# On Living in Gratitude and Generosity

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God." - Colossians 3:16

Over the years, we who are in Christ have learned that gratitude and generosity have a reciprocal relationship. Those who are grateful are often generous, and those who are generous grow in their experience of gratitude.

Recently, in the Synod E-Newsletter, the following article appeared:

"Donate your worship supplies to help congregations in Liberia. Does your congregation have extra worship supplies? The Lutheran Churches in Liberia face significant challenges due to limited resources and are seeking support through donations. Specifically, we are requesting:

- Old communion sets
- Vestments
- Paraments and lectern cloths
- Pastoral gowns, shirts, and clerical collars

If your church or congregation has items of this nature that are no longer in use, they could serve as a tremendous blessing to our brothers and sisters in Liberia."

When I saw this article, I thought, wow, maybe this is an opportunity to reduce my collection of clergy shirts! After all, I am (semi) "retired"! In any case, I was giving too much houseroom to clergy shirts and stoles I wasn't using. (Do you notice the focus on self and "what's in it for me?" It seems that God can work even through our imperfect motives!)

I found that I had more than one communion set for home communions, too. The more I looked, the more items I found.



Then, I asked Pastor Bryan and members of our altar guild if they thought there were items we were no longer using at Bethesda. As a result, two boxes of older vestments, linens,

and communion ware, including six old communion distribution trays, were collected from the lower sacristy.

When Suah Borsay, who had placed the ad in the Synod News, came to Bethesda to collect our offerings, she shared that her sister is a pastor in Liberia. Previously, Suah and her husband had been collecting layette kits for newborns and sending these to her sister. But this year, her sister asked for church materials, saying that the Liberian

churches do not have even the basics we take for granted for worship. When I showed her the six communion trays Bethesda no longer needed, Suah was so excited! She took out her phone and showed me that the Liberian pastors make their trays out of



cardboard, with little holes cut in the cardboard to hold the communion glasses.

This shows that we are simply unaware of how much we have been blessed and the needs of our neighbors. Of course, the most significant thing we share with our siblings in Christ is our faith and trust in Jesus. Wherever two or more are, Christ is there among them, and I have no doubt that the Spirit can move mightily in congregations with little means. Nevertheless, it is a blessing that goes both ways when we can be of help.

This experience reminded me to be grateful for what we have here to enhance our worship, and I hope it encourages all of us to live generously.

## Oasis Confirmation 2024 - 2025

Bethesda has fifteen 6th, 7th, and 8th graders participating in our Oasis Confirmation this year. Like Splash Children's Church, our Oasis Confirmation program has taken on a different look. We have been following the Faith Inkubators, Head to the Heart (H2H) confirmation ministry.

**Head to the Heart (H2H)** is an integrated approach to confirmation ministry. More than a program or curriculum, H2H intersects the head (knowing God's promised story) and the heart (living God's story). This

intersection is the very center of our baptismal promise. The H2H faith formation system weaves in critical thinking, a system of care, and creative faith practices while growing connections in Christian community.

The H2H system includes:

• Confirmation learning elements based on adolescent brain development research,

> including object lessons that teach engaging PowerPoint visuals, art, music, skits, and game shows. The comprehensive menu of over 100 relevant teaching options allowed us to pick and choose what works best in our unique setting.

Our Learning events (LE) are led by Pastor Bryan and are extensions of the scriptures that we also hear at our Living Water Wednesday services. This year, Pastor Bryan has chosen to focus on the Life of Jesus and Lutheran Life. We schedule two LEs per month.

• A culture of deep connection and care created in small student peer groups led by trained, committed adult Guides.

This year's adult guides are Scott Smyth, James Harriman, Gretchen Moser, and Nancy Ewing. Our guides lead the small group discussions during the Learning Events and accompany the youth at their Service and Fellowship Events. Volunteering to be a guide is a huge commitment to the Head to Heart program, and these volunteers have been building relationships with our Oasis students throughout the year. They are a huge part of this program's success, and we are grateful for their service.

