Words from the Pastor

Be Jesus

shared a story at a chapel service some 25 years ago about a mother who was making breakfast for her two sons (pancakes to be specific). Her boys, Kevin (who was 7), and Ryan (who was 5), began to argue over who was going to get the first set of pancakes, the ones coming straight off the grill. They began raising their voices, yelling at each other, going back and forth calling each other names, even running over to the stove, blocking each other out to see who would get those fresh hot pancakes first.

It (the fresh hot pancakes) was a pretty big deal to both Kevin and Ryan, and it didn't go unnoticed by their mom who witnessed all of this happening and saw an opportunity for a spiritual lesson. She sat her two sons down and presented them with this question, "If Jesus were sitting here, He would say, let my brother have the first pancake... I can wait." There was a pause, and before she could expand on this deep spiritual teaching moment, her older son Kevin turned to his younger brother (and at this point with a sense of pride, she knew that this was the moment of truth, that this was the defining moment that would make Ryan look up to his older brother for the rest of his life). So, as Kevin turned to his younger brother and looked straight into his eyes, he said, "Ryan, YOU can be Jesus!"
This was not what their mother had expected, but that is how we are a lot of times in our Christian faith. We want other people to be Jesus. Now, I get this, because it's not always easy walking and living as Jesus did, but it is what God's word instructs us to do in 1 John 2:3-6. It says,

"We know that we have come to know him if we keep his commands. Whoever says, "I know him," but does not do what he commands is a liar, and the truth is not in that person. But if anyone obeys his word, love for God is truly made complete in them. This is how we know we are in him: Whoever claims to live in him must live as Jesus did."

John is saying here that yes, it's going to be hard, and yes, it's what God requires; so if we're claiming we have a relationship with Jesus, we need to walk and live as Jesus did. This summer, there will be a multitude of opportunities to serve here at the church, but even more opportunities to live out our faith and be Jesus to others around us. This is not just my hope, but my prayer for our church. So, if we remember anything from these words, remember this: Whoever claims to live in HIM must walk as Jesus did. Simply put, be Jesus to others!

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

In January, with the help of our deacons, we began serving communion again every other month. In March we no longer used the offering boxes and our Frontline ushers now assist once again with the passing of the offering bowls during service. ia Ora (Aloha) from Auckland! We have now been in New Zealand for 16 months, and God has richly blessed us in every way. Early last year we began serving at a free lunch every Wednesday for students at St Paul's Church. It is located right across the street from two major campuses: The University of Auckland and Auckland University of Technology. We have 100-200 students each week. From that, we began entertaining students with trips to the beach, picnics in the parks, and home-cooked meals in our home. Seven months ago, we began a Bible Discussion Group in our home on Friday nights. We have had almost 40 students visit our group and have averaged about ten per week.

We are literally reaching the world! Our students come from China, India, Sri Lanka, Iran, Japan, Korea, Bangladesh, Taiwan, Colombia, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Samoa, and Germany. These students are willing to be loved and are so open to finding out more about Christianity. On Good Friday,

we baptized three of the students who attend our Friday group. All three are from China.

We also are attending and serving at International Baptist Church, Central Auckland. This church is truly international with 24 nations represented in the congregation of 110. Pastor Erwin leads the church to support us as we seek to make disciples of students so they can make disciples wherever they go after university.

Please pray for us as we work with so many different cultures and levels of English. We have several students who are seriously considering giving their lives to Christ.

We could not do this without your financial and prayerful support. Thank you so much!! We hope to see you in June and give a more personal report of what God is doing.

loha and warm Pacific greetings to you our dear brothers and sisters at First Baptist Church of Pearl City. Thank you for your generosity and prayerful support in enabling me to continue my seminary studies. I am currently studying at the Sydney Missionary and Bible College (Australia) and upon completion of my studies, I hope to help re-establish a theological education for our pastors and leaders. There is a huge need for pastors to fill in the vacant positions in some of our churches, but with no opportunities for training available locally, we feel under-equipped for the huge task before us.

Apart from being a full-time pastor at Namadi Heights Baptist Church, I have also been traveling across other Pacific islands training preachers on how to preach God's word faithfully and relevantly.

Fiji and the other islands in the South Pacific have a lot of



similarities with the island of Crete where Titus was sent. The cultural influence often overrides everything. The Cretans were known as liars, evil beasts, and lazy gluttons (Titus 1:12). And the church in Crete had people who were insubordinate, empty talkers and deceivers (Titus 1:10). The culture of Crete had influenced the church, so the Apostle Paul suggested that the solution to this problem was to appoint good leaders in the church. If the church in Crete was to influence their culture, then it needed godly, Christ-centered leadership. Similarly, if we are to have healthy churches in Fiji and the South Pacific, then we need godly, Christ-centered leadership in our churches. To develop these leaders, we are in desperate need of a training center to equip them.

The government can only allow us to operate if we have the accredited training, which is why I am studying through an Australian accredited institution. Mahalo for your partnership in the gospel.

Kids' Deaf Camp III

hank you to First Baptist Church Pearl City for the use of your facilities and a big mahalo to the numerous volunteers who served at Deaf Camp III in various capacities.

You have made a tremendous impact through Deaf Camp, and you may never see its result, however, I would like to share something that a friend shared with me. She is the only deaf person in her family, and after the death of both parents, she had to hire an interpreter to have an in-depth discussion with her hearing brother to discuss important family matters. Her hearing brother did not sign, communication was limited, and as a result, they did not have a close relationship growing up. After the death of both parents, the relationship became even tenser.



Some of the kids who came to camp come from families where there is one deaf child. One mom shared that she was inspired to become more American Sign Language (ASL) fluent so that she can have a better relationship with her deaf daughter. Some hearing kids at camp were frustrated with being in an environment where ASL is the main communication language and realized that their deaf siblings will never hear, but they can learn to communicate with them. This is huge and will make a long-term impact!


We continue to build relationships at each camp with the kids and their parents and have opportunities to pray with and for these families.

At this camp, we had a professional cook from Tennessee who graduated from culinary school and volunteered to teach cooking classes. Each camper had a gift of a cooking kit with recipes that he or she learned and can practice their skills at home.


Reaching deaf kids and adults in Hawaii has been very difficult -- we had 11 kids at camp, many are siblings. This will be a long-term commitment as we build trust and relationships with deaf families. We live in a broken world; many parents are very leery of who they can trust with their children -- much more so for deaf parents.

We have had several new deaf and hearing adult volunteers with ASL skills at this camp. Some are non-church members, and they are hearing the gospel message through the Bible stories, testimonies, songs, and crafts while being trained for future camps.

We also appreciate those who were taking ASL classes in preparation for the camp. Keep up the great work!
