowers Children Center as a tenant in our education wing under the terms of a lease approved by your church council.

We made important revisions and updates to our congregational bylaws and approved continuing resolutions that keep the organization up to date and relevant in today's ever-changing environment. We also brought new attention to and set new policies for the administration of our Bethesda endowment. Special thanks to immediate past council president Larry Otteman for his diligent work in these complicated matters.

We continued our very important community centered ministries with the Food Pantry, Clothing Room, and Saving Suds, setting new annual records for the number of people served. Special thanks go out to Daryle Vegge and the Stewardship Committee for the campaign they mounted through temple talks to remind all of us of the important community services Bethesda provides thousands of local community members each year. Then they capped that effort off with another wonderful stewardship kickoff event.

Through your generosity Bethesda was able to end the year in the black. Giving during the holiday period more than made up for the slippage we had experienced earlier in the year.

The council has been involved in researching the potential for two new capital items suggested by members – a digital outdoor sign on Northwestern Avenue to replace the current sign, and the installation of solar panels on the church roof or lawn. At present the funds are not available for replacing the sign. Our task force continues to research the long-term cost benefit of investing in solar panels.

For this new year of 2024 I am happy to announce that Mif Grotnes will serve as Congregational Council president-elect. Larry Otteman has accepted the Congregational Council Secretary position. Lise McKillop will serve as the Board Chair for the Worship, Music, and Arts Board. And Trace Houge Brakke has accepted the Congregational Council seat on the council. At this writing, we are still looking for people to chair the Stewardship Committee and the Administration/Finance Board.

As we review this past year, it rapidly becomes obvious that nothing would happen at Bethesda without all of you. Thank you for so generously giving of your time, talents, and finances to support our Bethesda community. And thank you for so graciously allowing me to serve as your council president. It has been an honor and a privilege. Together, we gather, grow and go!

Food Pantry Update

Visitors to the food pantry have continued to be on the rise since the end of the covid incentives. The good news is that inventory at the Food Bank of Iowa has improved so we are able to obtain most of our inventory through the Food Bank at very low cost.

Here are Food Pantry statistics for the period July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023:

- 14,042 individuals visited the pantry
- 100,313 pounds of food was distributed
- 24% of families visiting the pantry have 5 or more individuals in their household.
- 64% of households visiting the food pantry are from Ames
- 80% of households were from Story County, 6% from Boone County and 7.5% from Marshall County and 3% from Hamilton County, the remaining came from other counties in Iowa
- 62% of households visited only one or two times during the year, 5% visited once per month, 4% visited once per week, 29% visited 3-10 times during the year
- Average amount of food distributed per individual per visit was 7.2 pounds

The annual holiday distribution consisted of distributing 400 Fareway gift cards at \$30 each during the months of November and December. These cards could not be used to purchase alcohol, tobacco or lottery tickets. In addition, the pantry distributed 100 age-appropriate stockings to children in December. The Bethesda many hands sewed the stockings and stuffed them with items purchased by the food pantry.

The food pantry is 100% operated by volunteers ordering, stocking, distributing, checking temperatures, keeping statistics, and writing thank you notes.

Bethesda Community Clothing Closet Update

The Clothing Closet completed its 50th year in operation in 2023. Having started in the basement of the church in 1973, in 2017, we moved to the second floor, where we operated for four years until May of 2021; we moved to the first floor and are located right beside the food pantry, meaning we can now assist more people because of the convenient location and hours, which mirror those of The Food Pantry.

On February 5th, St. Cecilia Catholic Church brought in over 50 coats for those who utilize the clothing closet.

While we receive numerous donations, we only keep clothing that is in season and the out-of-season items are taken to Goodwill every week by Phil Harris or Russell Henry. There are guidelines for shoppers to use when at The Clothing Closet, the main guidelines being individuals are only allowed to shop for those in their household and may only utilize The Clothing Closet once a month.

In 2023, we have assisted over 3,000 family households, with families consisting of two to 12 per household. Being located on the first floor in the main hallway has been beneficial as we see an increase in shoppers each month. People appreciate the service we provide. All volunteers are knowledgeable, helpful, and enjoy giving their time. We have a lot of fun working together.

Thank you to everyone who serves as a volunteer and those who donate to the clothing room. If you have yet to go in the clothing room, stop in anytime and look around. It is a very nice place to shop.


Sara Nelson is a 2024 ISU Calendar Honoree

March is National Professional Social Work Month, a time to recognize social workers and thank them for all they do. At Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI), we are grateful for the many social workers who have dedicated their lives to serving our communities across the state!



At LSI, we believe every Iowan deserves the independence they need to thrive. LSI's Host Homes is an innovative way LSI is serving adults with disabilities. Through this program, an individual moves from Supported Community Living into a private family home with a carefully selected mentor. This program is built entirely around an individual's goals and interests, and LSI's extensive matching process ensures the mentor and mentee are a great fit.

Take a moment to read the following story from a Host Homes mentee:

“My journey with LSI's Host Homes started in early 2023. I've known my mentor for a few years while he provided hourly services to me. We learned about Host Homes and thought it would be a good fit for us. I moved into my mentor's home where he helps me maintain a daily routine with schoolwork, household tasks, daily living skills, improving independence, and more.

I attend a college nearby and go to classes a few days a week. I am able to navigate the local bus system to access my community to attend classes and visit friends. My mentor is always available to transport me into the community as needed.

This summer, I went on a trip across the country with one of my classes. While on this trip, I was able to maintain my independence with limited support, but I knew my mentor would be available by phone to assist me with my coping skills and problem solving. This trip was a big success for me knowing I had support only a phone call away.

I like LSI's Host Homes Program because my mentor supports me in the way I want to be supported, assists me with some daily tasks I struggle with, and understands me.”