• An authentic relational/experiential model for adolescent faith formation.

With Head to the Heart, young people experience meaningful action/reflection, empowering them to live what they learn and stay engaged long after they are confirmed!

Our Fellowship Events allow for fun and relationship-building. We have had game night parties, gone bowling, and will bring in the Lutheran Lakeside staff to lead us in an overnight lock-in close to Easter.

This year, five of our students will complete their confirmation journey. They have been working with their mentors and Pastor Bryan and plan to be confirmed the weekend of May 3 and 4. It has been an exceptional year with our Oasis Confirmation students! Seeing these young people grow in their faith is rewarding as we help guide them in knowing and living God's promised story.

We are still paying the rent, but hopefully, they will be completely self-sufficient before their court date.

We are trying to prepare the family as much as possible for this Administration. Jose carries a backpack with his papers in it at all times. They have the Know Your Rights Red Cards and know what to do if ICE comes to their door. We have passed on other information to hopefully keep them safe. Our Venezuelan family came in legally through the CBP (U.S. Customs and Border Protection) app and passed their credible fear test to enter the U.S. with a court date. Unfortunately, this Administration doesn't seem to care whether they come in legally or not.



We are uncertain what will happen at this point, but we have a good lawyer for our family. We welcome your prayers. They are needed now more than ever! Thank you for the love, generosity, and support you have shown and continue to show for this family.

### The Icon in the Sanctuary

You have probably noticed this icon near the Baptismal font in the sanctuary. This is a special kind of picture of Jesus called an icon. Icons are common in Eastern Orthodox Churches and provide an ancient way of praying. Back when most people could not read, icons provided a sort of visual Bible to help people to learn about God. That is why it is said that an iconographer does not *paint* the icon, but instead *writes* the icon.

Icons follow a prescribed pattern, which is believed to have been inspired by the Holy Spirit. The iconographer is expected to follow the pattern, and to be in prayer while writing the icon.

This particular icon is called Christus Pantocrator. Pantocrator is a Greek word, and means Lord of All, so the icon proclaims that Christ is the Lord of All. You can see that Jesus holds the New Testament in his left hand and blesses those who look at the icon with his right hand. His head is surrounded by a halo, which is a visual cue of his holiness. The letters inside the halo in Greek mean "The One", and signify that Christ is the Lord of Life – He is The Living One, the source of our life.

The first Pantocrator icon we know of was written in the 700s, and still exists in St. Catherine's monastery on Mt. Sinai. The Christus Pantocrator in our sanctuary was inspired in 2005 and written during Lent in 2006 by the hand of Pr. Chris. In fall of 2006 it was given to Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Ames. When Lord of Life went through Holy Closure last spring, the icon was gifted to Bethesda, and today we introduce it to you.

People pray in many different ways. One way is to pray in the company of an icon, gazing at it in silence. We are not praying to the icon. That would not be right, because we don't pray to things -we pray to God alone. But we can pray in the company of the icon. It is not uncommon for people to light candles and sit for a period of time to gaze upon an icon and to pray in that way. An icon is sometimes referred to as a window into heaven, and gazing upon the icon is a practice similar to the faceto-face gaze of love we sometimes share with others, for instance newborn infants. A pastor once said to me, "may you always see Christ in your mind's eye gazing upon you with love." Prayer in the presence of an icon of Christ can remind us of Jesus' constant love.

## Calling Bethesda Women: Join us for Bible Study!

Bethesda hosts a monthly Bible study in the church conference room (#119) on the fourth Thursday morning of every month, with the exception of November and December, then we meet on the third Thursday of the month to account for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. This has been a long and strong tradition at Bethesda. The ELCA furnishes excellent resources for these studies, which are printed in Gather magazine (a publication of the Women of the ELCA).

#### What kind of resources are offered at Women's Gather Bible Study?

- A multi-page study, often part of a series over several months
- A leader's guide
- Thoughtful discussion questions and a video where you hear from the study's author.

