The Importance of Community



n 1965 a longitudinal study (or otherwise known as longitudinal surveys or panel studies) was conducted with residents from Alameda County, which is located in the San Francisco Bay area. The study closely examined the relationship between health and lifestyle choices.

The study involved repeated observations of the same variables (here it was with the people and where they lived) over a period of time. The original cohort of about 7000 participants (which started in 1965) were given health questionnaires in 1965, 1973, 1985, 1988, 1994, and 1999.

The researchers involved with the study found that those who followed 5-6

practices (that they identified) tended to live healthier and longer lives. Those 5-6 practices were as follows:

Avoiding smoking.

Regular exercise.

Maintaining a healthy body weight. Good sleeping habits (7-8 hours a night). Limiting the consumption of alcohol. Healthy social & community ties.

Now, I think that most would agree with this list (at least most of it that is), but that last one wasn't taken as seriously, and for some, it still isn't today. The study found that the most isolated people were 3 times more likely to die than the most relationally connected people. They also discovered that those in the study who had bad health habits--smoking,



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no exercise, poor eating, obesity, and alcohol use--but had strong relational connections, these individuals had a significantly longer life expectancy than people who had great health habits, but were physically and socially isolated.

In other words, the study discovered that it's better to eat ice cream and drink smoothies with good friends than to eat broccoli or kale alone. Now, this might be my own personal interpretation, but I believe a lot of this has been affirmed as we, or rather the world, spent close to a year distancing ourselves socially from one another due to the pandemic. That speaks volumes to healthy social and community ties.

In another study by the Journal of the American Medical Association, they took 276 volunteers and infected them with a virus, basically the common cold. Now, in this study, they found that individuals who had deeper emotional connections (meaning deeper relationships, relational support networks, friend circles), did four times better fighting off illness than those who were more isolated. The individuals with deeper emotional connections appeared to be better equipped to fight off the colds than their relationally unconnected counterparts.

The reason I shared this is that studies like this (the Alameda County Study) confirm at a clinical level what scripture has informed us from the very start, and that is we were to be in relationship with one another, we were created for community. Acts 2:42 says,

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

Luke's words here describe what being in community was to be like. Being in community is simply being in a place with like-minded individuals, who come together to worship, to grow, encourage, support, pray, and care for each other. If it sounds familiar, it's because he's describing the church. I share this because it's my prayer that we be intentional about being in community with one another this Easter Sunday (March 31st) as we celebrate together the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus!

Deaf Camp Hawaii at FBC Pearl City

here is an eight-week-long Deaf Camp in Brentwood, TN that is open to Deaf children beginning at the age of 18 months through seniors in high school. It has grown from a one-day teen gathering to an incredible place for language acquisition, for developing a community for everyone with a Deaf family, and for long-lasting Deaf friends. It is an incredible academic, social, and recreational program.

A 3-day Deaf Camp for the Deaf, hearing siblings, and CODAs made its way to Pearl City. There is no greater way to begin 2024 than to see Deaf children, their siblings and CODAs all running around FBC of Pearl City at Deaf Camp Hawaii. They laugh, they learn, they share, they create, they memorize, they play, they teach, and they perform. Ten children registered for



Deaf Camp Hawaii in March 2023 with eight returning to the camp in January of 2024 for a total of eleven children. The daily activities include crafts, ASL songs, creative games and recreation, team building activities, drama, bible study, and breakfast and lunch.

The TN team is returning to partner with the Hawaii team to provide a 4-day camp March 19 – 22, 2024. It will take a committed Hawaii team of churches and people to keep the momentum going for this to become a forever program for all Deaf children of Hawaii. On January 5th, the children led several songs and performed for their parents and the community. They asked the staff to do one more song! They asked for a fourth day of camp. It is our hope the Hawaii team would dream of a 2-week, day camp and water that dream even bigger! One of the dreams includes providing a place for all who embrace American Sign Language and be a support for hearing parents with Deaf children. This family unit is the only one in which parents and children do not share the same ethnicity. These families are either Deaf parents with hearing children or hearing parents with Deaf children. The two cultures and languages possess no commonality.

Deaf Camp Hawaii has an opportunity to see families blossom within the ASL community and has an incredible opportunity to lead people to Jesus Christ. God has called the

local church to care for orphans and until hearing parents learn/ know ASL very well they cannot develop incredible relationships with their Deaf child; therefore, these Deaf children are orphans within their homes. We are called to preserve these families and foster relationships that we know are possible if ASL is provided to the whole family.

We are planning a Parent Conference in September, and we hope to livestream it to all the cities where we are planting Deaf Camp! We want to be an extension of all God is doing in Hawaii! Thank you so much for partnering with TN to introduce Deaf children and their families to Jesus Christ.

magine being in a foreign country, unable to understand the language, the culture is different. The next kids' deaf camp is scheduled for March 19-22, 2024, only a few months away! We also have events planned for the deaf community, so talk about Deaf Camp – you may know someone who has relatives, co-workers, or neighbors who are deaf.





It has been a difficult season for many Japanese people because of the Noto Peninsula Earthquake which damaged wide areas of Ishikawa prefecture on January 1st. So many people are still living in temporary shelters, and several hundred middle school students relocated to continue their studies. We are partnering with local Baptist churches to provide aid to those in need. Please pray for everyone involved.

Our ministry grew in many ways last year thanks to generous support from your church. We were able to finish fixing the roof and siding of Hope House which allowed us to have ministry gatherings again. The mission team your church sent in September touched and encouraged many people including us. The team members shared their personal testimonies, performed beautiful hula

dances, sang worship songs, led craft activities for children, and spent quality time with everyone who came to the fellowship.
