INTRO

So this one time, we (your Brewed Theology writers) met with someone to buy a trailer hitch we found on an online marketplace (random story, but true). We met the seller, and asked if we could pay in cash, to which he immediately replied, "Of course! Cash is King!"

It sure seems like money "is king" and makes the world go 'round. In the scope of human inventions, currency seems like a great idea. But there seems to be truth to the sentiment that More Money = More Problems. The pursuit, hoarding, and inequality borne of wealth acquisition and distribution consumes our lives, and our neighbors.

The First Commandment (Ex 20) decries idols, the prophets (Amos, Micah, & more) regularly call out economic injustice, and Jesus regularly concerns himself with money. Why? Probably because God knows money is a significant power-player in our lives, and a competitor for what (and whom) we worship.

So, we're going to talk about it, even (or rather, *especially*) as an "impolite" topic. Be an objective, open, patient person, among your fellow money-dependent humans.

QUESTIONS TO PONDER

How do you think about money? What is your relationship with it? How did you think about it growing up? How was it handled? How does that impact how you view, handle, and/or give away money today? Did you (or do you) feel rich? Poor? Do you know anyone who was "changed" by money? How? Why? Who is the most (or least) generous person you know? What do you remember/know about how Jesus talks about money? How do you engage with his toughest teachings about it (see some of them below)? What should our relationship with money look like? What does God think about money?

BIBLE BASICS (Lots of these! Do some reading!)

- Exodus 20:1-6 The First Commandment: one God. no idols.
- Exodus 16 God provides manna and quail in the wilderness, enough for each day. Read the whole story, but pay attention to what happens when people try to stockpile excess (hint: 16:19-20).
- Micah 6:3-15 The Prophet Micah laments a people who cheat the poor (see especially vv.10-12)
- Amos 8:4-6 The Prophet Amos denounces those who "trample on the needy" and leave nothing.
- Jesus talks about money a lot, in direct lessons and metaphor. Read these, then find more on your own:
 - Luke 12:13-21 A parable of a rich fool storing up treasures in the wrong place.
 - Matthew 6:19-21 Where your treasure is, there your heart will be.
 - Matthew 19:16-23 Camels, needles, and a rich man asking Jesus how to inherit eternal life.
 - Mark 12:38-44 Is this widow, who gives all she has, generous? Or being manipulated?
- 1 Timothy 6:9-10 A common saying about money, commonly misquoted. Find the misquote.