Bethesda receives multiple copies of the magazine, which is published six times a year (check the Welcome Center for a copy). Studies are also posted on the web in a form you can download and print free of charge, making it convenient for you to access the resources at your own pace and time.

The current study is about faithfulness. This summer, we'll look at Healthy Relationships in a three-session study. In the fall, Rev. Dr. Christa von Zychlin (former pastor at Bethesda) wrote a three-session study on Money, Stewardship, and Generosity (her 10 Commandments study in 2023 was a winner!). In December, an Advent devotional awaits us. With such a variety of topics, there's something for everyone to engage with.

Please join us! Here's the kicker: If the Thursday morning time slot doesn't work for you, set up your own study with friends and neighbors. The Women of the ELCA has provided the basics – you just need a moderator and someone to gather everyone together. Self-study is okay, but as Jesus said, "Where one or two are gathered in my name," the results can be powerful.

### The Larger "We"

We are Lutheran Christians. We see ourselves as connected with other Lutherans in Ames and also with others in the Synod. We also sometimes think of ourselves as part of the larger ELCA. These three expressions of church – local church, synod, and church wide - come most easily to mind as we consider our church. But there is more. Working with other Lutheran churches, we do some mighty work through Lutheran Services.

Recently you may have seen an interesting message on a tee shirt. It identifies the wearer as "just another member of the Lutheran Crime Syndicate." This is one snarky way of countering the baseless accusations by Michael Flynn, echoed by Elon Musk, that Lutheran service organizations were in the business of money laundering – a slanderous defamation of the amazing outreach work of Lutherans across the country. There certainly isn't any money laundering going on! But there is a whole heaping lot of good work.

So, what is really going on in our service organizations? If you go to the website of Lutheran Services in Iowa (https://lsiowa.org/), you will find the following mission statement:

#### "OUR MISSION: Lutheran Services in Iowa responds to the love of Jesus Christ through compassionate service."

The website describes LSI as connected to the ELCA, as follows:

"LSI is an affiliated social ministry partner of the Iowa congregations of the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) and a member of LSA (Lutheran Services in America). We proudly serve people of all ages, abilities, religions, sexes, gender identities, national origins, ethnicities, races, and sexual orientations." If you would like to see LSI in action, I would encourage you to attend Lutheran Day on the Hill. Once a year, LSI leads Lutherans in advocacy at the Iowa State House. LSI is poised to do this because of its many programs supporting people of all ages in Iowa. LSI provides



background information and talking points for you to personally engage with your legislators about how we can best support Iowans in need. This year's event is **Tuesday**, **March 11**. A group is going from Bethesda. Consider joining us!

You might ask, "What about LIRS?" Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services has been renamed Global Refuge. On the Global Refuge website, we read about the mission of the organization, which focuses on refugee resettlement. It says, "For more than 85 years, Global Refuge (formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) has provided the resources, guidance, and community to help forge a way forward for New Americans. We're committed to helping people reimagine the possibilities while providing a soft place to land. With more than 1,000 partners and 50,000 volunteers, we are the largest faith-based national nonprofit exclusively dedicated to helping restore a sense of home to immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees. Since 1939, we've built a legacy of compassion by walking alongside more than 800,000 new neighbors as they rebuild their lives in the United States."

The Stop Work order issued in January affects over 6000 newly arrived refugees. The sudden ending of federal support means that these individuals and families face the possibility of hunger and even homelessness. And for those whose flights were canceled by the Federal Government, they were ready to leave behind their old life and now are homeless, hungry and in danger in their own countries. Both LSI and Global Refuge very much need our continued financial assistance during this time in which federal assistance is limited, to carry out their

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mission of caring for "the least of these."

If your curiosity prompts you further, you can go to the website of Lutheran Services in America (<u>https://lutheranservices.org/</u>). There you will learn that Lutheran Services in America is "a network of over 300 health and human service organizations empowering 6 million people over 1400 communities." These services reach one out of every 50 Americans. Lutheran Services in America has 27 member organizations in Iowa alone. Among them are organizations you would recognize including LSI, Bethany Life Communities, Madrid Home Communities, and UnityPoint Health.

Recently, the federal government's Office of Management and Budget called for a funding freeze on all US federal grants and loans. Although lawsuits were filed that led to the freeze being halted by a federal judge, concerns continue. The action is a threat that has had significant impact on the work of Lutheran service organizations along with other essential service organizations like Church World Service.

When you think of Lutheran Services, in America and particularly in Iowa, you can hold your head high. Much good comes through these organizations in the name of our Savior. You can donate to our service organizations directly as a passthrough on our Bethesda website. May God continue to help us as we seek to serve "the least of these" in the name of Christ. Amen.

#### March 2025 - LSI Clinical Services Team

"I love it when a whole classroom of middle schoolers run down the auditorium hallway for an LSI class shouting 'April!' with excitement, ready to learn about healthy relationship skills and self-esteem," said April Howe, a Program Supervisor for LSI's Clinical Services team.

Our LSI Clinical Services team provides various local community programs in schools across Iowa. Whether it's mental health therapy or programs providing teen pregnancy education, they all share the goal of wrapping care around adolescents at a local level.

Specifically, April and her team conduct two community programs in nine northwest Iowa counties: Community Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention (CAPP) and Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP).

CAPP supports and educates Iowa youth by providing sexual health and pregnancy prevention classes for healthy and successful relationships. PREP helps youth build social, emotional, and life skills to develop a positive sense of self and to connect with peers in their community. PREP utilizes the Teen Outreach Program and Wise Guys evidence-based curriculum.

"Thank you for teaching our class and taking time out of your day to come to our school. I learned a lot about healthy relationships and how to handle my anger and other emotions. You opened my eyes to my family's habits and what I want to take with me when I have a family of my own." – High school student to LSI staff member

"The letters that high school students write to our staff about what they learned in class and how they will use the knowledge in their everyday life shows the programs' tremendous impact," said April. "We meet the youth where they are at, but also encourage healthy decision-making along the way, which plays a huge role in making prevention education successful."

Furthermore, April's team encourages conversation and participation by providing incentives in the classroom, such as packaged snacks and other LSI materials. "When it comes to engagement in the classroom, I always say, 'When their stomachs are full, their brains are full," shared April with a smile. "Some students would skip school all day, but they show up to the last class of the day, taught by LSI. That, right there, is a win for my team."

April's team has seen significant success in response to their CAPP and PREP community programs. Based on a post-program evaluation, 96% of students in the CAPP program reported that they learned "some" or "a lot" that they didn't already know about sexual health topics, and 53% agreed that they are now more likely to start conversations about these topics with others.

"Pregnancy rates have dropped over the last four years in many of our counties served, proving our services are making a difference in our communities," said April. "Reaching the youth on their level and prioritizing prevention makes our program successful."

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### Do Social Services Agencies Attract the Homeless?

Recently, due to the increasing numbers of unhoused individuals in Ames and Story County, there has been discussion in the press about the existence of social services agencies in certain neighborhoods, and the misconception that agencies trying to help those who are hungry and unhoused simply attract more people who are hungry and unhoused to our neighborhoods and communities.

Some have gone so far as ti advocate on various public forums that social services agencies, like Good Neighbor Emergency Assistance (GNEA), stop offering to assist because that will somehow end homelessness and hunger in our community.

We should be aware that the reason social service agencies exist is because the problem if homelessness and hunger exists first. Good Neighbor, for example, tries to help people stay in their home, keep their lights on, and keep food on the table in emergencies. But until we do a better job, as a community of addressing the causes if hunger and homelessness, there will continue to be a

need for agencies like GNEA.

GNEA is a homelessness prevention agency. I would invite those who think social agencies are bad for the neighborhood to come in and volunteer for a few days at one to see the good we do for our neighbors in Ames and Story County.
